3rd Sunday of Lent (Year A) Sunday 12 March 2023 "The Water That I Shall Give...."

"The water That I Shall Give....."

Today we are invited to continue our Lenten journey of renewal and faith in the company of a person considered an outsider by her own culture. The woman's name is not mentioned by the writer of the Gospel according to John because in some way she represents every one of us.

In Samaria, a woman comes to draw water from the Well of Jacob -a traditional place of significant encounters in Israel's history. The woman belongs to a long line of women whose lot it is to take on this heavy task of drawing water from a well so that their families or others they serve might simply survive - water being a fundamental element of life. A moral outcast and shunned by her own community, she chooses to arrive at the well, at a time that will enable her to access the water away from others who would ostracize, obstruct or challenge her harshly.

At this time Jesus and some of his disciples were passing through Samaria - which was a rarity due to the animosity that existed between Jews and Samaritans. Hot, tired and thirsty from his journey, he stops at the well on his own and, defying the rules relating to gender, cultural religious differences, he breaks the barrier between Samaritans and Jews, approaches the unaccompanied woman as she is drawing water and asks her for a drink. This chance meeting with Jesus would radically change her life when **she** comes to recognize in this compassionate, humble and understanding person- one who 'listens -beyond the words- to the heart and through whom the mercy and love of God is being offered not only to her but to all human beings. Jesus has pierced through her initial cynicism and defenses, perceived her boldness and honesty and touched on the secrets of her life – not to condemn or demean her- but to expand her vision and offer her hope - if she **can** find the courage to embrace it.

She is now the one who is thirsty- but not in the physical sense. As the conversation continues she finds that Jesus satisfies not only her thirst to know Him better but her longing for a lost dignity and a better life than before. She is sensing something of what St Paul speaks in today's second reading: *'The Love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit which is given to us.'* (Romans 5) Having come to perceive Jesus as a prophet and the Messiah much longed **for** by Samaritans as well as Jews, the Samaritan woman becomes a disciple **of Jesus** and evangelist to her own people, proclaiming at the top of her voice that she has seen the long awaited anointed one of God – the Messiah. Over this week we might think about this story of the' Woman at the Well''. Let us recall the ways we have **sensed the spirit of Jesus** in our interactions **with others** and changes we must make to become faithful disciples.

May the living water of God's love poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit strengthen us to remove the boundaries that separate, harm or exclude others that we may be disciples of mercy, forgiveness and peace in the name of Christ Jesus.

Lenten Regulations

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Fasting and abstinence from meat.

On all other Fridays, except solemnities, the law of the common practice of penance is fulfilled by performing any one of the following:

- (a) **Prayer:** e.g., Mass attendance; family prayer; a visit to a church or chapel; reading the Bible; making the Stations of the Cross; praying the Rosary; or in other ways.
- (b) Self Denial: e.g., not eating meat; not eating sweets or dessert; giving up entertainment to spend time with the family; limiting food and drink so as to give to the poor of one's own country or elsewhere; or in other ways. Project compassion is a major means of expressing our self-denial in Australia.
- (c) **Helping Others:** e.g., special attention to someone who is poor, sick, elderly, lonely or over-burdened; or in other ways.
- * All who have completed their 18th year and have not yet begun their 60th year are bound to fast. All who have completed their 14th year are bound to abstain. (Canon 1252)
- * The Season of Lent is a time of penance. During Lent the faithful are exhorted to devote themselves in a special manner to prayer, to engage in works of piety and charity, and to deny themselves.
- * Each of the faithful is obliged to receive Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept must be fulfilled between Ash Wednesday, 22 February 2023 and Trinity Sunday 4 June 2023 unless for a good reason it is fulfilled at another time during the year.
- * The wonderful gift of the Lord's merciful love is offered in a special way in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Lent is a most appropriate time to receive this Sacrament. All faithful who have reached the age of discretion are bound faithfully to confess their grave sins at least once a year.

GOSPEL

John 4:5-42

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you:

Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give

will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water.' 'Go and call your husband' said Jesus to her 'and come back here.' The woman answered, 'I have no husband.' He said to her, 'You are right to say, "I have no husband"; for although you have had five, the one you have now is not your husband. You spoke the truth there.' 'I see you are a prophet, sir' said the woman. 'Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know: for salvation comes from the Jews. But the hour will come – in fact it is here already –

when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth: that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants. God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.'

'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

At this point his disciples returned, and were surprised to find him speaking to a woman, though none of them asked, 'What do you want from her?' or, 'Why are you talking to her?' The woman put down her water jar and hurried back to the town to tell the people. 'Come and see a man who has told me everything I ever did; I wonder if he is the Christ?' This brought people out of the town and they started walking towards him.

Meanwhile, the disciples were urging him, 'Rabbi, do have something to eat; but he said, 'I have food to eat that you do not know about.' So the disciples asked one another, 'Has someone been bringing him food?' But Jesus said:

'My food is to do the will of the one who sent me, and to complete his work.

Have you not got a saying: Four months and then the harvest? Well, I tell you: Look around you, look at the fields; already they are white, ready for harvest! Already the reaper is being paid his wages, already he is bringing in the grain for eternal life, and thus sower and reaper rejoice together. For here the proverb holds good: one sows, another reaps;

I sent you to reap a harvest you had not worked for. Others worked for it; and you have come into the rewards of their trouble.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony when she said, 'He told me all I have ever done', so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.'
