Course Overview:

This course will emphasize the principles of marketing, profit maximizing, business management, personal finance, investing, stocks, computer utilization and record keeping. Students will apply agricultural and personal business concepts using word processing, spreadsheets, graphics, data bases, presentation and publishing software.

This course can be taken for dual credit.

This course will meet District graduation requirements for Economics and computer proficiency upon completion of the entire year.

This course will not meet the NCAA requirements for Social Studies.

Course Goals:

The purpose of this course is to give students a head start in the world of business and agriculture. Students will have the opportunity to learn how to be successful in their future careers by learning how to get a job, important communication skills, managing money and learning about economics.

Topics of Instruction (subject to change):

- 1. Identify careers and demonstrate job seeking, keeping and advancement skills
- 2. Demonstrate an ability to succeed in a job interview
- 3. Demonstrate an understanding for agriculture issues
- 4. Exercise public speaking skills
- 5. Understand the components of and build marketing/advertising strategies
- 6. Demonstrate knowledge in applications/scholarships and college preparation
- 7. Exhibit knowledge in agriculture sales
- 8. Identify financing skills and demonstrate finance management
- 9. Demonstrate an understanding of the Stock Market
- 10. Demonstrate an understanding of economics
- 11. Identify and understand the process of different agriculture commodities
- 12. Develop personal skills and communication ability
