THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Recently Marge and I were visiting my daughter Loren at their home, now dubbed Hooverville. It had been one of those days when everything had gone wrong. Our son-in-law Daniel was on the west coast doing business, and Loren had chauffeured three kids, one to school and the other two to day care. Then on the way to work, she had car trouble and arrived late. By late morning she was still playing catch-up when she got a call from the day care— the baby had a cough and fever. So she had to leave work early and take him to the doctor, before picking up the other two and heading home.



So, as grandparents do, we brought supper and tried to provide a little help. One grandson was running wild and out of control and the other was grumpy and uncooperative. I'm certain most of you have had similar days. As we unpacked food and set the table, Loren shuffled into the kitchen like a Zombie. Trying to shake off the stress with a little comedy, she slouched under the weight of the baby in one arm, dragging the middle child behind her with the other, and she whispered in the course and raspy voice of the living dead, "Am I too late for the train to the Magic Kingdom?"

I share that little family anecdote to make a point. Over the past few decades numerous writers have noted a bizarre fascination with zombies in western culture, suggesting that the concept is a trope or metaphor for the very complex stress of life. George A. Romero's film Night of the Living Dead (1968) was followed by numerous others. In 2010, Walking Dead became one of the most successful television series in history. Some have suggested that zombies, in their grunting aimlessness parallel the number of people who see themselves as trying to survive in a world that has lost direction and purpose. Millions of people go through the staggering and mindless motions of life, feeling rudderless in a river flowing out of control. Other writers have suggested that zombies represent indebtedness and unemployment as the motif, which is another social problem of serious magnitude. Still others see zombies as representing the world's ubiquitous inclination to war, as if we battle an infectious insanity that cannot be stopped by any means other than lethal force.

Whatever may be the case, we would all agree that our world is more complex than ever, and more than ever we need a renewal of direction and purpose. We need hope. We need restored vision of a bright future. No one wants to think the direction of our nation, or the world, is toward a zombie apocalypse where the few remaining "healthy" people are threatened with annihilation.


So, no matter how you may feel about all that, there is nothing that better addresses our needs than the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is, as it always has been, the Good News, a message of hope in a hopeless world. In this season of resolutions and renewal, approaching a season of repentance and restoration, let us turn again to the solid rock upon which our hope is built. With eyes fixed on such a polar star, let us not wander aimlessly in the night, but march forward, laughing and singing, into the light.

DECEMBER BOARD MEETING SYNOPSIS

- The minutes were approved from the December board meeting.
- Financial Report. We ended 2018 up \$15,057.12. Our outreach for 2018 was 3.1% of our donations. Offerings for the year were up by about \$20,000 over previous years.
- Year End Attendance Review. Attendance for 2018 was an average of 38 people per Sunday. 2017 was 35.3, so we have had a 10% increase in attendance this year. We had 110 people at our Christmas Eve Service. During 2018, we had 6 adults and 4 children join the church.
- Laura Latham, Daniel Tisserand, and our Board Chair Ken Bean will be rotating off the board. The Board sends heartfelt thanks to these three individuals for their service! It is appreciated. Coming on the Board in 2019 for a three-year term is Scooter Cave, Karen Chilton and Daniel Tisserand. 2018 Elders will be Larry Lambert, Clark Neill, Marilyn Chamberlin and Daniel Tisserand. Board Chair for 2019 will be Marilyn Chamberlin. Ken Bean thanked the Board for a wonderful year. He was happy to serve. Clark Neill will serve as Co-Chair for 2019.
- We do need to purchase a new vacuum cleaner. Scooter Cave motioned to purchase a Shark Professional vacuum cleaner from Sams Club. Yvonne Heistand seconded. Motion passed. Kimberly Tisserand will purchase the vacuum.
- Christmas service salaries The Christmas Eve service is an extra worship service and the Board recommended that all paid employees would receive an extra week's salary for additional worship services they do during the year. Larry Lambert motioned. Clark Neill seconded. Amended motion passed. The extra week's salary will be included in January salary checks.
- Our Valentine's Luncheon will be on February 10, 2019 after our church service.
- Adult Sunday School will begin back up sometime in February.
- Les Massey received a letter from the North Texas Area Disciples of Christ. We usually have two people recorded as delegates from our church to possibly attend events with the North Texas Area. Les Massey asked who was interested in this position. Marilyn Chamberlin and Jim Mitlyng volunteered.
- Labels have been printed for people who gave donations in 2019. Tax forms will be distributed at church next Sunday and the rest mailed.
- Meeting adjourned at 10:38 am. Next meeting will be February 3, 2019 at 9:30 am.


