However, major denominations have accepted work done at Liberty in satisfying the academic requirements for licensing and ordination.

library privileges may be suspended for a set amount of time or terminated permanently.

Four Levels of Training

1. **Audit.** Any student of the Bullock Bible Institute and College is welcomed to sit in any class offered, with the exception of MasterLife, Living Victorious in Christ, Rapha and Relational Wholeness. This is due to the sensitivity of the topics discussed in these classes. The student is not required to do any work, thus the student will not receive any grade or recognition for taking the course.
2. **Special Education.** This level is offered for students who have problems in learning and understanding. By consulting with the Dean of Students or Academic Dean, the students will be given a plan of study. Upon completing the requirements given, the students will be eligible to participate in graduation ceremonies.
3. **Institute Level.** All students in the institute level are required to attend class, take notes, complete the syllabus/workbook for the course and take all examinations.
4. **College Level.** These students will be required to do the same as the student who are enrolled in the institute level. In addition, they will also be required to complete the Course Enhancement Procedures (CEP) assignment for the course. All essays and book reports for this level will be typed.

Withdrawal or Status Change

College students may change to audit status or institute status through week seven of the semester. An institute student may change to college status at any time. For the classes that have been completed on institute level, arrangements with the Academic Dean or one of his designated workers must be made to complete all CEP requirements for any course.

Students may withdraw from individual classes or from the school for personal or academic reasons through week seven without grade penalty, receiving a W (withdrawal) grade. Withdrawals after week seven will require approval from the Dean of Students or Academic Dean. Students who withdraw after week seven with approval will receive a W grade. Students who withdraw after week seven without approval will

receive a WF grade (withdrawal/failing). Students required to withdraw for disciplinary reasons will receive a W grade for all classes in progress.

The student will be required to re-register for the course(s) that they received a W or WF when they return to school. Exceptions to this policy must be approved by the Dean of Students or Academic Dean.

Class Load

Any student at the Bullock Bible Institute and College must receive permission from the Dean of Students or Academic Dean to be active in more than 5 classes per semester.

ACADEMIC POLICIES

Academic Records

The Bullock Bible Institute and College adheres to ethical principles for confidentiality of student records. No student records will be given to a third party without the consent of said student, unless otherwise specified by law(s) or institutional policies.

Academic Load

For a student to be considered full-time the student must be enrolled in three classes, with each class being at least a 3-semester hour course, or a total of 9 semester hours. If a person is active in Programmed Education,

Laubach or Remedial Services, this may be used as class requirement(s). Part-time status is anything less than 3 classes or 9 semester hours.

Required Class Time

Each semester is 16 weeks long, with an additional four weeks added as a grace period to complete any unfinished projects. Classes in the Bullock Bible Institute and College Complex are available from Wednesday through Sunday. Some are in a classroom setting as well as designated areas for individual studies. The following requirements pertain to class scheduling:

1. All students must attend all classes. If the student is enrolled in tape studies, the student must spend a minimum of two hours per week, per class, listening to the tapes. Programmed Education and Remedial Services students must attend one class per week. Laubach students must attend two classes per week.
3. Grades are based upon the completion of course requirements which includes class attendance.

4. In the event of an extraneous circumstance, provisions can be made to make up the time missed.
5. If the student is sick, or misses a class/tape period due to extraneous circumstances, the instructor or proctor needs to be notified so the absence will not be held against the student.

Bullock Bible Institute and College has an 8 point grading system. For a student to pass a college level class, that student must at least have an overall 77 (C-) average. For a student to pass an institute level class, that student must at least have an overall 69 (D-) average.

Student Responsibilities

Every student of Bullock Bible Institute and College is expected to become familiar with the published undergraduate catalog and to consult with academic advisors provided by the Dean of Students or Academic Dean.

Each student is responsible for selecting and registering for the courses needed towards the desired degree. Course catalogs will be provided by Student Services for the student to review.

Tardiness and Absenteeism

Attendance is the student's responsibility. Attendance for each class is monitored by the instructor. Students are personally responsible for attending all enrolled classes, completing all assigned work, and taking all examinations. Students may be subject to school disciplinary action for failure to attend classes or for excessive absences.

A student will receive a failing grade if total absence times exceeds one-eighth of a term, as outlined below:

If a student misses more than 1 class period in a 1 semester hour course, 2 class periods in a 2 semester hour course, or 3 class periods in a 3 semester hour course, the student will fail the course.

Absences and tardiness due to extraneous circumstances may not be held against the student.

Make-Up Procedure

If a student misses a class, the student will need to meet with the instructor and make arrangements to make up any missed assignments or exams. Some classes are taped and the instructor may erase the absence once the student listens to the tape.

The student who misses a tape period will need to make that time up. Arrangements for making up a missed class need to be made with the class instructor or proctor.

A student who misses his weekly Programmed Education class may make up the absence. The student will need to contact the Programmed Education Coordinator and make arrangements for this.

Library Times

The Bullock Bible Institute and College library times for college materials are as follows:

Appeal Process

1. A student may submit a written appeal for any non-academic dismissal to the Dean of Students within 24 hours. The appeal must include written, detailed documentation verifying the student's circumstances. The Dean of Students, Academic Dean or the Education Director will process all appeals and determine re-enrollment requirements, if applicable.
2. If re-enrollment requirements, where applicable, are successfully completed, the student may be allowed to re-enroll following an interview with the Dean of Students or Academic Dean who will make the final decision on re-enrollment after dismissal.
3. All final decisions will be put in a written memorandum and placed in the student's education file.

Scheduling an Appointment

Any student wishing to see the Dean of Students or Academic Dean must report to the administration office during normal business hours. The secretary on duty will provide the form(s) necessary to request a meeting with the Dean of Students or Academic Dean. Priority will be given according to time available and nature of the request.

Any student wishing to see the Education Director can report to said office during normal business hours. Walk-ins are accepted, but please be mindful of the workload assigned to the Education Director.

Spiritual Life

An important characteristic of the Bullock Bible Institute and College Program is the emphasis placed on each student's spiritual accountability. Since Jesus Christ is our Savior and Lord, and we are members of His body, we acknowledge His dominion over our lives, to use as He desires. We are accountable to the Lord, to the authority He has placed over us and to one another for our spiritual development.

Activities which encourage individual student development as Ambassadors of Christ and corporate development as members of the school community include daily communion with God through prayer and

reading His Word, regular church attendance, and Christian ministry opportunities.

Personal Devotion & Church Attendance

All students are encouraged to establish a daily quiet time to seek God and find refreshing in Him. This time should include prayer and the study of His Word. All active students should attend and be active in weekly services of their faith. This includes religious services and prayer meetings. Weekly prayer meeting times at Bullock Bible Institute and College are as follows:

Tuesday	5:00-7:00pm
Tuesday	7:00-9:00pm
Thursday	5:00-7:00pm
Friday	11:00-1:00pm

Weekly communion services are held every Saturday morning at 11:00am in the main sanctuary. This time is set apart to bring words of encouragement and words to inspire a personal hunger for the Lord. This service concludes with communion. Each student is recommended to take part in this service.

Special Services

About once a month, the Dean of Students will have a mandatory service for all students with a special guest speaker. Past speakers have been Suzette Hattingh, Steve Hill, Dr. Michael Brown, Lila Terhune and Ray Baker.

Special Seminars

Between semesters, the Dean of Students will provide a special seminary that is designed to inspire a spiritual hunger for the students and help promote spiritual maturity in the student.

Crusades

Several times throughout the year, different ministries will come and lead evangelistic services in the main sanctuary. All students are encouraged to attend these services for times of spiritual refreshing.

PROGRAMMED EDUCATION

Overview

Programmed Education is designed to get the student involved in a systematic study of the Word of God. It also provides the student with the tools needed to be active in one-on-one

evangelism, as well as strengthening their own faith in God.

Programmed Education is a prerequisite for the Liberty Division of the Bullock Bible Institute and College. The enrollment in this program, remaining active, and the completion is noted in your school file.

Christian Basic Series (CBS)

In an effort to give all students the chance to understand the fundamentals of Christian living, and get the most from God's Word, the Christian Basic Series (CBS) will be the initial requirement of the student. Upon enrollment in Programmed Education, the student will be given the CBS workbook to complete. The student will have 12 weeks to complete this book and will be required to turn in the completed book no later than the end of the 12-week period. During this 12-week period, the student will be required to attend the CBS class that is offered weekly. The schedule for CBS is as follows:

Saturday 5:00-7:00pm

Once the student has met all requirements for CBS, they will receive a certificate of completion.

Active Status

To remain in Active Status, the student must:

1. Complete all requirements for CBS.
2. Upon completion of CBS, the student will be required to attend a minimum of one and a half (1 ½) hours per week in Programmed Education and complete at least one (1) book a month.

3. Failure to meet these requirements will result in being placed in the inactive status. To return to active status, the student will be required to meet with the Programmed Education Coordinator. If necessary, final inquiry may be made to either the Dean of Students or Academic Dean.

All students must complete all memory work and must have a Programmed Education assistant initial the memory work prior to turning in the workbook. We encourage the student to memorize those verses and repeat them from memory. However, you may read the verse to the worker three (3) times. It is up to the student to do their memory work. Failure in doing so will result in a loss of three (3) points for each verse not initialed.

If so requested, when the workbook has been graded, it will be returned to the student for review. Any questions concerning the grade must first be directed to the person who graded the workbook. If there are still questions, the student may discuss those with the Programmed Education Coordinator. If necessary, final inquiry may be made to either the Dean of Students or Academic Dean. This decision will be final.

Under no circumstances may a student keep a graded workbook in their possession. If anyone is caught with a graded book in their possession, they will be subject to disciplinary action. See the Programmed Education Coordinator for more information on this.

Before the student can graduate, there must not be any missed classes and all books must be satisfactorily completed. To make up any missed classes, see the Programmed Education Coordinator on this procedure.

There are designated times throughout the week that Programmed workbooks may be exchanged. Also, there are times that the student may make-up any hours that they have missed. See the Programmed Education Coordinator for those times.

A comprehensive chapter by chapter study of the Gospel of Matthew, chapters 15-28.

Gospel of Mark

This is a comprehensive chapter by chapter study of the Gospel according to Mark.

Gospel of Luke I

A comprehensive chapter by chapter study of the Gospel of Luke, 1-12.

Gospel of Luke II

A comprehensive chapter by chapter study of the Gospel of Luke 13-24.

Advanced Studies

Bible Prophecy

Covers the Rapture, Tribulation, Armageddon, Return of Christ and Millennium.

Divine Healing

Thoroughly explains the Scriptural basis for divine healing.

Personal Evangelism

A convincing study of the necessity of obeying the call to witness for Christ.

Holy Spirit

An overall view of the work and ministry of the Holy Spirit in both the Old and New Testament.

Christian Living II

Covers tithing, commitment to the local church, love of the brethren, respecting church leadership, obedience and prayer.

Romans I

The Apostle Paul lays the doctrinal foundation of the Christian faith.

Romans II

The sovereignty of God and practical Christianity is presented.

Genesis

Chapter by chapter study with spiritual applications for the believer.

Exodus

The account of Israel's exodus from Egypt giving insight into the types and shadows of Christ's redemptive work.

Hebrew Law I

A thorough study of types and shadows in Jewish laws and the Tabernacle.

Hebrew Law II

The offerings and yearly feasts of Israel with chart and clear New Testament application.

Hebrew Law III

The glorious priesthood of all believers shown through a study of the priests and Levites of Israel.

Numbers

A comprehensive chapter by chapter study of the entire book.

Deuteronomy

A comprehensive chapter by chapter study of the entire book.

Isaiah I

Denunciation of Israel, Judah, and other nations: numerous prophecies concerning the Messiah and the coming kingdom.

Isaiah II

Contains messages of consolation and further prophecies of the coming Messiah.

Daniel

A clear study of each chapter emphasizing important prophecies; including a chart on Daniel's "70 Weeks".

Revelation

A complete study of the end-time events of human history; including charts.

Entering Into the Promised

A devotional study introducing the book of Joshua.

Minor Prophets I

A chapter by chapter study of the prophets Hosea and Joel during their period of Israel's history.

These studies cover the lives of Samuel the prophet and Saul the first king of Israel, with spiritual applications.

Judges

God's repeated deliverance of Israel during a time of increasing national apostasy; heroes of faith provide examples for all believers.

Psalms I

Explains the characteristics of Hebrew poetry; covers the psalms of devotion and the Imprecatory psalms.

Psalms II

The Messianic psalms.

Psalms III

Covers penitential psalms, psalms of worship, praise and adoration, and historical psalms.

Psalms is a three-part survey that deals with the main themes of this beautiful portion of Scripture.

Ecclesiastes I

Chapters 1-6.

Ecclesiastes II

Chapters 7-12.

This is a comprehensive study of one of the Old Testament books of wisdom, which emphasizes the spiritual principles discovered by Solomon in his search for true reality.

Christian Living III

Deals with topics which help to inspire continued growth and maturity in Christ: who we are in Christ, our victory, spiritual warfare, the will of God, and others.

The Christian Family I

The Family Unit.

The Christian Family II

Parents and Leaders.

The Christian Family III

Husbands and Fathers.

The Christian Family IV

Wives and Mothers.

The Christian Family V

Sons and Daughters.

This is a five-part comprehensive study of scriptural principles that relate to the foundation of the family and its relationships. It deals with the responsibilities and relationships of the family, parents and leaders, husbands and fathers, wives and mothers, sons and daughters.

Biblical Prayers I

An in-depth study of spiritual principles relating to effective prayer, with biblical examples.

Biblical Prayers II

A continuation of an in-depth study on how to pray more effectively, with examples from the Bible.

Stewardship

Covers stewards of God throughout the Old and New Testament.

Christian Living IV

Covers a Christian growing in Christ. The main theme covered is faithfulness to Christ.

Christian Living V

Covers how men of the Bible went through trying times and still served the Lord. Gives an example of how we should go through trying times.

A certificate is given for the completion of each workbook. Upon completion of the Basic Studies section, you will also receive a certificate of completion. When you have completed all books and your required attendance hours have been met, you will be eligible for graduation.

Doctrine Statement

THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Old and New Testaments are verbally inspired by God and are inerrant in the original writings. Through the providence of God, the Scriptures have been preserved and are the supreme and final and adequate authority in faith and life.

GOD

We believe that there is only one true and living God, existing in three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—each a distinct Person, but all on one essence and having the same nature, perfections, and attributes. Each is worthy of precisely the same worship, confidence, and obedience.

JESUS CHRIST

We believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, begotten by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, shed His blood on Calvary as a vicarious substitute, was buried, rose again bodily, and ascended to the Father according to the Scriptures. We believe that He is fully divine and fully human.

HOLY SPIRIT

We believe the Holy Spirit to be the third Person of the Trinity whose purpose in the redemption of man is to convict of sin, regenerate the repentant believer, guide the believer in all truth, indwell and give gifts to believers as He will, that they may minister as Christ would to men. We believe that the manifestations of the Holy Spirit recorded in 1 Corinthians 12:8-11 shall operate in present-day churches which yield to the Lord Jesus Christ (Luke 11:13; John 7:27-29; 14:16-17; 16:7-14; Acts 2:39-48).

CREATION

We believe the triune God created the universe apart from pre-existing materials and without any evolutionary process. We believe in the historicity of the first eleven chapters of Genesis.

MAN

We believe that man is the direct creation of God—body, soul, and spirit—and is not in any sense the result of evolution but it made in the image and likeness of God. When the first man Adam sinned, he brought sin into the human races. As a consequence all men since are born as sinners, lost, undone, without hope, and without God (Romans 3:19-23; Galatians 3:22; Ephesians 2:1-12).

SALVATION

We believe that the terms of salvation are repentance from sin, and a personal, heartfelt faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, which results in regeneration of the person. This salvation is entirely by the grace of our Lord and not of works. Works are excluded except as fruit of salvation (Acts 3:19-30; Romans 4:1-5; 5:1; Ephesians 2:8-10).

ASCENSION

We believe that Christ Jesus ascended to the Father and is preparing a place for believers and interceding for the saints (John 14:3; Romans 8:34).

SECOND COMING

We believe in the visible, bodily return of Christ Jesus to this earth to rapture His Church (Bride) and judge the world (Acts 1:10-11; 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18; 2 Thessalonians 1:7-10; James 5:8; Revelation 1:7). It is not necessary that we all believe alike concerning the relationship of His coming to either the Great Tribulation or to the Millennium.

HEAVEN AND HELL

We believe that Scriptures clearly set forth the doctrines of eternal punishment for the lost and eternal bliss and service for the saved—hell for the unsaved, heaven for the saved (Matthew 25:34, 41, 46; Luke 6:19-31; John 14:1-3; Revelation 20:11-15).

THE LOCAL CHURCH

We believe that the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ is a body of believers who have been baptized in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; who are under recognized, delegated authorities; and who assemble to

BI1350 Life and Ministry of Paul

3 Semester Hours

A detailed study of the Apostle Paul (from Acts and the Epistles), focusing on (1) the development and fulfillment of Paul's life and ministry as a model for our lives; and (2) Paul's three missionary trips, with emphasis on the function of apostolic teams for church planting and regional evangelism.

BI1351 Early Pauline Epistles

3 Semester Hours

An exegetical and expositional study of Romans, I and II Corinthians, I and II Thessalonians, and Galatians. While Romans and the Corinthian Epistles are a part of the Early Pauline Epistles, and will be surveyed in this course, they are also a course of their own.

BI1352 Prison Epistles

3 Semester Hours

This course is a study of the Prison Epistles: Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. It focuses on the person of Jesus Christ, the results of the believer's relationship with Him, and the way in which this relationship should influence daily living.

BI1353 Pastoral Epistles

3 Semester Hours

An exegetical and expositional study of I and II Timothy, and Titus. Attention is given to the organization, development, and protection of the local church. Care is given to relevant application to the student's life during the study.

BI1354 Corinthian Letters

3 Semester Hours

An exegetical and expositional study of I and II Corinthians. This course covers the doctrinal statements and practical living applications from these passages.

BI1355 Romans

3 Semester Hours

Consists of an exegetical and expositional study of Romans through examining Paul's doctrinal treatise on the doctrine of salvation, relevant issues of condemnation, justification, sanctification, and practical Christian living are discussed.

BI1360 The Message of Acts

3 Semester Hours

A study of the spread of the first century church with emphasis upon the ministries of Peter in Jerusalem and Paul to the Gentile world.

BI1361 General Epistles

3 Semester Hours

An exegetical and expositional study of the books of James, I and II Peter, I, II, III John and Jude. It is designed to give the student an insight on the subject of Christian maturity and growth in God's grace.

NT2222 Pauline Epistles

2 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give the student a look into the life and ministry of the Apostle Paul and his writings that cover most of the New Testament.

NT2230 Hebrews

2 Semester Hours

The main themes of the Epistle of Hebrews is given to help the student see more clearly its relationship to the Old Testament and the pattern of its development. Historical information on the background of the book gives an understanding of its warnings and exhortations.

NT2250 Revelations

2 Semester Hours

Consists of a detailed exegetical and expositional study of the Book of Revelation from the different tribulation and millennial perspective with the various alternative approaches of study and problem passages are discussed.

OT3210 Genesis

2 Semester Hours

How did the world come into existence? What is man? For what purpose do we exist? How did evil come into the world? These and many other difficult questions will be discussed in class. This course traces the thread of God's plan of redemption from His beginning promise in Eden to the formation of God's chosen people through whom this plan would be realized.

OT3220 Prelude to the Promised Land

2 Semester Hours

Just before the children of Israel was to cross the Jordan River into the Promised Land, Moses gave

BC1313 Building Stronger Families

3 Semester Hours

Divorce rates are on the rise. This course is designed to help the Christian counselor deal with issues that are causing so many break-ups and give insight on how to help families be firmly bonded.

BC1314 Building Self-Esteem and Self-Control

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the Christian Counselor help the person struggling with low self-esteem and also having problems allowing outside issues to control their behavior.

BC2310 An Overview of Christian Counseling and Psychology

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give an understanding of Christian Counseling and Psychiatry, with comparing and contrasting.

BC2311 Traits of a Christian Counselor

3 Semester Hours

What is a Christian counselor? What is the difference between a Christian counselor and a secular counselor? This course is designed to help the Christian who has a desire to be used by God in the ministry of counseling.

BC2312 Counseling Hurting Parents

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give the student an understanding of Christian counseling and issues that parents face and how to respond appropriately.

BC2313 Counseling and Substance Abuse

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give an understanding of Christian counseling and issues pertaining to substance abuse addiction.

BC2314 Handling Crisis

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give an understanding of Christian counseling and issues pertaining to crisis management.

BC2315 Handling the Pains of Family Violence

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give the Christian counselor an understanding of the different issues that

are plaguing the family today and how to minister to the victims of family violence.

BC2320 Helping the Sick and Grieving

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the Christian counselor to minister to those who have a terminal illness, and how they cope with the different phases of their illness. It is also designed to help the family as they face these issues.

BC2321 Helping Children and Teenagers

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help children and adolescents who have issues with the peer pressures that they face. It is also designed to help the counselor minister to the parents as they attempt to raise their children using Biblical principles.

BC2330 Managing Stress and Anxiety

3 Semester Hours

With the fast pace that society experiences today, many face issues of being stressed out. This course is designed to help the Christian counselor to recognize these problems and help those who face these issues.

BC2331 Marital Stress, Infidelity and Divorce

3 Semester Hours

Satan has invaded our airwaves with lust, adultery and the usage of sex in the entertainment industry. Because of this invasion, many families face problems of unfaithfulness and "growing apart." This course is designed to help the Christian counselor to minister to the spouses who are in the process of separating.

BC2340 Overcoming a Painful Past

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help those who have experienced problems of past abuse. In this course, the Christian counselor will receive instruction on how to recognize the problems and what to do spiritually and legally if necessary.

BC4210 People Helping in the Future

2 Semester Hours

God cares deeply for us, calls us to Himself, and desires to work through us to offer His message of hope to others. In this course, you will be introduced to the tough issues that pain today's generation, the

CHURCH HISTORY

CH1310 Survey of Church History

3 Semester Hours

A quick study of the Church from its inception in New Testament times to the present. This course divides church history into various significant periods so that the student will have a structure on which to hang the many details of a historical period this long.

▪ General Education - English ▪

EN0301 English Grammar I

3 Semester Hours

A course designed to help the student receive a basic refresher of the basics of English grammar and writing skills.

EN0302 English Grammar II

3 Semester Hours

A continuation of EN 0301, English Grammar I.

EN1301 English Composition I

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to develop skills in expressive and expository writing, and in critical reading. This course provides the instruction and practice of writing compositions to help develop the analytical and critical reading skills and basic reference and documentation skills in the composition process.

EN1302 English Composition II

3 Semester Hours

A continuation of English Composition I. This course is designed to develop skills in reading, analyzing, and writing from research. The student will receive instruction and practice in library usage during this semester of English composition.

▪ General Education - History ▪

HY1301 Western Civilization I

3 Semester Hours

This course is a survey of social, intellectual, economic, and political developments, which have molded the modern western world. This course covers

the ancient and medieval periods and concludes in the era of the Renaissance and Reformation.

HY1302 Western Civilization II

3 Semester Hours

This course is a continuation of HY 1301, Western Civilization I. It surveys the development of the modern western world from the era of the Renaissance and Reformation to the present.

HY1303 Western Civilization III

3 Semester Hours

This course is a continuation of HY 1302, Western Civilization II. It continues the surveys and the development of the modern western world from the era of the Renaissance and Reformation to the present.

HY1310 American History

3 Semester Hours

This course provides a lucid picture into factors that enabled the United States to become the largest, wealthiest, and most powerful democratic republic in history.

HY1311 American Civil War

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to examine the Civil War of the United States from both sides of the battle lines.

HY1312 America: Democratic Republic to Empire (WWII)

3 Semester Hours

This course examines the greatest conflict in human history, the Second World War.

HY1313 History of Freedom

3 Semester Hours

This course examines what it really means to be free and the process through history that has enabled the freedom of so many and equal rights.

HY1320 The Art of Command

3 Semester Hours

This course examines Robert E. Lee's leadership during the Civil War and that of his principle subordinates such as Stonewall Jackson and James Longstreet.

deduction and induction, quantification theory, fallacies, and procedures for testing validity.

▪ General Education - Government ▪

PS1301 United States Government

3 Semester Hours

This course surveys the background, constitutional principles, organization, and operation of the American political system. Upon completion, the student should be able to identify and explain relationships among the basic elements of American government and functions as more informed participants of the American political system.

▪ General Education - Psychology ▪

PY2300 General Psychology

3 Semester Hours

This course is a survey of behavior with an emphasis on psychological processes. This course includes the biological bases of behavior, thinking emotion, motivation, and the nature and development of personality.

▪ General Education - Sociology ▪

SO2300 Introduction to Sociology

3 Semester Hours

This course is an introduction to vocabulary, concepts, and theory of sociological perspectives of human behavior.

▪ General Education - Speech ▪

SP1300 Fundamentals of Public Speaking

3 Semester Hours

This course explores principles of audience and environment analysis as well as the actual planning, rehearsing, and pre-analysis as well as the actual planning, rehearsing, and presenting of formal speeches to specific audiences. Historical foundations, communication theories and student performances are emphasized.

LANGUAGES

LN0305 Basic Sign Language

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help a person to communicate with a deaf person through an Exact Sign Language (ESL) curriculum.

LN3301 Spanish I

3 Semester Hours

This course provides an introduction to the Spanish language. Topics include the development of basic communication skills and the acquisition of basic knowledge of the cultures in Spanish.

LN3302 Spanish II

3 Semester Hours

This continuation course includes the development of basic communication skills and the acquisition of basic knowledge of the cultures in Spanish-speaking areas.

LN3303 Spanish III

3 Semester Hours

This continuation course includes the development of basic communication skills and the acquisition of basic knowledge of the cultures in Spanish-speaking areas.

LN3304 Spanish IV

3 Semester Hours

This continuation course includes the development of basic communication skills and the acquisition of basic knowledge of the cultures in Spanish-speaking areas.

LN3320 Basic German Grammar I

3 Semester Hours

This course includes the development of basic communication skills and the acquisition of basic knowledge of the German language.

LIFE SKILLS

LS0110 Survival Kit

1 Semester Hour

A self-help workbook designed to help new and growing Christians understand and deal with conflicts between old and new patterns of thoughts and habits. It is recommended that this course be done in conjunction with RS 0342, MasterLife, Part II.

LS0323 Leadership in the Family

3 Semester Hours

The materials used in this course are the sermons and teachings from the Thomas Road Baptist Church during the Super Conference with Focus on the Family.

LS0330 PrayerLife

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the student to pray experientially. This course is based on the prayers of the Bible and examines the biblical forms of prayer, the nature of God who responds to prayer, and the church at prayer.

LS0340 Basic Life Principles

3 Semester Hours

An overview of various aspects of Biblical principles in our everyday life as we look at ourselves. This course is designed for the student to get back to the "basics of Christian living."

LS0341 MasterLife, Part 1

3 Semester Hours

MasterLife is a four book series by Avery T. Willis that guides both the new and experienced believers to develop a lifelong obedient relationship with Jesus Christ. MasterLife I uses the first two books of this series: MasterLife 1 — The Disciple's Cross and MasterLife 2 — The Disciple's Personality.

LS0342 MasterLife, Part 2

3 Semester Hours

This is a continuance on the four book series by Avery T. Willis. MasterLife 3 — The Disciple's Victory and MasterLife 4 — The Disciple's Mission are the books used in this course.

LS0360 Career Direct

3 Semester Hours

Many people have jobs and earn a weekly paycheck. However, there is no future or they may not be happy doing what they do. This course is designed to help the student look at what area they would be successful in, and then the tools to accomplish it.

LS0361 Job Skills Prep

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the person receive the proper job skills necessary to be able to advance in their work place.

LS0362 Peace Maker

3 Semester Hours

This class is a self-help challenge focusing on dealing with everyday problems and stress that one deals with in their life. It shows the student how to handle these problems by means of Christian Principles.

LS1321 Christian Marriage and the Family

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give the student an insight of the family structure and families in a modern society using Biblical principles and applications that are relevant to success in a Godly marriage and family life.

LS1324 Christian Financial Concepts

3 Semester Hours

This study is designed to present a lifestyle in stewardship in today's society. Through this study, the student will learn how to adjust their goals and spending plans to accommodate change such as loss of job, salary increases, or other aspects of personal financial situations.

PRACTICAL MINISTRY**PM0319 Laws of Teamwork**

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the leadership of any organization be able to work together for the common good.

PM1200 Principles of Prayer

2 Semester Hours

This course is designed to give the student an overview of the different aspects of prayer in the believer's life. Private prayer, corporate prayer, intercessory prayer, family devotion and the Lord's Prayer are some of the topics discussed in this course.

PM1201 Intercessory Prayer

2 Semester Hours

What does it mean to pray for another? What does it mean to travail in prayer before the Lord for a lost loved one or a lost country? In this course the student learns what it means to have a burden for prayer from the Lord.

PM1260 Biblical Discipleship

2 Semester Hours

Jesus' method of disciplining is thoroughly explored with an application that helps the student form disciplining relationships in their ministry.

PM4300 Spiritual Leadership

3 Semester Hours

Many students are interested in leadership for the church today and may feel the call of God upon their lives to preach and minister the gospel. This course is designed to increase the student's knowledge of the theoretical aspects of leadership and of administrative roles. It also presents practical applications in the local church situation.

PM1310 Mentoring Methodology

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to train the student on the appropriate techniques to mentoring on a one-on-one basis, or in a group setting.

PM2311 Spiritual Authority of Leadership

3 Semester Hours

The Word of God tells us to submit to those who are in authority over us. As leaders, we are to submit to those who are over us in the secular world as well as the spiritual authority of God.

PM2312 The Making of a Leader I

3 Semester Hours

This course provides an advanced interaction with the leadership principles of the different ministries who have a proven track with leadership in the Church.

PM2313 The Making of a Leader II

3 Semester Hours

This is a continuation of Leadership Module I.

PM2314 Required Reading in Leadership

3 Semester Hours

This course is a required reading course that gives important insights on the requirements of the minister when ministering the Word of God to others.

PM2315 Making the Right Decisions of Leadership

3 Semester Hours

A required reading course that provides helpful information and principles for the student to use

when they enter the ministry and have to make decisions that affect the lives of others as well as their own.

PM2316 Basic Study Skills for Leaders

3 Semester Hours

This course is taught through a series of tapes by Dr. Thomas Staton on the different skills a leader will need to be effective and the principles by which to use them.

PM2317 Laws of Leadership

3 Semester Hours

The material for this course is from the 21 Irrefutable Laws of Leadership series from Dr. John Maxwell.

PM2318 Becoming an Armor Bearer

3 Semester Hours

What did it mean for Jonathan to be David's armor bearer? What does it mean for the deacon or elder of the church to be the pastor's armor bearer? This course is designed to instruct the student on the importance of being able to minister to a minister.

PM3330 Homiletics

3 Semester Hours

A study of the nature, method, variety, and importance of preaching from the Bible. Emphasis will be placed on the practical implementation of theory by requiring full development of a series of sermons.

PM3331 Principles and Practice of Pastoral Care

3 Semester Hours

A study of the various aspects of pastoral ministry such as the role, relationships, and responsibilities of the pastor.

PM3340 Charismatic Ministry

3 Semester Hours

This course traces the development and history of the Holiness and Charismatic movement. The person, work, gifts and ministry of the Holy Spirit in the Church today will be studied.

PM3351 Small Group Ministry

3 Semester Hours

Presents the theory and practice of the group process which is so important to the work of church education in the areas of leadership, counseling,

RS0312 The Nature and Character of God

3 Semester Hours

Who is God? We know His nature and character, but do we really know who God is? In this study, Winkie Pratney shares with the student the greatness and wonderfulness of God.

RS0313 Touching the Heart of God in Praise and Worship

3 Semester Hours

Many people get the misunderstanding that a praise and worship concert is a concert of a special cantata. It is praise for God for what He has done, and just worshipping Him for Who He is. Dallas Holm, Lindell Cooley, and Bill Ancira shares with the student the importance of the praise and worship ministry of the church.

RS0314 Prayer, Intercession, and Revival

3 Semester Hours

A discussion of the value and forms of prayer in both personal and corporate life. Lars Enarson and Lila Terhune discuss why God desires us to pray, motivating factors for prayer, and practical tips on inspiring prayer in churches and in one's own devotional life.

RS0315 Faith to Raise the Dead

3 Semester Hours

All believers are called to walk by faith and to mature in the Lord Jesus Christ. David Hogan outlines practical steps on how to live by faith, understanding your authority as a believer in Christ, learning how to deal with the flesh, and differentiating between the flesh and the demonic activity in yourself and others.

RS0316 The Persecuted Church

3 Semester Hours

As revival fires burn, more believers respond to God's call to minister on foreign soil. Gary Russell and Tom White teach the concepts and methods necessary to proclaim Christ clearly in different cultures — even to the point of persecution.

RS0317 The Emerging Church: Who Are the People of God

3 Semester Hours

Robert Gladstone gives an insightful examination of Scripture, history, and current revivals, as they combine to shape the true Church, God's people of power, worship, love and destiny.

RS0318 The Tabernacle Patterns of Revival

3 Semester Hours

Dick Reuben gives this historically and typological study about worship in early Judaism, centering on the tabernacle, the feasts and the priesthood, along with the understanding of these Jewish worship patterns in early Christianity.

RS0319 Revival and Holy War

3 Semester Hours

Revival not only brings about repentance, salvation and changed lives, but it also starts an intense battle with the spiritual forces of darkness. In this tape series, Dr. Michael Brown discusses what happens when the presence of God begins to manifest in the revival setting of the church.

RS0320 Winning the Lost at any Cost

3 Semester Hours

Jesus commissioned all of us to go into the world and make disciples of the nations. This course with John Cava and Brother Yesupadam will help you get God's heart for a dying world as well as equip you to reach your lost friends, neighbors, and fellow workers with the good news of Jesus.

RS0321 Revival and Reformation

3 Semester Hours

How can revival lead to reformation in your day? This course by Dr. Michael Brown and Reverend Bob Phillips points to the necessary Biblical foundations: the preaching of the cross and purity of life, the fire of the Holy Spirit, warning of coming judgment, and the return of the Word of God. These are essential ingredients that can lead to true reformation in our day.

RS0322 Finding and Fulfilling Your Destiny

3 Semester Hours

In order to bring maximum glory to God and bear much fruit in our lives, we need to align ourselves with our Maker's unique plan for our lives. This course by Larry Tomczak and Robert Gladstone will equip the

RS0335 Foundations of Intercession

3 Semester Hours

This tape series by Dr. Michael Brown takes the student into the ministry of interceding for the lost, whether it is one or a whole nation.

RS0336 Taking Revival Deeper

3 Semester Hours

This course is designed to not only keep the flame of revival burning in the heart of the believer, but to bring about a hunger to go deeper.

RS0337 Keys to Personal Revival

3 Semester Hours

God's goal for His people is that they be conformed to the image of His Son. This class teaches how the Christian can mature toward this goal through renewing the mind, intimacy with the Father, overcoming temptation and sin, bearing the fruit of the Spirit and facing the life's challenges.

RS0338 Frontline Evangelism

3 Semester Hours

As with any battle, the front line is the toughest place to be. As the Christian battles the kingdom of darkness, he is always on the front line as he engages in evangelism for the kingdom of God.

RS0339 I Am the Lord Your Healer

3 Semester Hours

A comprehensive study of the biblical motif of God the Healer, discussing Old Testament foundations, New Testament fulfillment, and the practical outworking of the ministry of healing today.

RS0340 Theology of Prayer

3 Semester Hours

A study of the great prayers of the Bible and the lessons that can be learned for our prayer ministry today. The course stresses the importance and impact of prayer in contemporary life and encourages the student to pray regularly and fervently.

RS0341 The Practical Aspects of Prayer

3 Semester Hours

The books in this required reading course are from authors who live what they write as they give to the reader practical aspects of a prayer life.

RS0342 Advanced Spiritual Warfare

3 Semester Hours

This required reading course is a continuance of RS 0333 — Spiritual Warfare.

RS0343 Masters of Intercession

3 Semester Hours

The books in this required reading course are from well known authors that have a strong intercessory prayer ministry who will help the student to understand what is required of them when they are called to intercede by the Lord.

RS0344 Revival Evangelism, Part 1

3 Semester Hours

Different methods of evangelism are shared in this course as it equips the student for personal one-on-one witnessing.

RS0345 The Church of the New Millennium, Part 1

3 Semester Hours

God's strategy for training His people for their individual ministries is through the gifted leaders He sets in the Church. This course teaches how the apostle, prophet, evangelist, pastor and teacher functions to bring the Body to full stature.

RS0346 Intercession and Evangelism

3 Semester Hours

One of the keys to effective evangelism is prayer. This course is designed to show the student the power behind evangelism when intercession comes before it.

RS0347 Fuel for the Fire, Part 1

3 Semester Hours

Many have been touched by the fires of revival sweeping across this land. The messages in this series of tapes were delivered by Steve Hill at the Brownsville Assembly of God in Pensacola, Florida.

RS0348 Great Books of Revival Reading Project, Part 1

3 Semester Hours

In this course, the student is required to read books from those authors who have experienced a special move of God as the revival fires have spread in their lives, as well as in lives of people across the globe.

TH0254 Spiritual Gifts

2 Semester Hours

This course is designed for the student to really look at their lives in the ministry and what God is calling them to do for the church today.

TH0255 Spiritual Identity

2 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the student see who they are in Christ. This class is for the serious minded Christian.

TH1220 Theology of Music and Worship

2 Semester Hours

A comprehensive overview of the Old and New Testament teachings on music and worship along with a short survey of music and worship throughout the history of the Christian Church. The student is also given a Biblical basis upon which to form a philosophy of music and worship in a local church.

TH1310 Survey of Bible Doctrines

3 Semester Hours

A survey of the ten basic areas of Biblical doctrine with a view to their practical application in the life and ministry of the behavior and of the Church.

TH2350 Spiritual Warfare

3 Semester Hours

This course is about the doctrine of Satan and gives a detailed description of the person and work of the devil. This study is designed to help the Christian identify and overcome the efforts of Satan.

TH3221 Ecclesiology

2 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the student to consider the biblical basis for the church, its Old Testament antecedents, and its beginning, nature, and purpose.

TH3231 Pneumatology

2 Semester Hours

A study of the Person and work of the Holy Spirit in the Old and New Testaments with special application in the life of the believer and in the Church.

TH3241 Eschatology

2 Semester Hours

This is a study in that area of Biblical teaching which concerns last things: the final outcome of the present order. The course addresses these teachings and gives a biblical picture of the events. The Second Coming of Christ, the tribulation, and the nature of predictive prophecy are among the topics discussed.

TH3256 Christology

2 Semester Hours

A study of the Old Testament materials dealing with the coming Messiah followed by a study of the person and work of Christ in the New Testament and how the Holy Spirit is the agent of restoring the image and likeness of God (which is Jesus Christ) in us today.

TH3260 Doctrine and Practice of Prayer

2 Semester Hours

A study of the place of prayer in the believer's life. Practical and helpful material is shared with the student to help him develop a strong and effective prayer life.

TH4210 Typology

2 Semester Hours

The student will examine the different images, shadows, and symbols of Biblical terms, words, and people, while obtaining a proper understanding of their meanings.

TH4221 Soteriology

2 Semester Hours

The doctrine of Salvation — the work of Christ in bringing lost humanity into fellowship with God — is the focus of this course. This doctrine is treated in a logical progression, a kind of order of salvation. The study includes the doctrines of repentance, faith, conversion, regeneration, justification, adoption, sanctification, and prayer in the life of a Christian.

TH4250 Apologetics

2 Semester Hours

This course is designed to help the student to persuade others that there is no better way to follow than that of faith in, and obedience to, the God of the Christian Scriptures. Faith and knowing are the two consistent themes of this course.
