## **Board Candidate Solicitation Notice for 2020 Annual Meeting of the Membership**

The 2020 Annual Meeting of the Members of Lakewood Forest Fund, Inc. "The HOA" will be held in February 2020 with the official meeting notice to be mailed approximately 60 days prior to the scheduled meeting date. At that meeting, three (3) board positions will be expiring; therefore, an election will be held to fill these seats. In order to be effective, a homeowner's association needs a strong board of directors that understands its role and pursues it with passion and a concise mission in mind. If you are interested in serving the Lakewood Forest community as a volunteer board member and would like to be included on the electronic ballot & proxy, it is requested that the following information be submitted electronically to **gm@lakewoodforestfund.com** no later than 5:00pm on Wednesday, December 4, 2019.

**Item 1:** Submit name and property address located in subdivision. **Note:** To be eligible to run for a board position, you must be an owner of a home in Lakewood Forest; The Fund office confirms candidates by viewing Harris County Appraisal District records.

**Item 2:** Submit a candidate statement consisting of one paragraph (no more than six sentences) to introduce yourself, share your involvement in the community thus far, and address one specific accomplishment you would like to see initiated by the board in 2020. **Note:** Only the first six sentences of each candidate statement will be published.

**Item 3:** Submit a current photo in jpeg format to be included on the electronic ballot and posted on the association website.

Any submissions received after the deadline date will not be included on the electronic ballot or proxy. If you decide at a later date that you want to run for a position on the Board, nominations will be taken from the floor at the meeting.

- Strive at all times to serve the best interests of the association as a whole regardless of their personal interests.
- Use sound judgment to make the best possible business decisions for the association, taking into consideration all available information, circumstances, and resources.
- Act within the boundaries of their authority, as defined by law and the governing documents of the association.
- Provide opportunities for residents to comment on decisions facing the association.
- Perform their duties without bias for or against any individual or group of owners or non-owner residents.
- Disclose personal or professional relationships with any company or individual who has or is seeking to have a business relationship with the association.
- Conduct open, fair, and well-publicized elections.
- Always speak with one voice, supporting all duly-adopted board decisions even if the board member was in the minority regarding actions that may not have obtained unanimous consent.

## Prohibited Vehicles in Lakewood Forest

The parking of recreational vehicles (e.g., mobile homes, trailers, ATV's, campers, camper trailers, boat, watercraft and boat trailers), commercial vehicles (defined as vehicles with commercial writing on their exteriors, vehicles primarily used or designed for commercial purposes, e.g., cargo vans, heavy duty trucks, and tractors), and inoperable vehicles (e.g., on blocks, missing tires, covered with a tarp or car cover, do not have current registration for more than 15 consecutive days), unless parked in enclosed garages shall be considered by the Association to be a nuisance.

**No repair work,** dismantling or assembling of motor vehicles or of any other machinery or equipment **shall be permitted** in any street, driveway or yard adjacent to a street, or in the common areas, **other than of a temporary nature.** 

No person shall park a vehicle within subdivision upon any street for the principal purpose of displaying such vehicle for sale.

## 2020 Billing Statements Have Been Mailed

- 4. Check your email for the activation email. You will need to confirm your email address and set a password for your portal.
- 5.Once you log in to your portal, click **Account Profile.** In the **Contact Preferences** block, click **Enable Online Documents**. Next, click "I consent to receiving documents electronically," then click **Save**.

## Don't Clog Storm Drains

When storm drains clog with leaves and/or other debris, water can no longer drain from the street. This water can then pool along the streets and flood

intersections.

Contrary to popular belief, materials dumped into storm drains do not go to a water treatment plant; but instead flow directly into streams and rivers. Dumping any materials (including leaves/grass clippings) into storm drains is not only illegal, but contributes pollution to our waterways and

## It is important to keep storm drains free of obstructions.

When you are clearing your yard or driveway, please do not rake or blow the leaves into the street. Also, DO NOT SWEEP OR BLOW LEAVES AND/OR GRASS CLIPPINGS DIRECTLY INTO THE STORM DRAIN. Homeowners are responsible for clearing the street in front of their own home as regular maintenance. Do not rely on street sweepers or assume someone else will do it. Considering raking/blowing leaves/grass clippings into flowerbeds as mulch or start a compost pile in your backyard where they can decompose and create a natural fertilizer.

## **Updates from the Fund Office**

At the November board meeting, the board approved:

- Installation of fall mulching for all common areas at a cost of \$6,650.00, which includes labor. With
  excessive rain over the last few months, mulch has broken down and some wash out has occurred; adding
  mulch will help protect plants this winter.
- Hiring a landscape architect/arborist in 2020 to evaluate the common areas of Lakewood Forest and
  determine areas where trees need to be added as many trees have died and not been replaced. As stated
  during homeowner forum by resident Jim Robertson, "the trees are a major factor in the attractiveness and
  beauty of this area, and contribute significantly to the quality of life and value of our homes."

#### Other updates:

- During executive session, the board reviewed collection/deed restriction matters, personnel issues, and met
  with civic association members to have a general conversation about the future of the two organizations
  working together.
- Seasonal color to be changed out before Thanksgiving holiday; a special thank you to the Garden Club ladies for assisting with recommendations on flowers.
- Christmas swags will be hung the weekend of December 7.
- Grant Road Wall Project Phase 1 has been continually delayed due to multiple, inaccurate underground utility markings. Ground penetrating radar was considered; however, this form of analysis cannot pick up small cables such as fiber optics.
- Standard auger-drilling option was utilized on the first 17 holes where piers were cemented into place in
  early November. Hydro-excavation will be utilized to drill the additional holes in phase 1 so as to avoid
  disruption of fiber optic cables, electric and/or gas lines. Hydro-excavation is expected to start week of
  November 18.

## Take Action Now to Join the Lakewood Forest Civic Association

All Lakewood Forest residents recently received their annual billing statement from the Lakewood Forest Fund ("the HOA"). In past years, this invoice included an optional line item for residents to join the Lakewood Forest Civic Association (LFCA), at an annual cost of \$10. For the year 2020, the line item to join the LFCA is *not included* in the HOA's billing statement. The entire fee due (\$630) is only for mandatory HOA dues.

Payment to and membership in the LFCA has always been and continues to be completely voluntary. However, we

have had a very large percentage of our residents join the LFCA and we thank you for your support over the years.

The Lakewood Forest Civic Association is an independent, non-profit neighborhood association incorporated in 1985 to promote the general welfare of Lakewood Forest residents and to support civic betterment for Lakewood Forest and surrounding areas. We are run by an elected board of homeowner volunteers who contribute their time and efforts toward making Lakewood Forest a nice place to live, enjoy, and raise a family.

Your \$10 voluntary membership dues go a very long way! With it, the Civic Association does/supports the following:



## **November Garden Club Meeting**

The Lakewood Forest Garden Club meeting began on November 1, 2019 with President, Candace Beaver, giving the history of Poinsettias. The co-hostesses were Barbara Crum (Chair), Janice Giordano, Sandra McKeon, Susan Hanson, Gabriele Klopp, and Yvonne Newsome. They did a fabulous job with fall decorations and delicious refreshments. The hostess table was graced by a beautiful fall arrangement created by Barbara Crum.

The program was entitled "Horticulture Tips from Lakewood Forest Garden Club Experts" featuring leader Becky Bailey, Bette Gerhold, and Eleese Lester-Baier. Becky introduced us to the native Poinsettia and the American Beauty Berry. Both plants are easy to grow and can spring up everywhere. Bette shared her success of propagating an "Cowardly Lion" Begonia by first rooting a cutting in water and transplanting it into fresh soil after 6 weeks when root system was well established. Eleese introduced us to the moringa and purslane plant. Both have been used in cooking and as medicinals. She recommends serving the small, tender leaves in salads.

The panel also answered questions from the membership. We learned that it is difficult to eradicate Mimosa trees as they spread roots that might damage structures. Members shared tips about fertilizers for flower beds as well as lawns and agreed that organic fertilizers and composts are best for plants and the environment. A beautiful flower arrangement designed by Marilyn Bullen from her garden graced the President's table then went to door prize winner Betty Boyland.

We appreciate community support for our annual fundraiser and also for donations made to Wreaths Across America. Yard of the Month - Yards in Area F (Sections 14, 15, 17 & 18) were judged by a group of ladies from the garden club the last part of October for the November Yard of the Month. We are pleased to announce that First Place Winners were Charles and Cathy Messerly at 12402 Pelican Isle Court. Honorable Mention went to Jerome and Hillari Mouton at 12506 Leyton Court and to Paige Stegemeier at 16818 Park Island Court. Congratulations to all winners! Donations for Yard of the Month are made by the Lakewood Forest Civic Association, the Lakewood Forest Fund and Plants For All Seasons for gift certificates in the amount of \$60 for first place winners and \$35 for honorable mention. The gift certificates can be used at Plants For All Seasons on Highway 249. The next Yard of the Month judging will be the last week of February for the March Yard of the Month.

### **December Garden Hints**

- Flowerbeds Deadhead and feed cool season color plants with
- Color Star Fertilizer. Continue to plant cool weather color: pansies, snapdragons, cabbage, kale, viola, alyssum, lobelia, cyclamen, and much more...
- Lawns Your lawn should be in a dormant state and there's not much to do at this point. Make sure to back
  off your water while the lawn is dormant but make sure to water if we are going to have freezing
  temperatures.
- Poinsettias Water well until soil is saturated and allow to dry between watering. Apply water to soil and not the foliage or blooms. Keep away from drafts.
- Birds Don't forget to keep seed feeders full and fresh water in bird baths. Put out suet cakes. The extra protein helps keep our feathered friends warm in the winter months.
- Freezes Have frost cloth on hand to cover tender plants in case of freezing weather. Wrap plants completely down to ground level. The less cold drafts move under the frost cloth, the better.
- Vegetable Garden Work compost into the top couple inches of your garden beds. Plant a cover crop in
  empty beds such as peas, oats, or rye to keep the soil active. These cover crops can be cut and worked into
  the soil before spring planting. You can still plant cool weather seeds about every 2 weeks for fresh veggies
  into spring.

- We are still recommending that you do soil remediation after the past two very wet years. The first step will
  be applying MicroLife Humates Plus. This is loaded with beneficial microbes that will repair your soils and
  help with long term recovery. Second, you will want to apply Medina soil activator and liquid molasses to
  stimulate microbial activity.
- It is time to apply rye seed for a green lawn all winter. If you go with the rye seed, make sure it's an annual turf type rye. Regular Gulf type rye gets tall and is better for grazing animals than growing as a lawn.
