Diary of a Young Naturalist, by Dara McAnulty

southern Africa, via France, eastern Spain, Morocco, and either over the Sahara, around the west coast of Africa, or east down the Nile valley. This incredible migration will never cease to amaze and inspire me--that these small powerhouses can fly 200 miles every day for six weeks, in a race against starvation and exhaustion. When I start to worry about school and all of the newness--of people, of classrooms--I think about the resilience and determination of swallows." And this: "I'm swinging on our garden swing. It's full sun and the small enclosed space is brimming with birdsong and hiving activity. I hop off and peer into our wee bucket. I remember the day we filled it with stones and old bits of clay pot and impatiently let it fill with rainwater. Then dragonfly nymph and the holy grail: tadpoles. Birds drink and bathe in our magic cauldron, while under the surface metamorphosis is alive and well with five whole tadpoles! Squiggly, squirming teardrops, eating algae from the side of our potion pot. If you brew your own cauldron, magic will surely happen."

Is Your Future in Ireland?

It's so much fun to look longingly at photos of Ireland, yours or your friend's collections, and dream of what life would be like if only you could spend a LONG time on the isle or even to retire there permanently. You've probably wondered, how realistic is that goal? As awesome as it is to think of waking up to the beautiful green hillsides or gaily painted houses, here are a few facts that you will need to consider before buying a one-way ticket. [Please note, these apply to the Republic of Ireland. Rules for Northern Ireland are based on UK requirements.]

First there are immigration laws and visa considerations. Until 2015, it wasn't too difficult to get permission to immigrate, but things have changed. No one is sure exactly why a country with such positive relations with its diaspora is trying so hard to keep them from coming home, except for concerns about National Health Services, which are high on the list of things that could be strained, and affordable housing availability. Chief among the requirements for retiring in Ireland is the income minimum—50,000 Euros for one person or 100,000 Euros annually for married couples regardless of cash reserves. Long-term residency will not be approved with less. Currently these are the requirements:

- You may remain in country for 90 days with no visa, allowing for intermittent residency without immigration complications; however, in order to immigrate, pre-clearance should be obtained.
- Citizenship by Descent is possible if one of your parents or grandparents were Irish citizens, even if they never lived there.
- Otherwise, to move to Ireland pre-retirement, you will need a work permit. For Americans this means having a job that pays 30,000 Euros or more annually and even better, 60,000 Euros or more, and the job should be in certain industries, such as IT or medical professionals. A two-year Green Card will cost you 1000 Euros. Then you would be eligible to apply to immigrate permanently. After five years you will need to renew your permission to remain.
- For students studying in Ireland, you need a Student Visa. If you wish to stay after your course of study, you must register with immigration in person at a Garda (police) station within 90 days of arriving in the country, initiating the process.
- Obtaining a D-visa entitles the holder to apply for residency, but one must meet qualification standards. A fee of 500 Euros is paid and approval takes several months. Marrying or otherwise becoming the dependent of a citizen or long-term resident is one way, as long as they can financially support you and you must have lived in the country for several years to be considered for citizenship. Then background and financial investigations will be conducted.

Finally, the Justice Minister may approve the application.

Investing serious money or starting a business in Ireland will allow you and your family to move to Ireland and remain for up to five years with the likelihood of being renewed thereafter.

If you choose to live in Ireland as a U.S. citizen, it's good to know that per agreement, you would be paying your taxes to Ireland, rather than face two countries' taxation laws. Interestingly, taxes are lower for low-income earners and higher for middle incomes and above than in the U.S.

Now, once you are on the Emerald Isle, where should you take up residence? This is a very important question as it relates to the cost of housing. For instance, County Wicklow was found to have the highest cost (over 300,000 Euros) for buying a three-bedroom semi-detached house in a recent study of cost by county published in the *Irish Mirror News*, while Longford (a landlocked county) had the most affordable at 115,000 Euros. In the first quarter of 2022, inflation has not been kind; hopefully that situation improves in the near future. Expect to drop 20,000 Euros for a down payment.

Well, I think that should be enough for you to chew on for a while. Thanks for reading!

Member Spotlight: Dain Forsythe

If you were able to attend the April IAS meeting you had the pleasure of watching fellow IAS member, Dain Forsythe, play for us as part of the duo *Mountain Road*. Dain is a talented musician and teacher. (My oldest son took tin whistle lessons from Dain when he was little. He has since moved on to violin, but I like to think that Dain was an integral part of my son's love of music.)

How long have you been a member of the IAS and how did you find out about it? I found out about the IAS shortly after moving here in the fall of 2006. I first became a member in early 2007.

How long have you been a member of Mountain Road? Do you mostly play traditional music? Do you compose original songs? Do you play outside of New Mexico and will you be playing at the upcoming Celtic Festival in ABQ?

Mountain Road has been active since early 2019. Scott Estes and I had known each other for over ten years, and we both had dedicated our musical lives to Irish Traditional Music long before we met. At about the same time, I committed myself to developing my skills on the Irish wooden flute, and as a means of encouraging myself to continue to learn tunes and develop my flute skills, I decided to ask Scott if he'd partner up with me on guitar and bouzouki. We began performing in public in 2019. We have been booked to perform both days at the Rio Grande Valley Celtic Festival (June 4-5), and I'm to provide an Irish bodhràn workshop as well.

How many instruments do you play and are you self-taught? Who are some of your musical influences or someone you would like to play with in the future?

I play three instruments well: the Irish simple system flute, the bodhrán, and several whistles in different keys. When I began seriously studying Irish music in the late 90s, I began listening to cassette tapes and CDs of players like Mary Bergin, Kevin Burke, Paddy Keenan, Johnny McDonagh, Seamus Egan, and listening to singers like Karan Casey, Frank Harte, and Seosamh Ó hÉanaí (Joe Heaney). At the time I played the Great Highland Bagpipes, and had been providing piping services for funerals and weddings throughout Alabama, where I lived at the time. And while my heritage is Scottish, the Irish music struck my soul in a particularly sensitive and spiritual way.

Would you like to talk about your "regular" job as an English teacher? Do you teach music at your school? My profession is that of a HS English teacher. I teach at a public charter STEM school in Rio Rancho, The ASK Academy. Teaching English at a STEM school is interesting. I enjoy making connections between math and science and writing and literature.

Have you been to Ireland? What are some other hobbies, interests, or Irish things you like to do in your limited free time?

My family and I traveled to Ireland this past winter. My wife is an educator and historian who spent multiple college summers working in Irish Montessori schools and Quaker support programs for mothers in Belfast. When we were there this winter, we spent time in Kildare, Dublin, Connemara, Galway, Clare, Mallow, Kerry, Dingle, and Cork City. I sat in on a couple of sessions in Galway city.

Larry Kirwan's Bright, Shining Dancing Moment Review: *Paradise Square*

[Editor's Note: Many of you will remember that Larry Kirwan visited us by Zoom in April of 2021. This is a review of his new play, *Paradise Square*, at the Ethel Barrymore Theater, 47th Street/Broadway, NYC, which Bill saw on March 26, 2022.]

Paradise Square, the big-time Broadway production which has evolved from Larry Kirwan's acclaimed 2012 off-Broadway play Hard Times, is a rousing musical extravaganza full of dancing, loving, singing, freedom, and joy! And fierce defiance of bigotry and repression! Black 47 fans (like myself) who fondly recall the band's blissful 25 years of

dancing/rock concerts and Larry Kirwan's roof-raising anthem "Five Points" from the *Green Suede Shoes* album (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=hDx8mT0tUiA) will feel comfortably at home in Nelly O'Brien (Joaquina Kalukango)'s Paradise Square pub, ensconced in the heart of the early 1860s Five Points lower Manhattan slum. And when Kalukango brought the house down with her fierce, show-stopping rendition of "Let It Burn!," the entire audience was on its feet applauding and there was nary a dry eye in the place!

The Five Points may have been partially burned down during the 1863 Draft Riots, but the hard-bitten, cross-cultural communal spirit that had been birthed there lives on in Kirwan's joyous imaginative vision of Paradise Square, a sort of working-class variation on Camelot—"for one brief shining moment"—deep in the darkest hard times of old New York City and America's Civil War that just might reignite and illuminate our troubled America and world today. The Five Points of Paradise Square is a place where folks of divergent origins, skin colors and social status—black, white, Irish, German, African, immigrant, free-born or escaped from enslavement by Southern planters or British colonialists—mix, mingle, carouse, and inter-marry.

The Broadway production of *Paradise Square* is a grandly collaborative achievement. Christina Anderson and Craig Lucas share book writing credits with Kirwan. Bill T. Jones brilliantly choreographs the almost constant dancing, which contrasts and blends Irish leaping step dance with beautiful West African rhythmic moves. This play's essential emotional impact is conveyed via phenomenal dancing and singing. Lead dancer/singer roles include war-widow Nelly O'Brien (Kalukango), her confidant Annie Lewis (Chilina Kennedy), Irish immigrant and draft-resistor Owen Duigan (smashingly danced by A.J. Shiveley), and defiant refugee from enslavement Washington Henry (Sidney DuPont).

The character of the drunken piano man "Milton Moore" (played by Jacob Fishel) is an assumed identity for song writer Stephen Foster, who ironically distorts work songs and genuine sufferers' laments into noxious parlor entertainments. Cultural appropriation at its worst!

Over a Guinness at Rosie O'Grady's upscale Manhattan saloon, Larry Kirwan recalled that he modelled Nelly O'Brien's powerful, resilient pub-mistress on the strong women of color who often managed the Manhattan after hours clubs that Kirwan and his literary and musical pals frequented back in the day. "All kinds of people came in there, of whatever skin color or social status, and those strong women in charge kept things peaceful and friendly," reminisced Kirwan. Larry Kirwan has always given us clear-eyed political and historical revelations along with liberating musical revelry. His Broadway hit play is no exception to that tradition. Do yourself a favor and get tickets for yourself and your loved ones. The craic is mighty at Paradise Square!


