Words from Our Pastor

"If you are able-bodied, remember that it is a temporary condition." -- Kevin Kling

heard this quote recently from a disabled storyteller and social commentator who was being interviewed about his life. He was born with a birth condition that left his left arm shriveled and then a motorcycle accident paralyzed his right arm.

The quote really made me think. It is so easy for us to take our health, independence, and autonomy for granted. We often live under the illusion that we will always have the power to "carry our own load" – but this is just not factually true for us human

beings. If we are able-bodied, it is only temporary. The latest reports I've heard are that 70 percent of us will be mentally incapacitated before we die. That is a LOT of us.

It is probably the case that I am especially interested in this quote because of my relationship with my granddaughter Nora who needs constant support and care to live her life. From what we can tell, her entire life will be lived needing support from others – and yet she radiates a lovely peace and graciousness toward everyone in her circle of influence. There is something very beautiful about taking care of our fellow human beings – though we would usually prefer to be the strong and able-bodied helper, we may spend quite a bit of time as the person who needs the help.

So the truth is that we start life needing the care of others and most of us end life needing the care of others. We may think this is a bad thing, but I'm not so sure this is the case. When we learn to lean on others and allow them to help us, it is an act of humility that is often a good antidote to our human tendency toward arrogance – our tendency to avoid grace.

Of course if you ARE able-bodied it is good to carry your own load and help to carry the loads of others who need help. But when we are helping others and refusing to acknowledge our own need for grace, it can often create a wall in our lives that makes us ill-equipped for the day when we will need to rely on others for help. The quote from the disabled story-teller was helpful to me – a call to always keep in mind that my able-bodied stage is only a temporary condition. By God's grace, I will hopefully be prepared for the day when I am no longer able-bodied – and by God's grace, I hope that I can graciously receive the help from others who lovingly offer it.

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And Nothing is Very Strong

veryday I receive a devotional taken from the letters and writings of C. S. Lewis. Most days, I am challenged and encouraged. One of these selections challenged me greatly – more about this later.

Most of you know that my life has changed to one involving more ministry. Challenges mark this new road. Some of them have been merely a series of frustrating potholes and road bumps. Others have been mountains, one of which I am climbing now. Our enemy does not like when we begin actively loving and serving in the name of Jesus in a new way. This lesson faces me almost daily.

Back to C. S. Lewis – One day this week, the devotion came from "The Screwtape Letters," one of the most unique books ever written for Christians. C. S. Lewis takes the point of view of an experienced demon. This demon, named Screwtape, writes letters of advice to a younger demon on how to keep Christians from growing in and serving God. Here is an excerpt:

"The Christians describe the Enemy [GOD] as one 'without whom Nothing is strong'. And Nothing is very strong: strong enough to steal away a man's best years not in sweet sins but in a dreary flickering of the mind over it knows not what and knows not why ...

You will say that these are very small sins; and doubtless, like all young tempters, you are anxious to be able to report spectacular wickedness. **But do remember, the only thing that matters is the extent to which you separate the man from the Enemy [God].** It does not matter how small the sins are provided that their cumulative effect is to edge the man away from the Light and out into the Nothing. Murder is no better than cards if cards can do the trick. **Indeed the safest road to Hell is the gradual one**—the gentle slope, soft underfoot, without sudden turnings, without milestones, without signposts."

How this hit me! Sometimes ministry seems so hard that all I want to do is sit and do things that are meaningless. This is not something that is a fleeting thought. Doing "nothing" is not all bad, but when it becomes your primary goal and desire, it threatens your relationship with God and the calling he has on your life.

I want to walk with God always, remembering that small things that seem not to matter can lead me on a path I will soon find leads me away from God. **Rebecca DeBreau**

In the interview with Kevin Kling, he said that children and elderly people often have 'one foot in the other world' – that is, children have just come from their Creator and the elderly are preparing to return to their Creator. In between, these stages we often forget our dependence on others.

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Paul the Apostle has an interesting quote that helps me put these pieces together. He writes in 2 Corinthians 12:10, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

Let me repeat that key line: *"When I am weak, then I am strong."* This is the paradox of life – the paradox of

grace. When I lean on God, I find my deepest, truest source of strength. The world may celebrate and glorify the strong, the beautiful, the selfsufficient, the self-made-man – But in God's kingdom things look different. May we all live in with the wisdom of this simple line: If we are able-bodied, it is only a temporary condition.
