Pastor's Word

Our deacons, meeting on May 26, made the decision to continue meeting for worship and other activities via Zoom through Sunday, August 2. That Sunday will be our annual Worship at Brookside Park together with First Christian Church and Ames UCC. This year, that will be a virtual service including our three churches, with the details still a little up in the air. At the deacons meeting in July, we will determine how to proceed in August and beyond.

Factors that went into this decision included the fact that the cases of COVID-19 are not declining in our area, CDC and public health guidelines, the number of persons aged 65+ in our congregation, the difficulties in ensuring social distancing in our building, concerns regarding singing in groups, and more. Essentially we have decided that continuing with Zoom services for now is preferable to other alternatives.

At the same time, we so miss being together. We would love to sit together, sing together, hug each other, and share food around tables. We look forward to the time when we can do that. We are called by God to care for one another and to love our neighbor, however, and at this point the best way to do that is by gathering virtually.

We recognize that when we do join together in person again, things will be different. Not everyone will be able to join us or feel comfortable meeting in person (and the fact is that not everyone was able to join us in person before.) When we do meet again in the sanctuary, we will continue to provide a way for those who are not physically present to connect to the service.

In the meantime, Pastor Dave and Moderator Jere Maddux will appoint a Re-Opening Committee to identify issues involved and make preparations for our return to the sanctuary. If you have questions, concerns or comments, please contact Pastor Dave or Jere.

While we would love to meet in person, our worship via Zoom has proven to a successful experiment. Despite the technical glitches, worship has been meaningful and we have found ways to make it participatory and even fun. It has been a joy to see many friends from out of town join us. We are having larger numbers in worship than we would ordinarily have; attendance is actually the highest it has been in many years. Who would have guessed?

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We are living through an exceptionally difficult time as our society faces multiple crises, all at once. Beyond facing a global pandemic and all of the resulting loss and disruption, the death of George Floyd at the hands of police has caused us to grieve and cry out for justice, reminding us yet again of the deeply ingrained racism in our nation. But the moment that we face can be a times of transformation, if we allow it. I have been heartened by those who are caring for neighbors in need in creative and compassionate ways. I have been encouraged by so many who are standing up against racism and injustice. I have been blessed by those who are seeking to be the hands and feet of Christ in this moment. As we remembered and celebrated on Pentecost, God is here and God's Spirit is at work. As difficult as this moment may be, I truly believe that our ministry as a church has never been more important.


Thank you for your continuing encouragement, understanding, commitment, and support for our church as we continue to serve through these uncertain days.

There are many programs in local churches and ABC agencies that serve marginalized communities especially hurt by the pandemic. Funds support these efforts, such as a food, housing, and healthcare ministries, including programs in our region.

Patricia Izbicki Named Associate Director of Music

We are delighted to announce that Dr. Patricia Izbicki has been named as Associate Director of Music at First Baptist. Patricia began with us in the fall of 2015 and has served as Choir Accompanist since then. That title did not adequately describe her musical contributions to our church. Besides her work with the choir, she has often served as accompanist for services in Director Mindy Phomvisay's absence, accompanied soloists and ensembles, played preludes, postludes, and other solo piano pieces, worked with campers at our Music Camp, and more. In past years, Patricia has been off over the summer while the choir took a break, but now that we are worshiping via Zoom, Patricia has served as the primary accompanist while Mindy serves as a vocalist and plays flute, along with Emma Phomvisay who has been a vocalist and violinist. The new title is more representative of Patricia's ministry.

Patricia received her Ph.D. in Neuroscience from Iowa State this spring (see last month's Spire for details). We are delighted that she will be with us for another year, as both Patricia and her fiancé, Andrew Zaman, have accepted positions as postdoctoral researchers, working with Elizabeth Stegemöller. We are proud of Patricia's accomplishments and look forward to her continued ministry with us.

Responding to the Pandemic: Meeting Needs in Ames and Beyond

The number of individuals and families in need in our community have increased as a result of COVID-19 and the accompanying economic disruptions. Our church supports Good Neighbor and Food at First through budgeted funds, and we have gone ahead and forwarded our annual support. If you would like to help support local organizations assisting those in need, here are some organizations our church partners with, along with addresses to send contributions.

COVID-19 EMERGENY FUND FOR STORY COUNTY IMMIGRANTS. Many immigrants are among the poorest of the poor in our community. Taxpayers who have an ITIN number rather than SSN are ineligible for the federal stimulus funds. Many immigrants are not eligible for unemployment, and in some cases for assistance from local agencies. The United Way brought together a group including congregations and local organizations to find ways to help the immigrant community during this pandemic. The result is an emergency fund that provides rent, utility, and other emergency assistance such as prescriptions. St. Cecilia Church has agreed to administrate this fund. GOOD NEIGHBOR EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE. Good Neighbor primarily offers rental and utility assistance, as well as food and gas vouchers. Our church was one of the founders of Good Neighbor and Julie Johnston represents us on the Good Neighbor board. FOOD AT FIRST. FAF, located at First Christian Church, offers a free meal to anyone in the community each day as well as a perishable free market. Because of the virus, meals are now packaged and distributed outside, rather than dine-in. This has increased costs, and the number of those in need has increased. Same, Same But Different by Jenny Sue Kostecki-Shaw

Elliot lives in America, and Kailash lives in India. They are pen pals. By exchanging letters and pictures, they learn that they both love to climb trees, have pets, and go to school. Their worlds might look different, but they are actually similar. Same, same. But different!
