Stewardship: Making the Most of Every Opportunity

"Be very careful, then, how you live...making the most of time because the days are evil."

Ephesians 5:15-16

ime is a remarkable gift from God. The pages of our personal planners and dates on our phones represent the moments God has entrusted to our care. But how should we use them? We can fill those moments in an almost limitless variety of ways.

Paul reminds us that the very nature of our world discourages our stewardship of time. "The days are evil," he writes. And because evil seems so powerful in our world, we are tempted to despair of making a real



difference. The author E. B. White once said, "When I get up in the morning I am torn between saving the world and enjoying the world. This makes it very difficult to plan my day."

He's right. Saving the world seems an impossible task. What difference will our little acts of goodness make in the overall scheme of things? No wonder so many people today allow time to run through their fingers like sand on the seashore. We pursue meaningless activities that kill time and the possibilities it presents.



Paul challenges us to be stewards of time, making the most of our opportunities. Paul understands that because of Christ's victory on the cross,

time is redeemed. Our efforts to use time in ways that make a difference for the kingdom of God will not be wasted. God will establish our work through the power of his grace.

But then, should we go from one extreme to the other? Does seizing every opportunity mean we can never relax, never have a moment for ourselves, never take time to "smell the roses?" Is Paul calling us to become workaholics for the kingdom of God?

No! Here in these verses, Paul sets our use of time against an invitation to worship God. In so doing, he

reminds us that using our time well is set against the backdrop of God's divinely established rhythm for life. Early in Israel's history, God set a pattern for us. "Six days you shall labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God" (Ex. 20:9-10). God's "six and one" pattern reminds us that we do not live by work alone. Not even God's kingdom comes about by our work alone. Rather, our times are in God's hand. God's grace working through us makes a difference—not only for today but for eternity.

The Order of the Daughters of the King® is an order for women who are communicants of the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran (ELCA) and Roman Catholic churches.



Reaffirming the promises made at Baptism and Confirmation, a Daughter pledges herself to a life-long program of prayer, service and evangelism. She receives support in this commitment from a worldwide

community of like-minded women.

In solidarity with one another, all Daughters everywhere make the same promises upon their admission to the Order:

- To obey the two Rules of The Order: the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service.
- To offer at all times loyal aid to our clergy and parish to spread Christ's kingdom.
- To wear faithfully the cross of The Order.
- To work for the purposes of The Order as God may give us the opportunity.

No special spiritual attributes are needed to become a Daughter of the King – only a sincere desire to draw nearer to God, and to help others do the same. We are women living a Rule of Prayer and Service to our neighbors. Parishioners can look to us for love and help in time of need or loneliness. We seek to walk with God as our guide and try to draw those with whom we come in contact into the church. We are women who work to spread Christ's Kingdom here on earth. We can never forget that prayer is the foundation from which our service grows.

<u>The National Study Guide</u> is designed to help women prayerfully discern a call to become a member of The Order of the Daughters of the King®. It serves as the official preparation for prospective members, introduces the Order's Rules of Prayer and Service, establishes an understanding of the Order, and serves as a review for current members of the Order. Through the preparation period we hope prospective members prayerfully decide to become Daughters of the King and realize the importance of the commitment they are about to make. Most importantly, we hope it will develop and strengthen their relationship with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

January's Wacky Holiday: January 4th, National Spaghetti Day



Today is **National Spaghetti Day**. Grab a big bowl, fill it with spaghetti, top it with a generous helping of your favorite sauce, and dig in. And, don't forget the meatballs and parmesan Cheese!

Spaghetti is one of over 600 shapes of pasta. It is by far, the most popular shape. Many people think of Italy and Italian Cuisine, as the birthplace of spaghetti. In reality, pasta – or macaroni – dates back to ancient times. Ancient Cultures were cooking pasta noodles well before they were introduced to Italy and other parts of Europe.

Marco Polo has been erroneously credited with bringing spaghetti and pastas to Europe. But, records show Europeans cooking pasta well before Polo began his travels. In fact, Arab cultures were selling dried spaghetti-like noodles in open markets in the early 1200's. The Chinese were cooking pasta noodles as far back as 5,000 B.C.

While ancient cultures were making and eating spaghetti and other pastas well before it came to Europe, it's the Italians who popularized it in cuisines. It was introduced into the United States through the travels of Thomas Jefferson, who brought it back from Naples, Italy in 1789. Italian immigrants also brought it over with them to the U.S., where its popularity quickly spread.

Spaghetti in Italian means thin string. Did you Know? Americans consume about 20 lbs. of pasta per person per year.

We hope you thoroughly enjoy your bowl of Spaghetti today. To more completely enjoy this special day, make the spaghetti noodles yourself. It's a cinch. All you need is flour, water and a pasta maker.
