Focus -Hope can be more general, while prayer is usually directed towards a higher power. For example, you might hope for good weather but pray for healing or guidance.

Effort -Hope involves effort, while prayer involves God's grace. For example, you can hope that a factory's dispatch schedule is honored because you can work for it, but you can only pray for a friend in the ICU to get well.

Expectation -Hope is an expectation and anticipation that rests in what we believe. It's more substantial than mere wishful thinking.

Relationship -Prayer is a relationship and communication with God. It's an act of faith, and its expectation is shaped by hope.

Patience -Praying with hope involves patiently waiting for God to act. It's praying consistently with optimism and confidence that God hears our prayers.

Some food for thought.
