Ron Elliott was born in Lexington, KY, March 12, 1934 to a carpenter and a hair dresser, and he followed in both of their footsteps. After attending The University of Kentucky, he worked as a carpenter making 25 cents an hour more than most, because he choose to work above 50 feet. He joined the Navy at a ripe old age of 21, and, as a journeyman carpenter, bypassed basic training. He was assigned to the Sea Bees as a 2nd class Petty Officer working on the D.E.W. Line (Distant Early Warning) that extended from Newfoundland to South America. He spent his Korean War duty in Antigua, British West Indies and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. After his discharge from the Navy, Ron Jr. came along pretty fast. Besides selling life insurance for John Hancock he raced Hot Rods with the Pacers Hot Rod Club. He loved to show his cars and was especially proud of his 1934 Ford 4 door sedan with suicide doors. Tiring of the insurance business, he moved to Memphis to join the beauty business with his brother, Lew. Eventually they bought Molar Beauty School, the school Ron graduated from in downtown Memphis, TN. While in the beauty school profession, he bought his first motorcycle, a 1963 Triumph. He really got into customizing it, so much so, he would bring it to work with him and work on it in the basement of the 4 story building. To do this, he would raise the elevator past the first floor and hook a chain to the front end, then lower it to the basement. The fire marshal would have frowned I'm sure.

After Dr. Martin Luther King was assassinated in 1968, the marching and rioting was so tremendous downtown, that Ron would often sit in the front school window with a gun in his hand to make sure no one broke the windows out of his business, like they did to so many others. Eventually he had to close the school down, and he, Lew, Marvin Shackleford and Jim Haas opened up Super Cycle in midtown Memphis in 1971. There were 17 other motorcycle shops in town, tearing apart what we're now trying to put back stock. During the 70's they had a pretty good customer from down the street, Elvis Presley. He bought two Volkswagen Trikes and had Lisa Marie's H-D golf cart restored among other things. Super Cycle would regularly pick up his bikes at Graceland to service.

Ron still has his first Harley, a 1967 Sportster, and his first big twin Harley, a 1967 FLH. Ron and wife, Tina, attend many AMCA swap meets finding old parts to put together his MANY projects. He has completed most of them, and thought he was close to finishing, but he is always coming up with and engine he would just "stumble" upon. He has most of his motorcycles in the museum at Super Cycle, but they are starting to spill out into the show room. Ron has several Police and Firefighter friends and customers, therefor, has taken a particular liking to restoring Police motorcycles. And has even dedicated a wall in the museum for Police and Firefighters.

Ron had been friends with Fleming Horne for 30 something years. Any time Ron needed something he didn't have to complete a project, Fleming wouldn't sell Ron a part, he would "loan" it to him. "Fleming was and still is an inspiration to me as to how I feel about the old stuff, not only bikes, but all other collectibles, and to the friends who value them as well. I have never met a better bunch of people like the AMCA people, the caretakers of the keepsakes."
