December 8, 2019 Second Sunday of Advent Mt 3:1-12

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

A Voice of One! John, just like Elijah (Is it 2 then?), appears as a solitary voice calling people to return to God! A lot of scripture is being fulfilled in just the few opening lines of today's gospel. First, Matthew (3:3) points out that John the Baptist is the prophet that Isaiah 40:3 refers to as "A voice of one crying out in the desert". The Voice's message is, 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths". Immediately in the next verse (Matt 3:4), John's clothing is described to a T (de-Tail) as the same clothes as Elijah wore back in 2 Kings 1:8 "He wore a hairy garment with a leather belt around his waist." What is the significance of these strange clothes? Well, they were not Armani or Canada Goose Down. No surprise then that Jesus contrasted John's humble simplicity from the proud luxury of the Herodian high-class in Luke 7:25-26 "What did you go out in the desert to see? Someone <u>dressed in fine garments</u>? Those who dress luxuriously and live sumptuously are found in royal palaces. What, then, did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, and I tell you more than a prophet." And John's diet of locusts and wild honey reflected Elijah's survivalist ingenuity, showing his trust in God to care for him with whatever the environment provided! God fed and cared for Elijah through generous Raven birds and a widow's miraculously re-filling jar! 1 Kings 17:6 & 9, says "Ravens brought him bread and meat in the morning, and bread and meat in the evening, and he drank from the wadi" and then God sent him 'to Zarephath of Sidon to stay there. By my command, a widow there will feed you.' So John, like Elijah, lived each moment trusting God to provide (clothing & food) whatever he needed in whatever circumstances God called him. But again, Jesus Himself later teaches just that exactly, saying, "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink, or what you will wear about your body. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing?" (Matthew 6:25). Jesus too knew that some religious groups obsessed about the status symbol of their clothes and banquets, "They widen their phylacteries (showy armstraps & headwear) and lengthen their tassels. All their works performed to be seen" (Matthew 23:5) & "they love places of honor at banquets" (Matthew 23:6). They are all wrapped up in luxuriously detailed clothes at elite dinners. So John made a statement with his counter-cultural example of simple and functional clothes! Like a good prophet, he dramatized his message by enacting what he taught.

John's message was 'Repent. The Kingdom is at hand!' Repent today, while you can! Return to the Lord, before He returns to the earth! The message is preached to everyone, but the gospel mentions two particular groups who show up by surprise: Some Pharisees and Sadducees. What is their business in the desert? Are they converting? Are they sincere? With John, we can hope so. But being realistic and aware that they control the corrupt Temple market and its treasury, John suspects that they are only coming out to spy on his teaching and collect 'opposition research' to discredit him and accuse him before Herod & Rome. So John amps up his challenge to them by saying, "Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance" (Matthew 3:8). The Baptist wants them to show their sincerity through their *changed behavior*. They have to let go of their abusive powers. fancy robes, lofty titles and empty prayers. Instead of their religion serving them with perks and privileges, their repentance will serve the poor and previously persecuted (especially those persecuted by the Pharisees because the Pharisees were writing the religious rules to enrich themselves). John challenges them to live up to the kingdom of heaven. If their conversion is genuine, it will be proven in their public example. John says that the coming of Jesus will bring judgement. Jesus brings the tools to test each person's sincerity: the axe to harvest (v.10) and the fan to winnow (v.12). He will separate the fruit from the fluff, the wheat from the chaff. John proves his conversion by his own good works and eventual martyrdom. But will the Pharisees produce fruit of their conversion? They presumptively try to claim Abrahamic ancestry as insurance of their salvation, but John points out that in the desert everyone has to carry his/her own water! Membership in Abraham's bloodline is no birthright to salvation. The only salvation birthright is baptismal rebirth in Christ. And John demands that baptism shows itself in 'worthy fruits proving one's repentance'. Anyone baptized in Christ will show proof of the works and words of Jesus in his/her life. That is a real witness! True repentance bears fruit!
