The Netherlands Route The 125 river miles between San Francisco and Sacramento Part 2

Starting in 1885 they leased the larger CP rivercrafts to sister company Southern Pacific Co. From 1910 - 15 the river lines were operated out of San Francisco, SP headquarters. In 1915 SP applied to the capital ICC for permission to continue operating boats on the Sacramento River and connecting waterways. Section 5 of their regulations as amended by the Panama Canal Act prohibited any railroad from operating a boat line in competition with their railroad. The ICC ruled that the SP did indeed compete but that the operation was in the interest of public convenience and commerce.

The "Apache" and "Modoc" furnished daily service (except Sunday); Sacramento to San Francisco and handled passengers and freight making 10 regular and intermediate landings and 130 bank landings between Clarksburg and Rio Vista. The "Navajo" offered fast, dependable service to passengers and growers arriving in San Francisco for early morning business and markets. It was very regular. The "Cherokee" and steam barge "Frutto" were in service only during the fruit season. The SP was, as were most riverboat companies, particularly busy June through September. In 1913, 1800 cars of fruit were shipped East; 115 from Walnut Grove and Hood. Immediately before the fruit season began "Frutto" (Frutto was a steamer barge) distributed the shook shipping boxes to the bank landings and wharves, - all landings were numbered. During harvest "Frutto" daily collected the produce from each bank landing, at times assisted by the "Cherokee", on a schedule to reach Sacramento in the At peak times the "Dover" (owner morning. unknown) was also a big participant in trans-shipping to Sacramento. The fruit was shipped to Sacramento under local charges, consigned to shipping firms. It moved from Sacramento to the Eastern markets on new bills of lading and then distributed to the distributing organizations. In 1913 there were 149 such boats on the Sacramento River exclusively and a grand total on all riverline arms of 316 (the SP operated six). The tonnage carried on the four principal river lines was 477,292 tons. However, the SP boats rarely carried capacity and showed a loss between 1914-17, revenue rarely keeping up with the cost. 

NETHERLANDS ROUTE SACRAMENTO RIVER






One of the heaviest shipments of wheat from up-river sections was made this week. Twenty-six thousand sacks of wheat have been carried by the Sacramento Transportation Company by barge from the wheat growing section around Grimes so far this week.


The barge Alabama passed through this city early in the week carrying 12,000 sacks of wheat, and the barge Utah is now at the City Wharf waiting to be towed to Port Costa, where the wheat will be transferred to the warehouses.

According to Harbormaster McQuillan, on an average of a barge of wheat a week is coming from the section about Grimes and in various sections in Colusa County.






