



The American Legion Auxiliary Department of Alaska convention was held April 14-17 in Wasilla. Again, it was great to be able to have the meeting in person and see so many people attend. A few of the highlights from the meeting; Department officers were elected- the Majority were re-elected for their 2nd consecutive term. A few changes were made to the By-Laws and Standing rules. The changes to the By-Laws are to keep Department By-Laws inline with National. The Standing Rule changes were to allow the Department to hold meeting virtually by Zoom or telephonically if needed.

Unit 5 received a few certificates of recognition. The first one was for $3^{\rm rd}$ place in recruiting the most new members. Our unit recruited 21 new members for the reporting period. The other was for achieving 103% of our membership goal for 2021 by March $31^{\rm st}$. Congratulations Unit 5.

Sharon Dillon and Katherine "Pinky" Bleth received certificate of appreciation and service Pins for their hours of volunteer service to help our Veterans. These 2 volunteers were nominated for these Pins in 2020 but because no convention was held- the Certificates and Pins were presented at this year's convention. Congratulations Sharon

and Pinky! And thank you for all the hours you have volunteered in Service to our Veterans.

Unit 5 also nominated Kona Achterhof as Unit Woman of the Year. Kona is an Auxiliary member eligible through her grandfather who served in the Navy. When Kona first joined Unit 5 she spent countless hours assisting with the cemetery expansion project; helping cut down and haul off trees, brush and other debris. Since then, Kona has helped with Santa Parade, gift wrapping, has helped in the kitchen for breakfasts, helped with Combat fishing in 2019. Unfortunately, Kona was not selected as the Department of Alaska Woman of the Year. Thank you Kona for your hours of volunteerism to Unit 5. So what is coming up in May?

The first week of May we will be putting the poppy cans at various stores around town. This will be your chance to get a poppy for National Poppy Day on May 28^{th} . We have sent a letter to Seward Mayor Terry asking for a proclamation designating May 28^{th} as National Poppy Day in Seward. May 3^{rd} at 1 PM we will be at the Legion Cemetery to put poppies on the crosses we use for Memorial Day. Like the Poppy wreath, the poppies on the crosses had seen many years of service and were properly retired last year. If anyone wants to come help, please be at the cemetery at 1.

A sure sign that things are getting back to normal-Combat Fishing will happen this year!! This annual event was canceled last year due to the pandemic but is back again this year. This is a great way for us to say Thank you to our active-duty military personnel. It is scheduled for May 26th. It takes a lot of volunteers to make this happen so if you would like to volunteer, please check with Mike at the Post.

The Memorial Day ceremonies will be on May 31^{st} . Based on weather there will be cemetery clean up days prior to the 31^{st} -stay tuned for specifics. Also depending on weather, we will be placing the crosses on the graves either on the 29^{th} or 30^{th} .

May is National Military Appreciation Month- As Part of that recognition VE Day will be celebrated on May 8th. Each year we commemorate Victory in Europe Day (VE Day). On May 8, 1945 Nazi Germany unconditionally surrendered to the Allied Forces of the Second World War. This day in history marked the end of World War II in Europe, although the war continued in the Pacific.

May is also the Month of the Military Care Giver Day. The Month of the Military Caregiver is observed in May each year to honor more than five million caregivers in the United States. Paying tribute to the people who care for more than two million veterans is an important part of supporting troops and military families

May 7th is **Military Spouse Appreciation Day**. On Military Spouse Appreciation Day, we honor the contributions and sacrifices made by military spouses. Their commitment and support help to keep our country safe. America's military spouses are the backbone of the families who support our troops during mission, deployment, reintegration and reset. Military spouses are silent heroes who are essential to the strength of the nation, and they serve our country just like their loved ones.

May 9^{th} - Mother's Day - come down to the Post for a great breakfast served up by the awesome breakfast crew. May 15^{th} - Armed Forces Day - a day to pay special tribute to the men and women of our Armed Forces. May 28^{th} - National Poppy Day

May 31st- Memorial Day -It is a Federal holiday observed on the last Monday in May and commemorates the men and women who died while in the military service. Pay tribute to the U.S. men and women who died during military service by observing a national moment of remembrance with a minute of silence at 3:00 PM local time.

The National Moment of Remembrance is an annual event that asks Americans to pause for a moment of silence for a minute at 3:00 pm on Memorial Day. The 3 pm time was chosen, because it is the time when many Americans are enjoying their freedoms on the national holiday. It is intended to be a unifying act of remembrance for Americans of all ages. The National Moment of Remembrance Act became law in the year 2000.

Finally, we have been blessed with some really nice days of riding weather! For those of us who are capable of getting our bikes out and about, please be careful riding around town and pulling into turn offs on the highway. There are still a great many locations with loose gravel left over from winter sanding and we all know the feeling of the bike or our boots sliding on the road when that grit turns into marbles.

I also have another piece of **really great news**. The push back that came from our Legion membership on the Internal Affairs Committee and the NEC on the topic of Resolution 19 and the directives limiting some of our coutional Rights has been rescinded. The guidelines of Resolution B which will supersede 19 does not mention guns at all and when it comes to

our free speech and what we wear on our vest has been changed in Part 6 to read "All ALR members shall maintain the image of The American Legion, protect The American Legion's Emblems, which symbolizes the integrity and principles of The American Legion and if wearing Emblem items then the Emblem items will be American Legion authorized emblems." Then part 7 states "ALR members' vests should display the integrity, principles and values of The American Legion and the ALR by avoiding patches or pins with (1) explicit or offensive language and/or images and (2) political or partisan language and/or images since The American Legion is a non-partisan organization." These statements bring us back to where we were before Resolution 19 with increased emphasis on making American Legion Riders aware that we are always representing the American Legion, like we did not know that already. 😉

Another big change that has cropped up in Resolution B is part 4 which states "ALR programs may allow current members of The American Legion family to join ALR chapters as supporting members." This statement has opened up a conversation about what Supporter's can do in an ALR Chapter. I believe that this statement means that each Chapter and Post can make a decision as to what extent our supporters can do within the Chapter. Does that mean we can have supporter hold offices in the Chapter, I don't think that is the intention, but I do think that it means supports can get a vest and a patch saying SUPPORTER on it. I know more than a couple of people who deserve to wear one and I am going to encourage it.

I am going to have to give my bike its first bath of this riding season because May 15 is Armed Forces Day and is our annual Bike Blessing. All bikes are invited and yes that include Bicycles and Scooters. When blessings are available we don't want to be stingy. Shortly after that it will be Memorial Day and the Ride to Byers Lake for those who want to head up the Parks Hi-way to the Alaska War Memorial.

Memorial Day Poem: In Flanders' Field

A hallmark Memorial Day poem was written by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae. It is titled "In Flanders Fields" & remains to this day one of the most memorable war poems ever written. It is a lasting legacy of the terrible battle in the Ypres Salient in the spring of 1915.

As a surgeon attached to the 1st Field Artillery Brigade, McCrae, who had joined the McGill faculty in 1900 after graduating from the University of Toronto, had spent seventeen days treating injured men -- Canadians, British, Indians, French, and Germans -- in the Ypres Salient.

One death particularly affected McCrae. A young friend and former student, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer of Ottawa, had been killed by a shell burst on 2 May 1915. Lieutenant Helmer was buried later that day in the little cemetery outside McCrae's dressing station, and McCrae had performed the funeral ceremony in the absence of the chaplain.

The next day, sitting on the back of an ambulance parked near the dressing station beside the Canal de l'Yser, just a few hundred yards north of Ypres, McCrae vented his anguish by composing a poem. The major was no stranger to writing, having authored several medical texts besides dabbling in poetry.

In the nearby cemetery, McCrae could see the wild poppies that sprang up in the ditches in that part of Europe, and he spent twenty minutes of precious rest time scribbling fifteen lines of verse in a notebook.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from failing hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders fields.





Taps



Of all the military bugle calls, none is so easily recognized or more apt to render emotion than the call Taps. The melody is both eloquent and haunting and the history of its origin is interesting and somewhat clouded in controversy. In the British Army, a similar call known as Last Post has been sounded over soldiers' graves since 1885, but the use of Taps is unique with the United States Military, since the call is sounded at funerals, wreath-laying and memorial services. Taps began as a revision to the signal for Extinguish Lights (Lights Out) at the end of the day. Up until the Civil War, the Infantry call for Extinguish Lights was the one set down in Silas Casey's (1801-1882) Tactics, which had been borrowed from the French. The music for Taps was adapted by Union General Daniel Butterfield for his brigade in July, 1862.



Daniel Adams Butterfield was the commander of a brigade of the V Corps of the Army of the Potomac and served in the Shenandoah Valley during the Bull Run Campaign. During the Peninsular Campaign Butterfield served

prominently when during the Battle of Gaines Mill, despite an injury, he seized the colors of the 83rd Pennsylvania and rallied the regiment at a critical time in the battle. Years later, he was awarded the Medal of Honor for that act of heroism.

As the story goes, General Butterfield was not pleased with the call for Extinguish Lights feeling that the call was too formal to signal the days end and with the help of the briede bugler. Oliver Willcox Norton from Harrison's Landing, Virginia, wrote Taps to honor his men while in camp at the Seven Day's Battle. These battles took

place during the Peninsular Campaign of 1862. The call sounded that night in July, 1862, soon spread to other units of the Union Army and was even used by the Confederates. Taps was made an official bugle call after the war. As the years went on many more versions were created. There are no official words to the music but here are some of the more popular verses:

"Fading light dims the sight,
And a star gems the sky, gleaming bright.
From afar drawing nigh -- Falls the night.
"Day is done, gone the sun,
From the lake, from the hills, from the sky.
All is well, safely rest, God is nigh.
"Then good night, peaceful night,
Till the light of the dawn shineth bright,
God is near, do not fear -- Friend, good night."

"TAPS" is customarily played at funerals at Arlington National Cemetery as well as at ceremonies at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers.

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






Outdoor Adventure Center Seward, Alaska








It is traditional to fly the flag of the United States at half- mast from dawn until noon.
