Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

We are all encouraged to pray for all parents, brothers and sisters, extended family members, those who have died in our families and for our vocation to live a holy life. Parishes are encouraged to pray for married couples, parents and grandparents, children, those who are not married, etc.

At our last Parish Pastoral Council meeting, we requested the newly formed Parish Life Commission to plan two Valentine Day Celebrations for Couples in our parish and for Singles. I really look forward to next year as we work together to strengthen our families and our couples. We'll work extra hard to encourage couples who are not vet married in the Church to re-examine their situations and see what they could do to return to the Sacraments (receiving Christ in the state of grace). We'll continue to look for ways to help parents be wonderful parents that the Lord has called them to be. Every member or segment of our families is more or less under pressure from the young to the elderly, healthy to nottoo-healthy, male or female, married or not, divorced, separated or widowed, single or cohabiting, etc. I always believe that this is the core of my ministry, our ministry as a parish.

With the Holy Family behind us, who can be against us? May the Lord continue to bless our efforts with success. Amen.

The Parish Office will be closed this Thursday, New Year's Day, in celebration of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God.



To this day, January 1st, remains dedicated as a Day of Peace.
