

THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE

REBOOTING FOR THE NEW YEAR

In recent years we have all grown accustomed to the many foibles and quirks of electronic devices, including computers, cell phones, television service providers, and even digital components in our cars. Now and then something goes wrong, and usually the first step to a resolution is to reboot.



Just as our computers can start to bog down and lose speed, so can our lives. In the course of a year's activities we often find ourselves losing energy and feeling as if were stuck in mud, all because of the clutter of "non-significant" things we have to take care of. Other people's urgent needs have become our urgent responsibilities, to the point that have little time and energy for ourselves. Things we want and need to do get shelved for the sake of "squeaky wheels" that demand grease. Day by day, issues, events, requests, crises, problems, all pile up and crowd out both personal joy time and spiritual time. When that happens, we need an opportunity to reboot and start fresh.

That's why celebrating the New Year is a valuable and healthy thing. In a way January 1 is just another day. You sleep late to recover from the midnight count-down on New Year's Eve. You watch a parade on television, then you go out to lunch and add black eyed peas as a side to whatever else you order, to assure good luck for the coming year. Besides all that, for us as Christians, the New Year is a good time to read a few Bible stories about beginning again. Each one provides us with new perspectives on how to make a fresh start. Most of the famous characters in the Bible made a radical change at some point in life, to become a new person with a new direction. In the Old Testament Moses recovered from exile in the wilderness to lead the exodus of his people from bondage and become the great law giver. Naomi and Ruth recovered from losing their husbands to start a new life, more meaningful and rewarding than before. In the New Testament, Simon Peter recovered from denying Jesus to become the chief spokesman at Pentecost, and Saul of Tarsus left behind a misguided quest of persecuting Christians to become the great apostle of Christ to the nations.

So, during the month of January, let me urge you to welcome newness, drop a little useless baggage, embrace a fresh spirit with vigor and great expectation. Let's all reboot. It'll do you good.

HYMN OF THE MONTH - "ANOTHER YEAR IS DAWNING"

"Another Year Is Dawning! Dear Father, let it be"... What a hymn to sing to our Father in Heaven beginning a New Year. A prayer unto God for whom nothing is impossible. A hymn to beseech our heavenly Father for a good year ahead; a year of resting and trusting, of praise for His mercies and faithfulness, and of service to Him. Let this be our heartfelt prayer too as we look forward to another year with the Lord.

"Another Year Is Dawning" was written by Frances Ridley Havergal and composed by Samuel S. Wesley. Frances Havergal was born at Astley, Worcestershire, December 14, 1836. In 1852, Frances said, "I committed my soul to the Savior, and earth and heaven seemed brighter from that moment." A short sojourn in Germany followed, and on her return she was confirmed in Worcester Cathedral, July 17, 1853. She wrote these words in 1874 as a poem for her New Year's greeting cards. The hymn was subsequently included in her *Under the Surface*, 1874, and *Life Chords*, 1880.
