WATER QUALITY UPDATE

On December 3, 2019 the Amana Society Service Company sent out a letter warning of excess Nitrate levels in the drinking water. Each Amana well field has a monthly requirement to be tested for Nitrates. In the month of November the reported Nitrates level at the High Amana Wellfield was above the maximum allowed limit of 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L) of water. The operating permit issued by the DNR required that all three pumps be in operation at the time the sample is drawn. We chose to not operate one of the three pumps since June of this year because we knew it had high levels of Nitrates. The operating permit did not allow us to leave that pump off to grab the sample, although that was our normal operation since June of 2019. We did grab a sample from the water tower to verify the quality of the water delivered to our customers. The results were 4.2 mg/L, which is well below the maximum allowed.

The Amana Society Service Company has received permission from the lowa DNR to collect samples under the same operating condition that we normally operate. We expect the next sample result to be around 4.0 mg/L and no special precaution will be necessary thereafter, i.e. the concern of getting too much Nitrates goes away. We must follow the requirements of the lowa DNR and we work with them to change the permit requirements when it makes sense for safety and accuracy. We are dedicated to provide you safe drinking water and will do our best to do so!


