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

SERVICES

There are three prayers recited every day: (1) "Shacharis", (2) "Mincha" (3) "Ma'ariv".

<u>Shacharis</u> This is the first service of the day and is recited at any time from sunrise until noon. It is the longest of the three services. The two most important parts are the "Shema" and "Shemoneh Esrei". On Mondays and Thursdays in addition to the regular service the Torah is read after the "Shemoneh Esrei" prayer has been recited by the congregation and the cantor.

Mincha This is the afternoon service, recited from about 1:00 p.m. until sunset. It is a short service that is divided into three parts: the opening prayer, "Asrei", the "Shemoneh Esrei", and the closing prayer "Oleinu". "Oleinu" is the closing prayer of every service. When our people take time out of business in midday to recite a service to G-d, they deserve a short prayer.

<u>Ma'ariv</u> - The "Shabbos" evening service may not be recited until Shabbos is over. This service is the same as the weekday "Ma'ariv" with the addition of a special paragraph in the "Shemoneh Esrei" that officially proclaims the end of the Sabbath. Before the "Oleinu" another version of this prayer is recited aloud to proclaim to all that the Sabbath is over. This prayer is called the "Havdalah".

In reading last months article on the "Suddur" you now have a general idea to the contents of the "Siddur". Surely you will agree that it is a priceless treasure. Like the Torah, the more we attend Friday night services and study the "Siddur" the more we learn about our deepest religion and our personal faith. The "Siddur" has served the Jewish people for more than a 1000 years in times of sorrow and joy. The next time you attend a service just stop and think of how many people all over the world are reading the same prayers at this very moment. Millions raise their voices to G-d in solemn prayer. You are part of this great spiritual army of Judaism.
