### Where There Is Vision, the People Flourish

Proverbs 29:18a (KJV) reads, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." So, "where there is vision, the people flourish." God's people flourish when they see and live by God's vision. This sermon series will ask: What is God's vision? Are we being faithful to that vision? How can we live more fully into God's vision? We'll explore God's vision for individuals, relationships, community, the world, and the church. The first sermon in the series invites us to see as God sees.

#### Seeing Through God's Eyes

January 22 - Psalm 33

The psalmist declares that the Lord, whose word created all of creation, delivers us from evil and death. The Lord sees us with faithfulness, righteousness, and justice. This is God's perspective on God's creation. Do we dare to see our world through God's eyes?

#### God's Vision for Humanity

January 29 - Jeremiah 1:4-10

God tells Jeremiah that God knew him before he was born. God created Jeremiah - and each of us - for service to others.

#### **God's Vision for Relationships**

February 5 - John 13:34-35

Jesus tells us to love one another as He has loved us. Divine love is the hallmark of all of our relationships.

#### **God's Vision for Community**

February 12 - Selections from Exodus 22:21 - 23:9

These verses outline the social obligations of God's people. Take care of the poor, be honest and compassionate, and love your neighbors. This is the community that God envisions.

#### God's Vision for the World

February 19 - Isaiah 11:6-9

God imagines the world as a place of peace where unity reigns. The earth will be full of the Lord.

#### God's Vision for the Church

February 26 - Acts 2:37-47

These verses describe the church as it came into existence after Pentecost. God envisions the contemporary church including similar qualities. How well does FCC embody these qualities? What do we need to do?

## Praying for Donald Trump



Donald Trump will be inaugurated as our 45<sup>th</sup> president this week. The campaign between him and Hillary Clinton was often bitter and divisive. Since his election, many in

our country have expressed a deep fear of what the Trump administration may do. With the inauguration just a few days away, we hear about entertainers who won't perform, politicians who won't attend, and protesters who will be present. Given this level of anxiety in our nation, what are we as Christians asked to do?

Let me say something first to those who are profoundly upset that Trump will be our next president. We need to *pray*.

Scripture certainly admonishes us to pray for our leaders. I Timothy 2:1-2 advises us to pray for government officials "so that we may live a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity." We Christians have prayed for our leaders, both good and bad, since the earliest days of the church.

Such prayer follows in the way of Jesus Christ. He said, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven." He also cried out from the cross, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they are doing." As God's beloved children, we are to love our enemies and pray for those who hurt us, even for those who condemned an innocent man to death on the cross.

Michael B. Curry, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, writes that our elected leaders need our prayers. We pray for "their well-being, for they too are children of God." We pray that "they will lead in the ways of wisdom, justice, and truth," and that their leadership "will truly serve not partisan interest but the common good." When we pray for our leaders, Curry points out, "we are actually praying for our nation, for our world, indeed we are praying for ourselves."

#### Curry continues:

Prayer is not a simplistic cheer or declaration of support. Prayers of lament cry out in pain and cry for justice. Prayer can celebrate. Prayer can also ask God to intervene and change the course of history, to change someone's mind, or his or her heart. When we pray for our enemies, we may find that we are simultaneously emboldened to stand for justice while we are also less able to demonize another human being.

Curry's experience as an African American from Chicago who grew up in a historically black church is especially poignant:

We prayed for leaders who were often lukewarm or even opposed to our very civil rights. We got on our knees in church and prayed for them, and then we got up off our knees and we marched on Washington. Following the way of Jesus, we prayed and protested at the same time. We prayed for our leaders who were fighting for our civil rights, we prayed for those with whom we disagreed, and we even prayed for those who hated us. And we did so following the Jesus, whose way is the way of unselfish, sacrificial love. And that way is the way that can set us all free.

I don't mean to minimize the fears of those who don't support Trump's presidency. I know that his election has occasioned much turmoil and anxiety. Rather, I'm calling us to pray for Donald Trump, his presidency, and all of our government leaders. Prayer is powerful and can change our world, even ourselves.

Now for those who support Trump's presidency and applaud his actions thus far. We need to *pray*.

We can join our Christian sisters and brothers in humble prayer, asking God to instill in Trump's presidency divine wisdom, peace, justice, love, and compassion. We can also seek to understand the anxiety and fear that some are experiencing and stand beside them to ensure that no one is ever forgotten. We can pray as a people united in Jesus Christ.

May the next four years bless our nation, that we in turn may share our blessings with all of the nations of the world. -- Jim Warren
