David Ventura has been a dressage enthusiast since childhood when he groomed and trained at Tempel Farms Lipizzans. As an adult, Mr. Ventura has been breeding warmbloods for twenty years and has received his USDF bronze and silver medals. For five years in a row, he has ranked for USDF Horse of the Year and twice Oldenburg Horse of the Year on horses he has bred and trained. Mr. Ventura also is a driving enthusiast and holds an "R" judge's card in carriage dressage. He has judged CDI's to choose the U.S. Driving Team. Mr. Ventura has competed his Oldenburg stallion, Pointmaker, at Prix St. George. He and Pointmaker were 2006 Vintage Cup Champions at Prix St. George. Mr. Ventura also competes at 3rd Level on the Lipizzan stallion, Neapolitano Savona, and on an Oldenburg gelding he bred at his farm. Currently he is competing 4th level on a point maker granddaughter Mare. Mr. Ventura's teaching style truly embodies classical dressage. He trains drivers in the use of good equitation as a means of sympathetic communication between driver and horse. Although dressage is a sport that requires balance, self-discipline and physical ability, Mr. Ventura believes it should also be an enjoyable experience for both partners. Mr. Ventura's clinics have helped many drivers and riders realize more gratification as well as improvement in their own dressage work.

#### Harnessing & Ground Driving Clinic July 2024

Ann McClure and Diane Kastama co-presented a clinic focused on harness fit and ground driving. Nineteen members and guests attended.

I don't think I've ever attended a BODS event that had attendees so engaged, intent, and focused.

Participants and auditors were so involved that when someone mentioned that it was lunchtime and that there would be a break, no one stopped. Instead,



snaffle. Diane agrees with her.

Next, they worked with horse/owner pairs on how to handle bridle and reins for safety and effectiveness in ground driving. For example, instead of running the reins through the neck terrets to the bridle, reins should go through the shaft loops. This prevents the reins from getting caught in the shafts during ground driving.

Ann demonstrated how she ground drives by 'harnessing' Jenifer and having her walk. (Thankfully Jenifer didn't have to trot!) Ann emphasized keeping the horse at a good walking pace, urging Jenifer on; she then showed how she pivots in place to keep the animal in a circle. We all gave Jenifer a round of applause for her part in the demo.



people either brought harnessed horses over to Ann and Diane for advice on fitting or went straight into ground driving practice.

At the outset, Diane and Ann demonstrated issues with harness fitting using horses ranging in size from an Irish Draft to a mini. They discussed fitting overall and brought their expertise to bear on problems with back straps, breast collars and safety shackles. They answered questions about options for handling bitting problems. Ann stated that for starting driving she likes using either a half cheek or an eggbutt Mullen and then observing how the horse accepts the bit. She definitely does NOT recommend starting with a broken

I asked several attendees to let me know 'the most important/useful/helpful' thing they learned.

First, from Anita who says she is new to driving. "It was very informative. I learned so much. Namely the importance of saddle fit for driving, the 'why' behind the use of blinders, basic harness fitting as well as the need to balance a cart. It was a very worthwhile experience."

Second, from Lisa who felt that the overall experience was great. She liked the friendly, helpful atmosphere. She

was looking for a driving club to improve her skills and was very "blessed to have found your club! You all rock!"

Lisa highlighted several things she learned: "What I appreciated was Diane taking our equines and demonstrating and explaining the harness and the fit. She didn't just tell you this is how it is and that's that—she explained the whys. What really helped me was why we use blinkers/blinders. My filly goes without so far and does fine without them. However, Diane explained why we should use them. 1) was to be able to turn a horse away from a spooky object without them seeing it; and 2) was the element of surprise with the whip, especially if you are driving multiples. I received an education that I so wanted."
