The Crowley's Ridge Dirt Riders presented the first event of their 1998 MO-ARK Hare Scramble Series Feb. 22nd, held on the Charles Ackerman farm, Alton, MO.



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LEIVAN COLLECTS KAHOKA HS

The old saying, "to finish first you must first finish," could not have been more true than at the opening round of the 1998 Missouri Hare Scrambles Championship. On a cold and snowy day, racing on a very muddy and rutted course, defending series champion Steve Leivan came out on top of a battle that saw no less than eight different riders take their shot at the lead.

Midwest Motosports laid out a six mile course that utilized a large portion of the motocross track for spectator appeal. Throughout the day several sections of the course became bottlenecked with riders causing many re-routes. The promoters did a good job of keeping an eye on the bad places

and changing the track to keep the race rolling. In the end, fewer than ten riders out of the 200 rider field were able to complete six laps in the two hour time limit.

When the ten rider AA class blasted into the woods for the first time, Chris Graber led the field followed by fellow Yamaha riders Chris Nesbitt, Leivan, and Dwight Maggard. Leivan moved quickly, passing both Nesbitt and then Graber to take over the top position. With no lapped traffic or ruts to contend with, the first lap took the front runners of the AA class around 16 minutes to complete. The remaining laps would prove to be much more challenging and take much longer.

Two early spills on lap two moved Leivan back to fifth position while Maggard took his turn leading ahead of Nesbitt, KTM mounted Jamie Jennings and Kawasaki rider Chris Thiele. Leivan would retake the lead before the end of the lap, though, and hold it until just before the scoring barrens, when Thiele moved ahead on the motocross section by choosing an alternate line.

Thiele continued to lead all of the third circuit with Leivan in tow until Leivan became hung up on a rutted uphill. Leivan's misfortune moved Jennings into the runner-up position ahead of Nesbitt, Graber, and Mike Windmann. Maggard also became stuck on the same hill as Leivan dropping him back as well. The time separation between leader Thiele and sixth place Leivan at the halfway point of the race would measure over two minutes. However, the race was far from over.

"After I got hung up, I kind of became a little more cautious. It seemed that some of the guys were berserking it through traffic and through the bottlenecks. After being stuck once, I knew that I didn't want to be stuck again", stated Leivan after the event.

Thiele's problems surfaced on the fourth lap with an overheated engine near the midway point of the lap. After Thiele's demise, Jennings took his first ever lead and Kevin Borts, on his Jeff City Motorsports Suzuki, joined Jennings at the front. Only a mile into the fifth lap, Borts suffered the same fate as Thiele, an overheated engine. Jennings looked to be in control, but he too would suffer mechanical gremlins, in the form of, first, a lost shift lever and then a burnt up clutch. problems by these riders changed the complexion of the race and Windmann took his first lead of the day ahead of Nesbitt and the four stroke Yamaha of

Leivan. As Windmann motored along in front, Nesbitt and Leivan battled for the right to go after the leader. At one of the creek crossings near the end of the lap, Nesbitt went left and became momentarily hung up, while Leivan went to the right and made it with no problem to take over second.


Windmann still held the lead going into the final lap while Nesbitt rode right off of Leivan's rear tire. These two riders pulled all the stops on the final lap and closed in on Windmann. With only a couple of miles left in the race, Leivan made his pass to take over the lead going across a very rutted field. Windmann, whose bike was also starting to run hot, was forced to back off the throttle a little and nurse it in to the finish. Nesbitt, who may have had a shot at Windmann, became stuck again on the last lap and cruised in.

In the end, Leivan took his first win on his Sport Cycle Racing/Dunlop/Scott/

Answer/Silkolene/NGK/Noleen/RK Chain/Summers Racing/Fredette backed YZ-400, on his first try. "I am pretty sure that I wasn't the fastest rider here today, but when it came down to the end, I think that I was. In races like this you can't win them until the final lap, so nothing really matters until then. After my problems, I just plucked away, let the race come to me, and then turned it up at the end and passed the guys that I had to pass to win the race. My bike did a great job of getting me to the finish" explained Leivan.

Windmann held on to finish second, and first year AA rider Nesbitt finished third, both securing the best rides of their career and serving notice that they will be contenders this year. Early leader Graber took fourth while the winner of the A class, John Roth claimed fifth overall on his 400 Yamaha. The only other riders to complete six laps were Kevin Boyle on

One of the new rules this year in the Black Jack Enduro Circuit requires that every enduro set up a course that has the B riders riding a distance between the C loop and the A loop. This is commonly called the B cut-off. The Razorback riders took a new approach to this rule. They put in an extended reset at the beginning of the enduro. I ride in the B 250 class and I ride this course.

Since this enduro was the day after the banquet, key time was set for 9:00. I was on row 39 for this enduro, which meant that I rode up to the start about 9:30, in my fuzzy slippers and PJs, and rode back to the truck at 9:39. Then I had brunch and a nap. At almost 11:00, I headed out for my ride.

It was a beautiful day. The sun was out. It had rained

Steve Levian won the event, closely followed by Vince Davis. Dick Burleson finished third, proving that he has not slowed down very much. Rusty Reynaud proved he too is aging well, finishing fourth.

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Texas Mud

This is the story of Texas mud. The second round of the Black Jack Enduro Circuit was held in St. Jo, Texas on March 15, 1998. The riders were greeted Sunday morning by gray skies and constant drizzle. The condition of the course was very wet due to heavy rains the previous week coupled with more rain Saturday night.

I had the distinct misfortune of riding this event. Although the Jimmy Jack Enduro was well planned, as usual, nobody can control El Nino. The best way to tell the story of this event is to take you through the course from a rider's (or in my case a very slow rider's) perspective.

I started on row 33. I looked around at the start and noted that I had all of the Simons Brothers racing team two rows behind me on 35. The team includes Kreg and Jon Simons and Tony Kirkup. My plan was to use them as a gauge all day. The faster they passed me, the slower I was going.

We should have had some idea things were going to be rough. They started us in the bottom of a slimy wash. The first trick was to make it to the starting line without falling into the slime. Wouldn't want to get my riding gear messed up before the event got started. I watched a few rows take off up the hill, some with more grace than others. I did notice that Steve Leivan went up the slimy hill on his new Yamaha YZ400F with his usual smooth style. Vincent Davis was also noteworthy, he just pinned his CR250 and didn't let off until he was flying off the top. I looked for the easiest line and only dabbed twice on the way up. Note here that was the first of 275,000,000 dabs for the day.

We rode 1.75 miles of easy pasture and top trails and then reset to 3.1. A short rest and I was feeling pretty good. We start down the trail, and about 1/10th of a mile out we hit check one. I zeroed it and thought "great, I'm gonna have a good day." Wrong!! They throw us into about 7 miles of deep wet sand whoops. By the time I got there, they were mired with deep ruts. At this point, you found out if you were wearing too much clothing. After about two miles, Kreg is knocking at the back door. I let him go around and then he promptly falls right in front of me (this is bad form). I went around him and then he passed me right back. The crazy thing is that Jon was next to ask to come around. He also followed in the family tradition of promptly falling right in front of me. Once again I went around and he had to pass me back. I struggled to check two a number of minutes down, but I felt good that I had no major problems. Then right around the corner from the check, "Splash." I was buried up to the tank in a deep mud rut. I tugged and pulled but the bike wouldn't move. I slogged through knee deep mud back to the check and begged and pleaded to get someone to come help. They did, and in just a few minutes I was going again with everything except some energy (I would need later). The good news: I didn't loose any additional points. I thought to myself, "Boy, this was going to be my day" - Wrong again!

We all assembled at a known control to get ready for the next test. I talked to a few other riders, and almost nobody was able to keep their goggles on. The mist would just cover them and vision was impossible. Jon and Kreg told me they don't look where they are going anyway - they kept their goggles on. We started down into this section of very, very, very slimy mud. Did I mention that it was slimy? Traction was non-existent. The combination of the fact that you can't see, deep ruts, and riding on axle grease made this section nothing short of Hell. When I finally made it to check four, I asked one of the workers if they were enjoying this day as much as I was. One of the guys told me that that was the worst of it, the rest of the course was great. If I saw him today, I would punch him in the mouth.

The rest of the course was an unbelievable combination of soil types and riding conditions. At times the course was actually good. But as soon as I started to gain confidence, I found myself going sideways. Or I was trying to dodge a man (and bike) eating rut. With about 8 miles to go in the short course I went into a very innocent looking mud puddle. Splash! My bike was in the most unbelievable position. The rear wheel was not touching anything. It looked like a paddle wheel boat. I was stuck there for quite a while. The bad news is that not more that 100 feet up the trail was check seven. I checked into this last test section only 46 minutes down. I rode as fast as I could to not hour out.

By the end of the course my biggest problem was that my legs were so tired I could barely lift them up to the pegs. All of that paddling took it's toll.

I must say, I did finish the course. Even if the club took pity on us and stopped the race after the 48 mile short course. As I came to the last check I looked at my computer and noted that I had not houred out. When the course worker told me we were done, I told him I could kiss him. He said "Not with a face that looks like that!"

The end result of this day I still find amusing. I dropped 185 points in 8 checks, and I zeroed two of them. That is an average of 30 points at each check. That is my personal best. 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
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
