It is sometimes the small things that keep people's spirits high in difficult times: roses and flowers in the park, a summer evening concert, a scholarship to a local student. We have enough money in the bank to keep these traditions alive short term. We realize the toll that COVID-19 has placed on all the local non-profits to whom we generally donate thousands of dollars annually through our basket spectacular proceeds. At Advisory Board, we thought we would begin a Step-up Challenge. As most of our member supported fundraisers have been canceled or postponed for the foreseeable future, we wanted to ask our members who are able, to contribute an extra \$10 (or any amount they wish) to their annual dues and this money would be set aside to assist the community where needed in the coming year. We have set a goal of 50% member participation and we thank all of you for considering this as an option for helping our neighbors in crisis.

I truly hope to see you at our outdoor meeting in the Park. We look forward to coming together and hearing your ideas for serving our community in a new fashion that keeps you safe and still provides the community service that Concourse Club is known for, and maybe some new traditions may be formed along the way!
