Navy Captain Daniel E. Broadhurst relieved Navy Captain Janice G. Smith as Commodore of Norfolk-based Military Sealift Command Atlantic during a Change of Command Ceremony held aboard **USNS COMFORT** at Naval Station Norfolk, August 27, 2021.

RADM Michael A. Wettlauer, Guest Speaker for the COC Ceremony, outlined the short notice dispatch of the **USNS COMFORT** by President Trump to assist COVID-19 treatment in New York City. On the two-day trip, the ship's crew determined how to segment air flow between ship's compartments to prevent COVID's spread. The ship can manufacture its own oxygen and provided critical supply to area hospitals. As patients came aboard, the crew well-managed the mountainous recordkeeping. This was a first-ever management challenge that was efficiently handled.

Captain/Commodore Smith's duties were not solely to the **USNS COMFORT**. She was also over two fleet commanders and their ships. She is a mobilization and logistical expert. She initiated the first charter of offshore commercial vessels to support MSC ships and she was responsible for the commands very first ship-to-ship UNREP by UAV (unmanned air vehicles); the conception and execution of these activities were done under the leadership of CAPT Smith. Her new duty assignment is 1,000 yards away as the Chief of Staff for COMMSCLANT.

As CAPT/Commodore Donald E. Broadhurst, USN, assumes command of Norfolk based Military Sealift Command Atlantic, his duties will mirror those of his predecessor and Richmond Council extends their congratulations and best wishes.

THE ANCHOR OF HOPE

NAVY ESTABLISHES NEW MEDAL TO HONOR FALLEN CIVILIANS

Department of the Navy (DON) civilian employees who are killed or sustain serious injury through considerable personal sacrifice in the performance of their duties are now eligible to receive the Angela M. Houtz Medal for Fallen Civilians, said Mass Communication Specialist 1st Class Ford Williams in a release.

The award honors the fidelity and essential service of civilian employees who were killed or sustain serious injury in the performance of their official duties as a result of criminal act, natural disaster, terrorist act, or other circumstances as determined by the secretary of the Navy.

"While Department of the Navy civilians may not be on the front lines, they do face many of the same dangers as our uniformed personnel because of where they work and what they do," said Garry Newton, the deputy assistant secretary of the Navy for civilian personnel. "It was long past time to make it possible for commanders to fully recognize the service of all department personnel".

The medal is named for Angela M. Houtz, a DON intelligence analyst

who died during the terrorist attack on the Pentagon on September 11, 2001.

Team **GRAVELY** begins September with some cooler temperatures and a much-needed maintenance window. Additionally, the crew is participating in Fleet Synthetic Training ahead of COMPTUEX later this month. We continue to hone our warfighting edge through tactical training and material readiness!

The crew of **DDG-107** is also enjoying a several weeks in port allowing our Sailors some hard-earned time with family. Due to our compressed schedule, we have had to split our predeployment stand-down between September and November.

"I know we have been working really hard and I believe we have earned some white space," says Commander Odom, Captain of **USS GRAVELY**.

As we get deeper into September, we will shift focus from maintenance to becoming being operational as we embark on COMPTUEX beginning at the end of this month.

COMPTUEX, Composite Training Unit Exercise, is a rehearsal each US Navy Carrier Strike Group performs before departing for deployment. Each ship and aircraft in the battle group trains in its specialty; COMPTUEX brings ships together to project force as a battle group. COMPTUEX is an intermediate-level battle group exercise designed to forge together the battle group and its components into a fully functional fighting team. COMPTUEX is a critical part in the pre-deployment training cycle, and a prerequisite for the battle group's Joint Task Force Exercise.

For now, upgrades and repairs are happening around the ship helping **USS GRAVELY** maintain its excellence, as well as a material condition that is needed to enter and win the fight at hand!

The 56th Arleigh Burke-class guidedmissile destroyer, **USS GRAVELY** is homeported in Norfolk and named after Vice ADM Samuel Lee Gravely, Jr. ADM Gravely became the first African-American to command a U.S. Navy warship, the first African-American to command an American warship under combat conditions, the first African-American to command a major naval warship, the first African-American admiral, the first African-American to rise to the rank of vice admiral, and the first African-American to command a U.S. Fleet. ADM Gravely was highly decora-

Greetings from USCGC NORTHLAND ! The month of August has been very exciting for our crew as we continue our counter-drug mission in the Eastern Pacific Ocean. During the beginning of the month, NORTHLAND was hard at work patrolling in search of targets of interest as well as ensuring that the ship's company was completing required drills, maintenance, and training to earn new qualifications. I am happy to report that NORTHLAND has had two successful counternarcotics interdictions and assisted another ship with a third! Due to COVID concerns, our crew went 40 days without the chance to have liberty and get in touch with loved ones at home. But in mid-August. NORTHLAND's crew was able to enjoy a long-awaited port call in Golfito, Costa Rica. The port call gave the crew the opportunity to catch up on some much-needed rest, resupply the cutter with food and fuel, and have some fun. Crewmembers took advantage of the coastal town's hospitality as we restocked on snacks, enjoyed local restaurants, and adventured on waterfall tours. It was a tremendous opportunity for the crew to experience the culture of one of our partner nations.

Shortly after departing our port call, **NORTHLAND** was diverted to a request for assistance from a Costa Rican fishing vessel that had caught fire hundreds of miles offshore. The cutter steamed through the night towards the last known position of the fishing vessel as our crew prepared to render assistance. In the early morning hours of the next day, **NORTHLAND** launched our embarked helicopter to search for the vessel in distress. Not long after launching, the helicopter located the fishing vessel on fire with three people still onboard, huddled on the bow. The helicopter guided in **NORTHLAND's** small boat team, who safely rescued the three-fisherman onboard and escorted them to the safety of a Good Samaritan cargo vessel. While search and rescue is not the main purpose of our current patrol, the crew was excited for the opportunity to help mariners in peril – the trademark mission of the U.S. Coast Guard!

While in pursuit of another case, **NORTHLAND** was fortunate to sail far enough south to cross the Equator. The uncommon crossing of a major demarcation line, like the Equator, is a first for many aboard the cutter. Crewmembers now have the opportunity to participate in a "Line-Crossing Ceremony", to earn the coveted Order of the Shellback certificate. Accomplishments like this enhance the pride and esprit de corps for our crew, while serving at sea, far from the comforts of home.

As we near the month of September, **NORTHLAND's** crew has begun preparations for our northbound transit of the Panama Canal, offload of contraband on the way home, and the conclusion of our patrol with returning to home port. The crew is excited to return home to family and loved ones and share sea stories of our busy patrol. As always, thank you for the support! Fair Winds and Following Seas!

NEWS RELEASE: COAST GUARD RESCUES 3 FROM BOAT FIRE 150 MILES SOUTH OF COSTA RICA

The Coast Guard rescued three people after their boat caught fire approximately 150 miles south of Golfito, Costa Rica.

Three mariners abandoned the boat and were clinging to a buoy in the water while maintaining communications with the vessel administrator via satellite phone.

NORTHLAND crew dispatched their MH-65 Dolphin helicopter crew at 4 AM to search to search for the crew of the Baula X and located the marines at their last known position.

Once on scene, **NORTHLAND** launched their 26-foot Over-the-Horizon small boat crew who retrieved all three mariners at 5:40 AM and transferred them in good condition to the AMVER vessel Avra GR.

The AMVER system, sponsored by the Coast Guard, is a unique, computer based and voluntary global ship reporting system used worldwide by search and rescue authorities to arrange for assistance to people in distress at sea.
