

Jeff Parker brought his new band to Willis Music and made a fine evening of good Bluegrass music. While it is a work in progress, it is not a tattered group as new bands can be. Jeff's talent is undeniable when he gets down to the music. It is easy to understand why he was a forming member of the Dailey & Vincent group, a popular offshoot of the Doyle Lawson 'School of Bluegrass Music' or 'Business', which ever you prefer.

If you didn't come out for the event you missed a wonderful opportunity because this is perhaps the most up close and personal way to meet the performers and get to know why they do what they love. In the Willis Music Auditorium, Jeff introduced his current new band members, talked about their talents, told a number of stories and performed some great music for the audience. During the break, Ron Simmons and Jeff took center stage and chatted about Jeff's decision to leave Dailey and Vincent after 27 years and strike out on his own. While a serious move on Jeff's part, the audience reassured him the decision has



him moving in a positive direction by their acclaim for the show.

Where do Woodsongs performers come from? Gene Thompson doesn't find these bands, they find him. Winter is a tough time to find gigs for bands in this region. There are few festivals but not many concert facilities like the Willis Music Auditorium. It is important for bands to play often in front of audiences where they can experiment with the music and hone their skills. Live music is and should be a team effort for both musicians and the audience. When the summer festival season winds down and the Willis Woodsongs Coffee House events start back up next fall, bring friends when you come and see how much noise, appreciation, and all out support you can give the bands. 

In Memorandum Long-time NKBMA member, musician, friend: Tom Murphy 1947-2019

Tom entered eternal life on February 12, 2019 at his residence with his loving family at his side. Tom was a US Army Vietnam Veteran, life-long member of Florence Baptist Temple, known for his sense of humor and a bluegrass musician. Fellow musician friends had the following to say:

'I often told people that Tom Murphy was the best bluegrass rhythm man in the tri-state area of Kentucky, Indiana, and Ohio. Tom made everyone sound better if you were lucky enough to pick with him.

'Tom and I traveled many, many hours together each week going to and from practice in New Richmond, OH. We also had some longer trips to Meadow Green Park in Clay City, KY., where we performed four or five times and to Lexington's Kentucky Horse Park where we played at the Festival of the bluegrass on two occasions.

'As some of you know, Tom had an opinion on everything!;; And he was usually right. He was a staunch conservative and had little patience with liberal ideas and the people who pushed them! He also had a great sense of humor and could tell some great off-color jokes. There was this one....no, I can't go there, but we laughed and laughed often. Tom was a special friend to me and I will miss him greatly. He called me "Bar" and then he would say "Bar rake me an open one", as we checked our tuning.'

'What do I remember about a guy like **Tom Murphy?'** 'When asked to write something about my friend Tom Murphy I thought about a place to start, sort of. I will say that we didn't see each other every day, but we did communicate every few days to discuss politics, current events, dogs, relatives, cars, the Civil War, pocket knives, zippo lighters....and sometimes gigs for our band called My Favorite Bluegrass Band. Then we lost Bud and Mark to the Angel Band and were devastated when they left but we knew where they were.

'What can I say about the latest events that have changed the dynamics again. Tom joined them. Tom Murphy was a good man that left a good family and a lot of music behind. He was the center of the band always standing in the middle because so much of what the rest of us did as musicians and friends revolved around his knowledge of Bluegrass in general. He could play it, sing it, arrange it and be patient enough to put up with my crabbing that the vocals weren't right and we needed to practice that tune again.

'Barry and I, later Kevin, spent hours in my basement getting it as good as we could. We knew we were up to doing it all better so we tried hard. There is no more 'trying' because all that's left are the memories. Kevin is at the James Cancer Center in Columbus now trying to overcome Lymphoma. Barry and I agreed a while back that the commitment that MFBGB had back then just isn't there with some musicians. I miss those times and I miss Tom's friendship, work ethic and sarcastic remarks when he got to stick one in you.

'Nothing will make the memories any better or more vivid because like history itself, time will buffer the pain. Tom's donation to my life strand will become just another hallowed spot in my heart alongside Bud and Mark.

'I hope I never have to write another article like this for our NKBMA newsletter again. At least I won't have to write my own. If you understand this hint just make a note of my demise as a smooth spot in the road of my life because I plan to get the band going again in a better place than my basement. On that Tom would agree.'


