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# <u> The President's Message – November 2017</u>

#### **CORN DRIVE**

In the words of the Carpenters, "We've only just begun." 500 and counting. It was 500 years since Luther posted the 95 theses on the Wittenberg church door. 500 years ago and now the celebration is over. If it is anything like Christmas, it means putting away the life size poster of Luther. Maybe you have a copy of the Luther film and will put the DVD on the shelf and bring it out for your new confirmands or show it again next year at Reformation time. People made their pilgrimage to Germany this year. Now it is time to move on.

If there is something the celebration of Reformation 500 taught me, it was not that I learned more about Martin Luther but that Luther really was trying to emphasize Jesus. The Reformation was not about Luther. The LCMS Reformation theme was correct – "It's *Still* All about Jesus!" It always has been and always will be but there are things that get us sidetracked. One of those things is taking Jesus and our faith for granted. We cannot stop sharing that it is about Jesus. We have to keep going.

Right now in many churches, it is stress time. Leaders are attempting to put a new budget together for next year. The cost of ministry is rising. Leaders struggle with rising salaries and health care costs and the income from the Sunday morning offering plate is not keeping up. Preachers fear bringing up stewardship, which equates to money....as people do not want to hear about money again. Church workers remain silent or leave the room when next year salaries are discussed.

Somewhere, someone has to bring up that it is about Jesus. Someone needs to share that Jesus is the reason for the stewardship season. Why now? Because it is harvest time. Now is when the crops are brought in from the harvest. In my first parish, we had the CORN DRIVE. The idea was to share some of the corn crop for the Lord, for Jesus, in thankfulness for what Jesus had done. Hopefully it was a tenth of the crop like in the Old Testament days. I hope it was made in grateful response for what our heavenly Father did for the world through the sending of His Son to redeem all people.

November is a time to be thankful. Thankful for our Veterans on November 11 and for their commitment to protect our freedom. It is a time to celebrate our national holiday of Thanks-giving and all the blessings God showers on us. (Take a look at the meaning of Luther's First Article.) In Wisconsin, it means breaking out the blaze orange and deer hunting for nine days and getting the big buck. Praise God for all of that.

Let it be a time to remind people, as you discuss next year's budget, that their offerings are not given to a budget, but to Jesus and what He has done for them. The Apostle Paul said, "He died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto him which died for them, and rose again" (2 Cor 5:15). Encourage your pastor to remind people that their giving, that their response, is to what God has done for them and the offering they give is given because God gave it to us in the first place. How true are the words that many of us have sung at offering time...

> We give Thee but Thine own, Whate'er the gift may be; All that we have is Thine alone, A trust, O Lord, from Thee.

# <u>Across My Desk: DJ Schult</u>

#### Growing Young: A Book Review by Sean McDowell

The recent NWD-LCMS Professional Church Worker Conference handed out the book Growing Young to participants. Below is a review of the book for your consideration.

We have all heard the grim news: Church attendance is declining across denominations and young people are disengaging the church. In an effort to address this problem, the team at Fuller Youth Institute has released a new book: Growing Young: 6 Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church (Kara Powell, Jake Mulder, and Brad Griffin).

What makes Growing Young unique is that it is based upon an in-depth study of scholars, national ministry leaders, youth ministry experts, as well as research and visits to 363 diverse congregations who have effective ministries to young people. Like their previous book Sticky Faith, this book is based on careful research and analysis.

There are a few things I particularly appreciate about Growing Young. First, the authors recognize that there is hope for the church today. All is not lost. There are congregations truly engaging and equipping the next generation. Second, young people should not be an add-on to the church, but the heart of the church. When this is done right, it brings a true vibrancy to the entire congregation. As the author observes, "The good news is that when we bridge generation gaps, everyone grows young." And third, at the end of each chapter there are practical steps for church leaders and volunteers to take to help their church "grow young." This is a book of research, stories, and application.

Here are ten of the more interesting findings from their study:

1. Young people regularly expressed that they desire relationships not just with young youth leaders, but with more seasoned leaders as well.

2. US teens are not hostile towards religion, but they do not care much about it either.

3. Churches that successfully engage students don't water down the gospel or the cost of following Jesus.

4. Young people seemed compelled by a faith that promises reward in Heaven, but also renewal and transformation in the present.

5. Effective youth-focused churches embrace tough questions and give students room to doubt.

6. Rather than merely inviting students to volunteer, youth-focused churches help students participate in the life of the church.

7. Nearly twice as many pastors as students list worship music as vital to church effectiveness.

8. The highest response of what kept young people in church was personal relationships and warmth.

9. Churches that are growing young genuinely prioritize young people and their interests in programs, budget, participation, and emphasis.

10. Few students expressed that they stayed in church because of a "Superpastor."

Although Growing Young is primarily aimed at church workers, I found it immensely helpful in my own work with students (as a professor, part-time high school teacher, parent, and youth speaker). The church today desperately needs to learn how to engage and equip young people, and this book offers some helpful steps how to do so.

## Counselor Corner

#### **GIANTS FALLING**

The battle line was drawn. The two opponents appeared ill-matched. But there was a Third who would play a decisive role.

Goliath was the "giant" who had come to decimate and destroy. How could David, the unseasoned warrior, compete. Surely he would fall.

But David had what Goliath lacked. The former placed his confidence in the Hidden Warrior who never lost a battle. David's battle cry summed up where his confidence lay—""the battle is the Lord's"" (1 Samuel 17:47b). This was the day that the giant Goliath fell (vs.50)... and God was the Victor!

This all proves an introduction to another battle ground. Now the "giant" holds another name—Addiction. When allowed to grow to "giant" size he may appear undefeatable... fully capable of destroying.

But God has other plans. When He is placed at the center of the battle strategy a remarkable reversal can occur. God holds the victory plan!

Using the opening battle between Goliath and David as a template let's consider this beginning battle plan (a modification of the opening steps of the successful "12-Step" strategy)—

Step One—I admit I am powerless over the enemy before me. My solo, human plans will fail.

Step Two—God alone can conquer this "giant." He holds the power.

Step Three—I will turn this battle over to the Lord. To Him be the victory and the glory.

God is not deterred by the size of the "giant." He is well aware of the vulnerability of the "small" addict. God specializes in overcoming that which appears insurmountable. Giants fall before Him!

It brings to mind the words of the apostle Paul. He faced an unknown "thorn in [the] flesh" (2 Corinthians 12:7b) (his "giant"). He summed up God's strategy this way—

"Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me." (vs.9b) Yes, the "battle is the Lord's!"


