Hi there folks! I'm telling you, if you missed the Karl Shifflet Band and Tommy Brown concert at Willis Music on April 21st you missed one of the best concerts that has been put on by Willis Music and WoodSongs Coffeehouse!

Every concert that I attended over the winter months have been fabulous but the attendance has been less than favorable. I was not sure what to expect when I got to Willis but I knew Karl and Tommy normally draw a bigger crowd. Well, I about fell over when I walked in the doors. Every seat was just about filled. The room was filled from one wall to the other. Our Co-Secretary Jackie Bowling reported that the attendance was at 122 Bluegrass fans! The largest attendance recorded to date. That was amazing!

Karl and Tommy did not let these folks down. They both played two sets and the music was great. Normally the crowd will go down after the second set but I noticed there was only a slight change from when the concert started.

Karl and his band almost put you back in time. With their dress of wing tip shoes, pinstripe suits and the skillful use of the one microphone in the center of the stage, they make you feel like your watching one of the old radio shows in the past. The whole show was a well orchestrated treat for the eyes and ears.

Tommy and his group as always leaves the audience with wanting more. I have listened to Tommy play for years now and his songs never get old. His Ralph Stanley style of hard driving banjo music keep the toes a tappin' and the hands a clappin'

In retrospect for them and us and all performers who were not doing what our audiences paid for.....I apologize and hope with all my heart we are given another chance to make your clapping hands sore. Keep the music and the faith in those that perform the music alive and well, please. Until then we'll be practicing for you. When MFBGB hits the Festival of the Bluegrass in Georgetown/Lexington Kentucky this year on the 9th of June, we'll be ready. The audience deserves it.

The Day The Music Died By Steve McCain

Most of us have heard of the song American Pie which tells the story of The Day the Music Died. On February 3rd 1959, three famous rock musicians, Buddy Holly, Richie Valens and JP "The Big Bopper" Richardson died after their small plane crashed in a Wisconsin cornfield.

With much less drama but the same heartfelt impact, the Bluegrass community experienced a loss over the past few months that affected everyone involved with Bluegrass music.

While the deaths of Earl Scruggs, Douglas Dillard and Doc Watson didn't make the evening news or make the top story on the Entertainment programs, for those who love music we will always remember these great patriarchs of a music called Bluegrass.

If you are a Banjo player, you will always be indebted to Earl Scruggs. He basically invented the three finger picking style that we are all taught today. I think every picker alive has a copy of Earl's teaching methods on the banjo. If you don't, you should.

I started listening to Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs at a young age and that banjo sound got burned in my brain for life, I just loved it! My banjo teacher Jeff Roberts told me once the way he learned to play Banjo was to take that same album and play it on it slowest speed over and over until he was able to capture the picking roles that Earl was playing. Earl and his partner Lester Flatt would keep Bluegrass music in the limelight with their hits like the "Ballad of Jed Clampett" and "Foggy Mountain Breakdown" as the theme to the Bonnie and Clyde motion picture.

Douglas Dillard, banjo player for the Dillards would also

capture the heart of America as part of the beloved mountain band on the Andy Griffith Show called the Darlings. While these guys would never crack a smile as they were playing on the show, they always put a smile on my face



and made me think, I got to learn how to do that!

As part of the Dillards, Douglas became an inspiration for many of the Bluegrass musicians known today.

On May, 29th we just lost Doc Watson as well. Doc, who was blinded at the age of 1 year, mastered his art to become one of the most sought after flatpickers in the business. Doc again, became an inspiration to future musicians but also to others who were handicapped with blindness. There was certainly no handicap in his playing.

As a banjo player, I am deeply saddened by the loss of these great musicians but also grateful for the fact that because of them, the music didn't really die but will live on forever.

I can only imagine a heavenly Bluegrass band playing with greats like Bill Monroe, Lester Flatt and Jimmy Martin just jamming away and up walks Earl, Doc and Douglas asking, you boys mind if we join in? What a day that must have been!
