A SALUTE TO TOUCHET ALUMNI IN THE MILITARY



Joining the military is a big commitment by both you and the military. This commitment is not to be taken lightly. Most first-term enlistments require a commitment to four years active and two years inactive. But the services also offer programs with two-, three- and six-year active duty or reserve enlistments. It depends upon the service and the job that you want. Each branch of the military has a unique mission within the overall mission of U.S. security and peace.

Air Force: The Air Force defends through control and exploitation of air and space.

Army: The dominant land power. The Army generally moves into an area, secures it, and instills order and val-

ues before it leaves. It also guards U.S. installations and properties throughout the world.

Marine Corps: The Marine Corps is known as the U.S.' rapid-reaction force. They are trained to fight by sea and land, and usually are the first "boots on the ground." Marines are known as the world's fiercest warriors.

Navy: The Navy accomplishes its missions primarily by sea, but also by air and land. It secures and protects the oceans around the world to create peace and stability, making the seas safe for travel and trade.

Coast Guard: The Coast Guard's mission is primarily with domestic waterways. The Coast Guard does rescues, law enforcement, drug prevention, and clears waterways.

Army National Guard: Each state has its own Guard, as required by the Constitution; in fact, it is the only branch of the military whose existence is actually required by the Constitution.

Three Legendary Touchet Teachers Retire at the End of the 2008 School Year With 96 Years of Combined Service to our Community



Mrs. Suzanne Towery finished with 30 years of service in Touchet, having taught the high school English sequence, German, European, Asian and American history, and Middle School reading.

Mrs. Janis Eaton completed her 32nd year teaching. She has taught Family and Consumer Sciences primarily, but has also taught middle school English, social studies and science. She has also been in charge of the May Day court (and May Pole streamers!) since she started at Touchet.

Mrs. Phyllis Johnson has finished her 34th year teaching at Touchet. She has taught all elementary grades, but fourth grade has been her favorite, because she prefers teaching the Washington State history curriculum.

The best story in 35 years of teaching begins like this: Mrs. Phyllis Johnson's second grade class was in charge of the May Pole for May Day in the late '70s. The streamers that had been used up to this point were red and white and "ragged." Mrs. Johnson asked Mrs. Janis Eaton to make new streamers for that year's May Pole. Mrs. Eaton asked a student to measure the old streamers and proceeded to make beautiful new pastel ones. When Mrs. Johnson's class tried the new streamers out, just days before May Day, they discovered that the streamers were too short! Panicked, Mrs. Johnson asked janitor Frank Scott, to cut the pole shorter, so the new streamers would work. While Mrs. Johnson was reading to her class after lunch that day, she remembered that the pole used for the May Pole was one of the volleyball standards. Rushing out of her classroom, Mrs. Johnson was horrified to learn that Frank had already cut BOTH volleyball standards. It was too late.

Mrs. Johnson sheepishly told then principal Dan See what she had done. She remembers his face turning a deep dark shade of red. Mrs. Johnson talked to the volleyball coach, Gayle Emery, and she was excited: "Oh good, we'll get new standards." Mrs. Johnson then told Mr. See, "just buy new ones." As Mrs. Johnson tells it, "every year the volleyball team should thank me!" Perhaps in revenge, Mrs. Johnson's class performed the May Pole, with its new streamers and shortened pole, near the parking lot, far away from the audience.

I asked these ladies what they will remember about teaching at Touchet and they mentioned the animals. Mrs. Towery was from the city, but she was given the room at the end of the hall in the new high school building. The first couple of years she taught, the calves would be weaned right outside her window. The lowing was horrible but the kids thought nothing of it. She learned to teach over the noise. Then, one day, there was a herd of lambs racing past her window. "Where are they coming from??" she asked herself. A couple of the students jumped up and helped put them back in the fence.

Early in Mrs. Johnson's career she saw a big white bull racing by her window. "There goes Angel!" a child exclaimed. Lorna Johnson, the aide, raced out of the classroom to put Angel back in his pen. Mrs. Eaton's animal experiences at Touchet mostly entail fighting the mice to keep them out of the food in her classroom. One day, she smelled a mouse cooking under a pan of scrambled eggs. . . doesn't that make you reconsider all those cooking experiences!


Mrs. Eaton, Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Towery have also taken many trips with Touchet students over the years. How many of us remember the Seattle trips with Mrs. Johnson? Especially the class who found the bloody glove in the woods, the year OJ Simpson was indicted.

Mrs. Eaton has taken several groups of students to Europe, introducing them to her cousin who lives in Italy, and instructing them on how to eat gnocchi Italian style. Mrs. Eaton also caught a burglar breaking into the school where she and several students were staying when Touchet played in the first Kingbowl in 1979.

Mrs. Towery drove the small bus over Snoqualmie Pass one year to German camp and had to stop and chain up. Thank goodness she had students with her who knew how to use chains! She also took many kids on senior rafting trips and wants to send a special thank you to Greg Baumgartner who saved her son from yellow jacket wasps on the trip to the windmills.

Those of us who had these teachers (and most Touchet students had all three) are lucky and grateful for the enthusiasm and compassion Mrs. Johnson, Mrs. Eaton and Mrs. Towery taught with. I am sure I am not alone when I fondly remember the patriotic songs in Mrs. Johnson's class, the train ride from Paris to Rome with Mrs. Eaton, and the debates over free speech in public schools in Mrs. Towery's journalism class—oh, and I almost forgot— my term paper in Senior English! Thank you, ladies for investing in Touchet. We will miss you!!!

MELVILLE CUMMINS, CLASS OF 1933, US ARMY

Mel Cummins is a Touchet graduate who was deeply involved in World War II. Mel joined the US Army as a Private on February 11, 1942, just two months after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor. He ended his service as a Master Sergeant on August 11, 1945 just two days after the second atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki, Japan. Although his time in the service was bookended by important events in the Pacific theatre of WWII, Mel spent his time fighting in North Africa and Italy. He was in the army exactly three and a half years.

Mel's first position was in the 5th Army under General Omar Bradley in the invasion of North Africa during World War Two. He began driving a self-propelled gun, -basically a Dodge Pickup with a 37 mm cannon in the back, with no armor- and then was transferred to the 5th Army, 375th Quarter Master Corps. He was involved in the first day of the invasion of North Africa and day six of the invasion of Italy at Salerno on September 15, 1943. By that time he had transferred into a trucking company. He hauled everything imaginable. Supplies, food for the Italian refugees, dynamite in the back and the caps on the seat beside him, prisoners of war, the bodies of causalities, you name it. He spent most of his time in the Army in the Italian campaign, serving there from 1943-1945.

Mel wrote quite a bit about his war experiences. One of the things he wrote was that he was in a forward position on the day the Air Force demolished Monte Cassino in Italy, with three days of steady artillery bombardment. He hauled supplies to the forward troops. He was with the 1st platoon of 375th. They were the first convoy to go by land to reach the beachhead of Anzio, Italy in 1944.

At one time Mel spent 72 hours in one stretch of time without a break hauling ammunition from Terricino to forward positions. Mel also spent time in North Africa, being in the cities of Casablanca and Port Lyatey, Morocco, Tleemson, Algeria, and Karouin, Tunisia. He noted camping once in a farmer's house in Tunisia. The farmer had camels, raised watermelons, and tended an olive grove. The fields were surrounded by cactus plants, the fruits of which were edible. Mel spoke often of Tunisia's beauty. I think he would have liked to have gone back for a visit. Mel was very proud of his military service.

JAYE EVANS, CLASS OF 1953, US ARMY

Jaye Evans was commissioned Second Lieutenant in March of 1959 when he graduated from Eastern Washington College. He was stationed in Fort Benning, GA (Infantry Officer Basic Course, Infantry Officers Advanced Officers Course and Airborne Training); in Germany, (24th Infantry Division); Italy, (Headquarters U.S. Army, Southern European Task Force); Fort Campbell, KY (101st Airborne Division); Republic of Viet Nam (Advisor to combat rifle company); and Fort Bragg, N.C. (United States Army, John F. Kennedy Center For Special Warfare Airborne). He resigned his Commission in June of 1968.

Jaye writes, "As far as I'm concerned, we should personally thank every young man or woman that willingly puts themselves in the path of danger. If we didn't have them, we here in the United States would not be celebrating the many freedoms that we now take for granted and enjoy."

Kate is enrolled in her last year at San Diego State working toward a degree in Kinesio-therapy. She is married to Rob O'Melia, a Marine with two tours of duty in Iraq. Kate is working in a clinic with quadriplegics, paraplegics, stroke patients, cerebral palsy and multiple sclerosis patients, etc. She loves her work and was part of a local TV film clip on institutions working with people with disabilities.



NATHAN CARLISLE, CLASS OF 2000, US ARMY

Nathan is a Calvary Scout stationed at Ft Lewis with the US Army. He is a level three certified combatant and is currently training other soldiers. He has been to Airborne school and will go to level four combatant training this fall. He and his wife Ashley (Durfee) '02 welcomed their first child in April.

He graduated with a Bachelors of Science degree in mathematics. Following roughly 60 days leave he will report to Basic Officer Leaders Course (BOLC) II in Fort Sill, Okalahoma and later BOLC III at Fort Huachuca, Arizona to eventually arrive at his first duty station at Fort Carson, Colorado just south of Colorado Springs.
