After the close of the public hearings Supervisor Maas called the meeting to Order and Salute to the Flag at 7:57 PM. She also asked for a moment of silence for the Country of Ukraine.

Supervisor Maas also noted donations can be dropped off for the Country of Ukraine here in Town Hall until Saturday, when they will be brought to the County for shipping.

**Motion Approve Minutes:** Councilman Welsh made a motion to approve the February 16, 2022 and March 2<sup>nd</sup> 2022 meeting minutes, seconded by Councilman Durland and all were unanimously in favor.

# **Supervisor Report**

- Cash Flow- 101% of revenue budgeted at 115% of expenses, higher due to the \$45,000 paid to DC for Workers Comp, tax bill printing, highway garage repair
- Sales Tax update later in the meeting, a check is coming for \$239,478.00 from DC
- Taxes collected 86% of tax revenue
- Received the \$5,000 for the composting toilet
- Filed for May 1 extension for AUD as per usual protocol
- Comp Alliance has given the Town a \$500 bonus check for member loyalty award
- Town Board members have received the list of warrants/abstracts; cash receipts, escrow reports, Building Dept. report, performance vs budget report and lists of all deposits made in both the General Fund and Highway Fund.
- All Escrow checks will be distributed for any abandoned or closed accounts
- Habitat for Humanity will be back on April 23<sup>rd</sup> at the Recycling Center
- Seeking Volunteers for the Tymor 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party Planning
- Orange Bag Cleanup Campaign with UVFD is approaching date TBA

# **Town Board Reports**

*Councilman Welsh* has been working with the committee on the MS4 withdrawal based on town population. He is hopeful at some point Union Vale will be removed from the program even though we adhere to the guidelines, they would like to eliminate the expense of the report. *Councilman Durland* nothing to report at this time

Councilman McGivney nothing to report at this time

*Councilman Gusikoff* – noted the cameras have been ordered for W. Clove Mountain Road and will soon be installed to mitigate the littering in Town.

# **Highway Report**

Superintendent Kading spoke about the 5-year maintenance plan. He also spoke about the culvert issues in town. Mr. Kading spoke with DC Soil and Water and is unsure if DEC needs to be involved at this point. He is waiting for pricing and it may need to be advertised for public bid. He will adjust his projects based on pricing. Supervisor Maas noted that they will review any grant opportunities that may assist with the financial end. Superintendent Kading spoke about the need for a york rake which maintains the dirt roads in town. This is necessary but can wait using the existing rake which is a bit smaller than the needs. He will wait to get the prices on culvert pipes before moving forward on this purchase. They have replaced 90% of the average size culverts but there are 4 that are of future issue. The 284 will be prepared for next meeting.

# **Board, Committee, Commission & Council Reports**

### Parks

Submitted by Park Manger, Jake Gosnell. A reminder to residents and guest that dogs are allowed on the West side of Town Hall. Due to evening temperatures falling below freezing the park bathrooms will remain closed until the weather warms up. Mr. Gosnell asks that the public stay off the soccer fields until the ground becomes firmer. Fishing season in approaching and residents may obtain a fishing pass from Town Hall for Tymor Park. Upcoming projects include tree work, the resident pavilion updates and general spring cleanup.

### Recreation

Submitted by Alison Croke, Recreation Director. Registration for summer camp is increasing daily. Traditional camp is up to 75% full for all session, Kids Camp is almost full and the response to the new Teen Leadership program has been very positive with 2 session close to reaching max capacity. Pool membership and pool membership party is available for registration on the park website. The St. Patrick's Day themed TGTT party is underway and they are looking forward to a full week of TGTT during Spring Break. Upcoming events including 'Egg Hunts for All' on April 16<sup>th</sup> which includes traditional hunt, wheelchair accessible, visually impaired and sensory friendly.

#### **Constable Report**

Submitted by Head Constable, George Treadwell. February 2022. Constables patrolled approximately 553 miles of roads including town properties filling the explorer with 34.2 gallons of gas. Court dates totaled 53 cases with 33 actual appearances and no incidents to report. Reported During Patrols: 2-13-22 issued parking violation for snow ordinance after prior verbal warning. 2-21-22- Ford Explorer 5,000-mile service & new battery installed at 78,625 miles.

#### **Animal Control Report**

Submitted by ACO, Mary Jean Calvi. February 2022: no lost dogs, 1 found dog, 1 wildlife call and 1 call regarding dogs/town code.

#### Land Use Moratorium to Review Town Center Zone & Private Roads & Common Driveways: DC & PB Responses

Supervisor Maas noted on April 6<sup>th</sup> there will be a public hearing, this will not be on the details of any changes, this is just to permit the time to research the Town Code.

# Library Consultant- Using a Professional to Help Determine the Next Steps

Supervisor Maas explained that the Town has engaged the services of A. A. Cohen & Associates. Mr. Cohen has created a survey that will be distributed through the website and UnionValeMail. There will be a series of public meetings at various time during the day and week to capture a wide audience to get all resident feedback in order to advise the Town Board. This will all begin in April and the schedule will be published on the website as well as channel 22, and possibly publish it in the Northern Dutchess News.

Supervisor Maas asked all department heads to review the list and move forward.

#### Parkinson's Awareness Month

Resident, Nancy Redkey, writes the Town every year to pass an annual resolution to declare April 'Parkinson's Awareness Month'. Supervisor Maas thanks Nancy for submitting this each request.

# **Dutchess County Sales Tax Update**

Supervisor Maas reported that this year we received an unexpected \$239,000.00 that we were not expecting and how important this is for the Town. Going forward, over the next 10 years, the County has proposed each Town getting 9.5% percentage of the tax, based on population. This will keep us in line with what the Town has been getting which is between \$230,000 to \$270,000.00. The Town must be conservative moving forward and planning for the years ahead and budget lower than the projected percentage as this can change unexpectedly.

# Discussion NY Stretch Code, Consider Pros & Cons for Union Vale

Supervisor Maas stated that Code Enforcement Officer, George Kolb attended a webinar training and reported that the bottom line was about a 2% extra in cost but the savings are amazing and some aspects of the presentation were terrific. Now the Town must consider the pros and cons for what is best for Union Vale. The Town Board has received a copy of the presentation for review and Supervisor Maas offered to have Mr. Kolb present next month. Overall it is appealing due to the long-term savings.

# RESOLUTION # 23 OF 2022 ACCEPTING THE DUTCHESS COUNTY SALES TAX PROPOSAL FOR 2023

WHEREAS, Dutchess County has to renegotiate a new ten-year sales tax agreement with all cities and towns of Dutchess County for 2023 by June of 2022; and

WHEREAS, for the last ten years, the Town of Union Vale, and all other towns have been guaranteed a base sales tax payment along with a growth payment if the collections realized are larger than the base year of 2012; and

WHEREAS, the average growth rate has been 5 percent with only one year in the last ten, having a down year in sales tax collected (2020); and

WHEREAS, Dutchess County is proposing for the next ten years to pay all the towns a flat 9.5% rate based on population in an effort to hold a fixed, predictable amount that is easy to budget for and consistent or better than what towns have experienced in the last ten years;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Town Board of Union Vale agrees with Dutchess County's sales tax proposal and accepts the terms and appreciates participating in the program that may fluctuate but adds so much to the revenue line.

#### **RESOLUTION OF ADOPTION**

#### **Senior Citizens Exemption Amendment**

Councilman Welsh offered the following Resolution, which was seconded by Councilman Durland, who moved its adoption:

WHEREAS, a Local Law was introduced by the Town Board of the Town of Union Vale as Local Law #1 – 2022, entitled A LOCAL LAW OF THE TOWN OF UNON VALE, DUTCHESS COUNTY, NEW YORK TO AMEND TOWN CODE CHAPTER 196, ARTICLE I, "SENIOR CITIZENS EXEMPTION" TO ALLOW ANY SENIOR IN DEFINED CIRCUMSTANCES, TO FILE AN APPLICATION FOR EXEMPTION PURSAUNT TO RPTL §467 NOT LATER THAN THE LAST DATE ON WHICH A PETITION WITH RESPECT TO COMPLAINTS OF ASSESSMENT MAY BE FILED; and

*WHEREAS*, a public hearing in relation to said Local Law was held on March 16, 2022 at 7:00 p.m., Prevailing Time; and

*WHEREAS*, notice of said public hearing was given pursuant to the terms and provisions of the Municipal Home Rule Law of the State of New York; and

*WHEREAS*, said Local Law has been on the desks of the members of the Town Board of the Town of Union Vale for at least seven (7) days, exclusive of Sunday; and

*NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED* that the following Local Law, which adds a new paragraph to the end of Chapter 196, Article I, Senior Citizens Exemption, of the Union Vale Code, with the language to be added <u>underscored</u>, is hereby adopted as follows:

Section 1: <u>Any person or persons 65 years of age or older may file an application for an</u> <u>exemption pursuant to §467 of the Real Property Tax Law no later than the last date on which a</u> <u>Petition with respect to the complaints of assessment may be filed, whether such person or</u> <u>persons had previously filed such an application, if the failure to timely file the application</u> <u>resulted from (a) a death of the applicant's spouse, child, parent, brother or sister or (b) an illness</u> <u>of the applicant or of the applicant's spouse, child, parent, brother or sister, which actually</u> <u>prevented the applicant from filing on a timely basis, as certified by a licensed physician.</u>

Section 2: Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect upon adoption by the Town Board and filing with the New York

State Secretary of State in accordance with applicable provisions of law, and specifically Article

3, §27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.
