In the midst of His own suffering and shame on the cross for the sins of humanity. Jesus summoned a spirit of forgiveness.


When they had come to the place called Calvary, there they crucified Jesus, and the criminals one on the right hand and the other on the left.

The Acmar Community Quilt

Right after Thanksgiving 2022, folks in the Acmar community began smelling smoke and learned there was a fire at the Environmental (or "Green") landfill located near the corner of Annie Lee Road and Blackjack Road (near the old washer camp and Colgate Power Plant area). Dump trucks loaded with tree stumps and limbs have been seen for decades headed that way. The wide swath of trees surrounding the landfill made it impossible to see the extent of the landfill area. Until the fire burned many of the trees and brush, few of us were aware the landfill covered approximately 25 acres and possibly 100 feet deep in some places.

But soon it became clear that the smell from the thick black smoke could not have come from just the burning of limbs, brush, and stumps. Many people found that the smoke irritated their respiratory system. It was obvious that old tires and other unknown substances might be burning. The Moody Fire Department and some other agencies worked tirelessly trying to extinguish the fire, but were only able to contain it and prevent it from spreading further. It was an eerie feeling to see the glow of the fire from your front porch in the evenings. It was hoped that the torrential rainstorms we had would extinguish the fire, but it didn't.

Everyone had questions about how the fire started, how it could be extinguished, and why wasn't more being done about it as the days turned to weeks and months! We were told there were limitations as to what could be done about it since it was on private property. It became apparent that much of the fire and smoke was coming from burning underground, making it potentially hazardous to firefighters and other responders. The fire gained more and more news coverage as issues with the smoke spread for miles each day, depending on which way the wind was blowing, affecting more people than just the Acmar community. Besides the air quality, there is also great concern for water quality as runoff from the fire can flow into nearby Big Black Creek, which flows into the Cahaba River.

Mid-January, the St. Clair County Commission appealed to Alabama Department of Environmental Management and on January 18, 2023, Governor Kay Ivey declared the site a limited state of emergency making it possible to access funding for the monumental job of completely putting out the fire. The Environmental Protection Agency provided a contractor who handles work of this kind and quickly began the process of carrying up to 200 dump trucks' loads of dirt each day if weather permitted.

Just how the fire started is still unknown. It was reported that an investigation into how it started can't begin until the fire is out. The contractor estimated it may take a month before the fire is completely out.

From ADEM - "It is not known at this point how long it will take to put out the fire, or who ultimately will be responsible for paying the EPA's costs. The EPA is expected to seek recovery costs from the private operator of the site. Once the fire is out, ADEM will take appropriate enforcement actions against the operator. Such actions could involve penalties for impacts to air quality and open burning violations."
