## PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE:

## From the Heidelberg Catechism

Question: What is your only comfort in life and in death?

Answer: That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life and in death—

to my faithful Savior, Jesus Christ.

He has fully paid for all my sins with his precious blood, and has set me free from the tyranny of the devil.


He also watches over me in such a way

that not a hair can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven; in fact, all things must work together for my salvation.

Because I belong to him, Christ, by his Holy Spirit, assures me of eternal life and makes me wholeheartedly willing and ready from now on to live for him.

February – the month of "Love" – or so it would seem, just walking through the stores, all gaudy with pink and red hearts and chocolate candy everywhere. Not my favorite holiday, I admit... I have always thought of it as a time for businesses to make money on cards and flowers and a day that puts pressure on couples; I think it is sort of strange to set apart a day for love, because genuine love has a life and season of its own and expresses itself best when it is unrestrained. Although I supposed it is good to schedule a reminder to show our love to those we treasure, love cannot be designated to one day a year.

But this year, I find myself contemplating the love of God, which is expressed to us through Jesus Christ. The Apostle Paul himself prayed that his converts would "have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God." (Ephesians 3:18,19) And, while human love has seasons with high points and low points, God's love is consistent and unchanging. We are amazingly and infinitely loved. "No greater love has a person than this, than to lay down one's life for another," Jesus said – and then, he did it. The above confession says it all – we are deeply, intimately completely loved by God.





As pure and deep as God's love is, we often have a difficult time sensing the truth of it – not because we are bad, but because we are human. Our work schedules, our moods, our ability to be with the people of God, the good and bad days of our lives – all of these affect us and sometimes we can wonder if its real, or if we are worth loving. We are not alone in that – even the saints of scripture wondered:

But Zion said, "The Lord has forsaken me, the Lord has forgotten me."

15 "Can a mother forget the baby at her breast

and have no compassion on the child she has borne?

Though she may forget, I will not forget you!

16 See, I have engraved you on the palms of my hands; (Isaiah 49)

I don't know how this year has begun for you – but for some in our number, it has gotten off to a rough start. So, hear the word of the Lord as we move on in the year: You are loved. You are valued. You are cared for. You belong to God.

He graduated from the Government Bilingual High School Mbatu-Bamenda in Cameroon. This school is no longer in operation due to the Civil Crisis. Runick met his wife Anita Fru at a summer computer boot camp in Bamenda, Cameroon.

Runick had three goals to accomplish in his life. He wanted a real job, become a role model for others and to establish a family of his own. I do believe he did indeed accomplish these. His most memorable event in his life was passing the Cameroon

GCE Advanced Level passport into the University. This was the State Exam.

Runick is very thankful for having a lovely and healthy family. A beautiful wife, Anita and two wonderful children Bryson Cho, and Bella-Rae. He is also thankful for being accepted and supported by the First Presbyterian Church faith family. He has a sense of belonging from this faith community.

He is thankful for having the strength to render or impact the lives of others. When asked who his hero was Runick said his mother. He lost his father at the age of 11 and his mother never ceased in believing in him and supporting his dreams.

The funniest thing that has happened to him was when he worked as a Customer Service Representative. He would often get mistaken for the opposite gender while on the phone due to his voice. He often was addressed as "MAM". Runick officially became a member of

## THE HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE

First Presbyterian is a supporting member of the Missouri Valley Coalition for Homeless People (MVCHP). The Coalition is comprised of non-profits, government agencies, churches, businesses, and citizens all interested in assisting the needs of the homeless population. Member agencies advocate for safe, stable, and life-affirming housing for all. Their motto says it all: Everyone deserves a place to call home.

Members meet monthly to provide updates about agency activities and needs. Special events such as the Homelessness Awareness Week activities and the Project Service Connect are organized through the Coalition. Many First Presbyterian members have donated to and volunteered for these events over the past several years. The Coalition also participates in the annual Point-in-Time count. The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January during the hours of 3 am to 5 am. The Department of Housing and Urban Development requires this count of states receiving federal homelessness funds.

Through our church membership, we are able to monitor needs of the participating agencies and help through donations of goods, funding, and volunteerism. ## **Hospitality Committee Donation Opportunity**

First Presbyterian Church will once again be collecting food for the Bismarck Emergency Food Pantry during February. The food pantry, a non-profit, volunteer organization has served this community since 1979. In 2022, the Food Pantry served an average of 832 individuals monthly distributing an average of 17, 157 pounds of food each month. This re-

monthly, distributing an average of 17,157 pounds of food each month. This represents an increase of 32% more people served and 20% more food distributed.

This year, as the price of food continues to rise and the number of people facing food insecurity increases, donations are needed more than ever to support the work of the Food Pantry. Please consider donating non-perishable food items during February. Items may be placed in the donation box in the church narthex.

The Per Capita Special Offering is a special offering of our church that extends the entire year. We start to talk about it in January of each year and provide added information throughout the year in the form of periodic minutes for mission,




Per Capita is the amount that the church must pay to the larger church for each member of the church. This year that amount is \$50 per member. The per capita payment of each church in our denomination is divided between the Presbytery, the Synod and the General Assembly and provides the most substantial source of funding that supports the larger church and enables it to provide the connectionism that makes the Presbyterian Church unique and enables it to function the way that it does. If you have not served in a leadership position in the church, you may not appreciate all that the larger church does in support of the individual churches and its members. Without the connectional relationships that exist in our denomination between the individual churches and the Presbyteries, Synods and the General Assembly many churches would find it very difficult to survive without the guidance and leadership offered by the larger church organization and staff personnel. One example of how the larger church benefitted our church in recent years is the Investment Loan Program (ILP) that financed the Phase I of our HVAC system upgrade with a 2% loan. Without this program our church would have found it much more difficult and expensive to obtain the necessary financing.

We mention the Per Capita Special Offering starting in January and request that each member consider giving a gift to the church of \$50 to cover their share of the church's financial obligation to the larger church. If you are a member that pledges income each year to the church, and would like to be able to help support other members who might find it financially unfeasible to pledge or to make the separate per capita donation, your separate gift of \$50 will help cover the cost of membership for that less fortunate member of the church. You can make your per capita gift to the church simply by making out a check and sending it to the church office with per capita written in the memo blank on the check. You may also place it in the collection baskets in the rear of the sanctuary on Sunday morning.

Please consider making a separate per capita payment to the church this year and feel confident that you are doing your part to help support our Presbyterian Church and its membership in the largest Presbyterian Church organization in the world.

### **CLERK'S REPORT**

The deaths of Jack Wilson, Bev Rudrud, Arnie Arneson, Bernie Schue, Arley Gallup and Nils Pearson were noted. Membership is 315.

## **MODERATOR'S REPORT**

Pastor Leanne thanked the staff and volunteers who have been especially busy in the past two months. Two immediate goals for the next months will be a publicity/visibility plan and improved streaming of services. A donor has provided \$10,000 to purchase equipment needed for streaming. During each Session meeting, Elders will explore the impacts affecting our congregation in the next 15 years. Issues such as the economy, aging congregation, retirement of pastor and parish nurse, loss of a generation, fewer giving units, building utilization and finding volunteers were noted. Discussion will continue monthly.

### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Hospitality—Volunteers will be needed to serve the Banquet on February 25.

**Property and Equipment**—The church insurance policy will pay all but \$1,000 for the elevator repairs.

**Proclamation-Christian Education**—The committee is planning to invite an inspirational speaker, joining a retreat to Wesley Acres in April and a mission trip to Bdecan (Spirit Lake Reservation).

**Proclamation-Worship and Music**—Communion dates were approved for 2023: first Sunday of each month except April, Maundy Thursday, Easter Sunday and Christmas Eve. Communion serving trays will be used again beginning in April.

**Resource Management**—Session approved placing \$250,000 from each of the checking accounts (one at US Bank and one at Cornerstone) into laddered CDs with the interest going to the general fund, helping to reduce the deficit. Total pledges for the 2023 Stewardship campaign were \$317,664.

**Board of Deacons**—Assignments and schedules for ushering and committees were made.

Nanc Skaret will be Co-Moderator with Dennis Rosenkranz and Karmen Svihovec will serve as Secretary. Two Deacons volunteered to be on Nominating Committee: Anita Fru and Alice Nix.

**Child Care Center Board**—Reviews of staff will be finished in February. Staff received a 3% wage increase.

Nominating—Two Elders volunteered to be Co-Chairs for 2023: Rusty Bender and Juanita Hocking.

Session approved the use of our church for the wedding of non-members, Daniel and Kelsey Kimball, March 25.
