Pension

#### What Is VA Pension?

Pension is a benefit paid to wartime veterans with limited income, and who are permanently and totally disabled *or* age 65 or older.

### Who Is Eligible?

You may be eligible if:

- you were discharged from service under other than dishonorable conditions, AND
- you served 90 days or more of active duty with at least 1 day during a period of war time\*, AND
- your countable family income is below a yearly limit set by law, AND
- you are permanently and totally disabled, OR
- you are age 65 or older.

\*Note: Anyone who enlists after September 7, 1980, generally must have served at least 24 months or the full period for which called or ordered to active duty. Service from August 2, 1990 to present is considered to be a period of war (Gulf War) in addition to other periods of war such as World War II, Korea, and Vietnam.

## **How Much Does VA Pay?**

**Note**: Certain expenses (i.e., medical expenses, education expenses, or expenses related to the last illness or burial of a dependent) paid by you are taken into consideration when arriving at your countable family income.

If available, attach copies of dependency records (marriage & children's birth certificates) and current medical evidence (doctor & hospital reports). 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#### Death Pension Benefits

#### What Is Death Pension?

Death pension is a benefit paid to eligible dependents of deceased wartime veterans.

### Who Is Eligible?

You may be eligible if:

- the deceased veteran was discharged from service under other than dishonorable conditions, AND
- he or she served 90 days or more of active duty with at least 1 day during a period of war\*, AND
- you are the surviving spouse or unmarried child of the deceased veteran, AND
- your countable income is below a yearly income limit set by law.

\*Note: Anyone who enlists after September 7, 1980, generally must have served at least 24 months or the full period for which called or ordered to active duty. Service from August 2, 1990 to present is considered to be a period of war (Gulf War) in addition to other periods of war such as World War II, Korea, and Vietnam.



# Disability Compensation Benefits

### What Is VA Disability Compensation?

Disability compensation is a tax-free benefit paid to a veteran for disabilities that are a result of or made worse by injuries or diseases that happened while on active duty, active duty for training, or inactive duty training. Disability compensation is also paid to certain veterans disabled from VA health care.

### Who Is Eligible?

You may be eligible for disability compensation if you have a service-related disability and you were discharged under other than dishonorable conditions.

### How Much Does VA Pay?

The amount of basic benefit paid ranges from \$127 to \$3,017 per month, depending on how disabled you are (Veteran without dependents).

#### Note: You may be paid additional amounts, in certain instances, if:

- you have very severe disabilities or loss of limb(s)
- you have a spouse, child(ren), or dependent parent(s)
- you have a seriously disabled spouse

#### How Can You Apply?

You can apply by filling out VA Form 21-526, Veterans Application for Compensation and/or Pension. If you have any of the following material, please attach it to your application:

- Discharge or separation papers (DD214 or equivalent)
- Dependency records (marriage & children's birth certificates)
- Medical evidence (doctor & hospital reports)

## Disability Compensation for Sexual or Personal Trauma

A number of women and men suffered sexual or other personal trauma while serving in the military. These veterans may still struggle with fear, anxiety, embarrassment, or profound anger as a result of these experiences. We cannot undo the past; however, if a veteran suffers from the effects of trauma in military service, VA may be able to help them.

### **How Does VA Define Sexual or Personal Trauma?**

Sexual or personal trauma are events of human design that threaten or inflict harm. Trauma is defined as any lingering physical, emotional, or psychological symptoms. Examples of trauma are:

- · Rape,
- · Physical assault,
- · Domestic battering, and
- Stalking.

## Can You Receive Compensation for Your Disabilities?

Yes. If it is determined that your disabilities are a result of or have been made worse by injuries or diseases incurred during military service, you may receive compensation. You must have been separated under other than <u>dishonorable</u> conditions to be eligible, and must currently suffer from a disabling condition to receive compensation. A common disability resulting from a sexual or personal trauma is Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

## Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) Secondary to Sexual or Personal Trauma

PTSD is a recurrent emotional reaction to a terrifying, uncontrollable, or life-threatening event. The symptoms may develop immediately after the event or may be delayed for years. They include:

- Sleep disturbances and nightmares,
- · Emotional instability,
- · Feelings of fear and anxiety,
- · Impaired concentration,
- Flash-backs, and
- Problems in intimate and other interpersonal relations.

## How Can You Apply?

You can apply for disability compensation by filling out VA Form 21-526, *Veterans Application for Compensation and/or Pension*. VA counselors and Women Veterans Coordinators are available for assistance.
