
A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

July 4, 2021

When I was in school it always amazed me to learn how some of our best known artists, writers and musicians we love today were not appreciated in their own time. They may not have even been recognized at all (Bach when? Somebody Done Go?) For example, Franz Kafka, Emily Dickinson, Vincent Van Gogh, Henry David Thorough, Johann Sebastian Bach, Claude Monet and Edgar Allen Poe were all barely noted in their lives, yet they became great and so popular after their deaths. Maybe a 'familiarity bias' leads us to discredit or discard what we think we already know, or we ignore people too close to us? Jesus confronts this experience in His hometown in today's gospel reading. Returning to Nazareth with His disciples, Jesus encounters some surprise as He teaches in the synagogue and people start back-talking about him (Wait: is this the same little Jesus who dropped the bucket down into the well shutting off the village water that Friday afternoon, or the neighbor kid who sang at all of our town meetings?) Was it Jesus' teaching (anti-provincial and uncomfortably inclusive) that led His old neighbors to reject Him? Or maybe the fact that He returned with an accompanying 'posse' of 'outsider' disciples? Or did His town reject Him only because they learned so late of His outstanding accomplishments around Judea (Why weren't such wonders done here in Nazareth first?-Why did we have to hear about you from those Capernaumites?) Without an individual survey of them, we won't know exactly what they were jealous about and rejecting Jesus over, as it could be as simple as 'the good old boys club of Nazareth' wanted to market Jesus themselves to put 'Nazareth on the map'! For whatever reason, Nazareth rejects Jesus. We learn that even some of Jesus' own family misunderstands Him and tries to manage Him (Mark 3:21 "When his relatives heard of this they set out to seize him, for they said, "He is out of his mind.") Just a few verses later in Mark 6:11, Jesus will teach that when we are rejected we should simply move on (shake the dust and move along), or as a recent 12-step friend advised about the 4 P's 'Pause, Pray, Process, & Proceed'! So Jesus practices what he preaches and when Nazareth rejects Him, He moves on to new mission

As a teaching lesson to process this hurtful rejection, Jesus suggests a proverb "Prophets are not without honor, except in their own native place". This proverb is repeated in all four gospels (Mark 6:4-Matt 13:57-Luke 4:24- John 4:44). It reminds me of the supposed comment from Mark Twain that 'an expert is someone from the next town over'. Yet, also, our human tendency to ignore or miss what is right in front of us is captured in the story of the two swimming fish who are asked by the frog who jumped in the lake, 'How is the water?' and the two fish look at each other puzzled saying, 'What in the world is water?' The last thing we can describe may be the thing we most depend upon or are so deeply immersed in! So, the town of Nazareth teaches us not to overlook what is right in front of us. The sad reality of missed opportunities humbles us to keep aware every moment. This moment just passed- there goes another! What graces (present-s) are missed by us due to our own predeterminations or preoccupations? I sometimes compare Jesus' rejection at Nazareth like how we go looking for something that turns out to already be in our possession. For example, I scramble around the desk looking for my glasses and guess what? They are on top of my head, or where is that pencil to make a measurement mark, "Oh, it's behind my ear" or "where are those house keys?" They are in that jumble of my fingers holding on to bags, papers and coffee cup as I stand at the front door. What we need (& God knows what we truly need), is likely already set in our path waiting for us to see it and take it up. God hands us what we need, if we are open to receive it. I think Jesus said as much following a miracle healing of a 'possessed man' when Jesus said, "But if it is by the finger of God that [I] drive out demons, then the kingdom of God has come upon you")Luke 11:20). Several chapters later, Jesus more bluntly says that what we need is preplaced right within the moment, when he says in Luke 17:21, "Behold, the kingdom of God is among you." Peace, Fr Brian


