The Reverend's Ruminations - March 2023

As I sit down to write this month's "rumination," I am working from home in the aftermath of one more snowstorm in what already feels like a long winter — and it's only the end of February! Deep down we realize that the earth needs this cold and snow to rejuvenate itself for another growing season, but unless you enjoy outdoor winter activities, perhaps you're already over the magic of a snow-white blanket and bitter wind chills.

No matter your opinion of our winter wonderland, as good Minnesotans we usually find ourselves longing for the *next* season on the calendar. These days many are leaning *hope*-fully toward spring, and while the calendar season (and the warmer temperatures) are still a ways off, perhaps it's appropriate that we find ourselves in the midst of forty solemn days known in the church as Lent. It began rather unceremoniously on February 22nd with the cancellation of our traditional Ash Wednesday service due to a good ol' Minnesota blizzard — and will continue until the joyous resurrection celebration of Easter (forty days not counting Sundays).

Last month I made mention of the fact that many Christians choose to give up the comfort of a favorite food, drink, or habit in order to gain a better understanding of our Savior's suffering and temptation in the wilderness. But what else do you know about Lent? A few years ago, I shared snippets from an interesting article by Rev. Sarah Phillips on <u>crosswalk.com</u>, and thought they would be a good reminder again this year:

"...Unlike the childlike joy associated with the season of Advent, with its eager anticipation of the precious baby Jesus, Lent is an intensely penitential time as we examine our sinful natures and return to the God we have, through our own rebelliousness, hurt time and again. Lent is also an opportunity to contemplate what our Lord really did for us on the Cross – and it wasn't pretty. But ultimately, the purpose of Lent does not stop at sadness and despair – it points us to the hope of the Resurrection and the day when every tear will be dried" (Revelation 21:3).

Obviously, Lent doesn't elicit the excitement that Advent does; but then again, maybe the commercialization of Christmas has taken so much Christ out of *Christ*-mas that we've lost sight of Advent's significance in our church lives as well?!

So how do we "do" Lent? One of the most important aspects of Lent is <u>confession</u> – although not in the foreboding sense that you may be picturing from some old movie. As Rev. Phillips says, "... [the forty days of Lent] are set aside to really examine areas of recurring sin in our lives that prevent us from being conformed to God's Will... The goal is to honestly examine your life in light of God's Word and to make a commitment to change in any areas you have not submitted to the Lord." None of us have yet managed to fully live up to Christ's example, so just be honest as you examine your Christian walk, and then look for ways to make improvements – incremental as they may be.

A good way to start your own examination of conscience is by praying the words of Psalm 139:23-24: "Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my thoughts. See if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." After opening yourself to God with these words, then hold up your life to the Ten Commandments. <u>Confess</u> to God, to me as your pastor, or to an accountability partner (as suggested in James 5:16) the ways you may have sinned against God. But don't stop there, or you may really feel stuck! <u>Thank</u> God for the forgiveness offered through Christ's sacrifice, and then <u>ask</u> God for the grace to change. You may be pleasantly surprised where and when God chooses to respond in your life.

My prayer is that you will approach Lent with a renewed sense of purpose this year, and find yourself connecting more deeply to our Savior's temptation and sacrifice in the coming weeks. Throughout the season I invite you to pause at church each Wednesday at 5:30 pm for our 30-minute Lenten services, where we will sing, pray, and share in some additional thoughts on the gospel lessons leading us toward Easter. Also available again this year is a professionally-published daily Lenten devotional from the United Church of Christ. Those of you familiar with their Advent devotional will enjoy the variety of images offered by a broad spectrum of contributing writers. I hope that you will find it to be a helpful guide as you journey with Jesus toward the cross – and his glorious resurrection on Easter morn (celebrated this year on April 9). See you along the Lenten journey!



NICE... Minnesota Nice? What does that even mean? And is it really what Christian women are called to be *all the time*? If you are a woman who tries to be "nice" all the time, could it be getting in the way of your faith? March Blessing Box is the MN Food Drive

This is a statewide food drive that partners with nearly 300 food shelves including our local Heaven's Table. It is the largest grassroots food and fund drive in MN that in 42 years has distributed over \$18.5 million via the Food Fund. There will be boxes at church to bring in your food donations, but consider giving financially if you are able as it can go further due to access to food banks and discount purchasing programs. This also allows local food shelves to purchase items most needed in their individual communities. If you give financially to the food drive blessing box, just indicate on your check or on an envelope (in church pews or back of church) that it's for the blessing box food drive.

March's recipe is Hailie Stenzel's favorite:

Creamy Garlic Dream Chicken w/ Asparagus

Ingredients

- 6-8 chicken thighs
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 2 tablespoons olive oil

For the SAUCE

- 12 ounces of heavy cream
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup butter melted
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 5 cloves of garlic minced
- 1 tablespoon of dried chives
- 1/2 tablespoon fresh parsley
- 1/2 cup of freshly grated parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 pound of fresh asparagus cut the ends off and cut them into 3 inch strips

Instructions

In a large non-stick skillet , heat the oil on medium.

Take your chicken thighs and season them with all the ingredients that are not 'sauce' ingredients.

Place them one by one into the hot skillet and cook for about 15 minutes, or until browned on both sides, flipping as needed, remove the chicken from the skillet and set aside while you make the sauce.


In a large mixing bowl, combine all sauce ingredients EXCEPT GARLIC & 1 teaspoon olive oil & mix until well combined.

In the same skillet you used for the chicken, add in the 1 teaspoon olive oil and the minced garlic and cook about 1-2 minutes on medium, then pour the sauce mixture in with the garlic & bring to a boil for about 3 minutes or so, mixing constantly.

Reduce heat and add in the asparagus and the chicken, simmer until asparagus is tender, about 5-7 min on LOW covered.
