THE COURAGE TO SAY NO!

Deut. 26:4-10; Psalm 91:1-2, 10-15; Rom. 10:8-13; Luke 4:1-13

This past Ash Wednesday, the prophet Joel exhorted you and me to "Rend your hearts and not your garments," St. Paul, on the other hand, implored us, on behalf of Christ, to "be reconciled to God." That is indeed the message of Lent - time for reconciliation with God and neighbor. We are called to humble ourselves, acknowledge our sins and take responsibility for them, and ask God for pardon as we resolve to be faithful to our baptismal promises of rejecting Satan and all that contradicts the truth of the gospel of Christ. We must reconcile with God by renouncing Satan and by committing ourselves to promoting the value of Christ's gospel.

Lent is the most appropriate season to appreciate God's love and give thanks to Him for sending His only Son, Jesus Christ, to come to suffer and die for our sins so that we may have eternal life. It is imperative for us to know that the best way to show appreciation and thanks to God during this season of Lent is by committing ourselves to be faithful to observing the *Three Pillars of Lent* – Almsgiving – Fasting – Prayer.

This Season challenges you and me to take our devotional duties more seriously; know that we are urged to practice Almsgiving during Lent and beyond. Today's first reading is a *Eucharistic Confession*, a confession of gratitude. It is taken from the ritual prescribed for the feast of the *harvest thanksgiving*. The reading recounts why Israel should be grateful. In gratitude to God Who gave the land, sent the rain and made the land fertile, they offered 10 percent of the first fruits of the harvest to God, even before they took what they needed for their upkeep. For the Jewish people, tithing is never seen as merely an obligation, but a religious duty. It is always perceived as a "thanksgiving" to God for the many things He had done for them. He is responsible for their harvest and hence He deserves to be thanked. Lent is a time to show our gratitude by Almsgiving!

In today's Gospel, we hear that after Jesus fasted for forty days and forty nights, He was tempted by the devil. Firstly, He was tempted, for the sake of material necessity and sensual desires, to abuse His authority and power: "If You are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." Secondly, He was tempted with the sin of greed by the worship of a false god in material things: "...he (the devil) showed Him all the kingdoms of the world...and said, I shall give to You all this power and glory...if You worship me." Whenever you are tempted to treat your treasure and material possessions as if they were gods, you must remember that by sharing them with the less fortunate, you are, in fact, obeying the command, "You shall worship the Lord, your God, and Him alone shall you serve." Thirdly, Jesus was tempted by the sin of pride and vanity: "If you are the Son of God, throw Yourself down from here...(God) will command His angels...to guard You."

The Lenten Season reminds us that, like Christ, we, His followers, are tempted to satisfy our own sensual desires and pleasures. We will have the urge to satiate our hunger for happiness with material pleasures and objects that contradict the teachings of the Gospel. Like Him, you and I must have the courage to subdue and overcome these desires, because, "One does not live on bread (material things) alone." This is the time for us to be humble and to bring our needs to God in prayer and trust that He will grant our heart desires when we hold fast and persevere.



STRENGTH IN SICKNESS: PRAYING FOR THE POPE!

Last Monday, February 11th, we celebrated the Twenty-first World Day of the Sick, declared by Pope John Paul II in 1992. In Pope Benedict XVI's 2013 message to mark the occasion, he used the words of his predecessor, John Paul II to remind us that "This day represents for the sick, for health care workers, for the faithful and for all people of goodwill 'a privileged time of prayer, of sharing, of offering one's sufferings for the good of the Church, and a call for all to recognize in the features of their suffering brothers and sisters the Holy Face of Christ, Who, by suffering, dying and rising has brought about the salvation of mankind' (John Paul II, Letter for the Institution of the World Day of the Sick, 13 May 1992). On this occasion I feel especially close to you, dear friends, who in health care centers or at home, are undergoing a time of trial due to illness and suffering. May all of you be sustained by the comforting words of the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council: "You are not alone, separated, abandoned or useless. You have been called by Christ and are His living and transparent image."

Ironically, the Catholic world last Monday woke up to the shocking message by the Pope to the Cardinals, "to communicate to you a decision of great importance for the life of the Church. After having repeatedly examined my conscience before God, I have come to the certainty that my strengths, due to an advanced age, are no longer suited to an adequate exercise of the Petrine ministry. I am well aware that this ministry, due to its essential spiritual nature, must be carried out not only with words and deeds, but...both strength of mind and body are necessary, strength which in the last few months, has deteriorated in me to the extent that I have had to recognize my incapacity to adequately fulfill the ministry entrusted to me. For this reason, and well aware of the seriousness of this act, with full freedom I declare that I renounce the ministry of Bishop of Rome, Successor of Saint Peter, entrusted to me by the Cardinals on 19 April 2005, in such a way, that as from 28 February 2013, at 20:00 hours, the See of Rome, the See of Saint Peter, will be vacant and a Conclave to elect the new Supreme Pontiff will have to be convoked by those whose competence it is..." (Vatican, 10 February 2013, BENEDICTUS PP XVI).

Lent is a season when you and I are to identify our desires, our temptations, our pain and suffering with that of Jesus. Through His suffering, dying and resurrection, He is the only One Who has the power to take away our sicknesses and thus, restore us to good health in mind and body. As we begin this season of Lent, we, as individuals and as a Church community, pray for our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI, that God will bless him and grant him good health of mind and body. We also prayer for Mother Church, that as the Pope resigns due to failing health, that the Lord would not leave us orphans but in His loving kindness will continue to look after His flock and lead us to a greener pasture.

Catholic Lent Prayer

Almighty and Everlasting God,
You have given the human race
Jesus Christ our Savior as a model of humility.
He fulfilled Your Will by becoming Man
And giving His life on the Cross.
Help us to bear witness to You
By following His example of suffering
And make us worthy to share in His Resurrection.
We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son. Amen.
