

### **GOING DEEPER - Understanding Active Participation -**


#### The Catholic Mass SPEAKS...Do we listen?

I'm going to write up at least 5 more bulletin articles on the Catholic Mass, and they will end with the January 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> weekend. After over 50 different articles over the last year plus of time, I would like to simply encourage you all with what I think is the most important concept for approaching, understanding, and participating in the Catholic Mass. This concept is called *active participation*, and it comes from the ecumenical council in the 1960s, which was called the Second Vatican Council (Vatican II). All the bishops of world met for a few years in the early 1960s in order to try to help the entire Catholic Church live the faith to the fullest in the midst of the modern world. This council was not about doctrinal changes (*long story short, but that is not possible*), but rather a pastoral approach to help everyone around the world live this true faith and follow Christ in the fullest possible way. One visible aspect of the Catholic Church that was modified during this council was the language and ritual flow of the Catholic Mass. Instead of every Mass being in the Latin language, now the Catholic Mass was celebrated in the local language of the area. Once again, long story short, but many prayers and symbols were modified or reduced in a certain sense, but there are still so many symbols, actions, and prayers that come from the early Catholic church and throughout the ages of living and understanding Jesus present with us at this most solemn celebration.

My encouragement for you today in trying to live *active participation* when you come to Mass, is simply based off the words from the one of the central documents from Vatican II. The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy document teaches that all people "through a good understanding of the rites and prayers they should take part in the sacred action *conscious* of what they are doing, with devotion and full collaboration" (par. 48). Immediately after this sentence in this document, the church explains that <u>full collaboration</u> does not mean <u>DOING MORE THINGS at Mass</u>. Rather, this is primarily an internal collaboration with God's word in Scripture as well as the very love and sacrifice of Jesus for us that becomes present in Holy Communion. The entire purpose of the Mass is for all people to "<u>be drawn day by day into ever more perfect union with God</u>" (par. 48).

In other words, God is showing up at every single Catholic Mass in a very powerful way. God speaks at Mass, and if we try our best to listen internally to His Word, we will grow in our relationship with God and this every more perfect union with God that He desires for us. God wants to speak HIS WORD into your heart. Sometimes He will speak through His Word in the Bible (hopefully the priest is helping to foster this encounter with God's word during His homily). Sometimes God will speak through the prayers of the Mass. Sometimes through the symbols, movements, smells, or sounds {more on this at the Christmas bulletin article!}. Sometimes God will speak powerfully through the reception of Holy Communion. God shows up every single time at each Catholic Mass, and our job is to actively participate from our hearts and souls with His Word.

Therefore, if someone asks you, do you <u>actively participate</u> at Mass? The wrong answer would be --- well, I only actively participate when I help out by lectoring, or ushering, or singing, or as an extraordinary minister. No!! Of course, those ministries are beautiful ways to help others encounter God's Word, but our <u>active participation</u> is primarily about our internal listening and our internal prayer and offering to God. God is speaking every single Mass. Our job is simply to try to listen. To receive. And then to do our best to respond with our hearts and then how we live out our day-to-day lives.



Today's Gospel from Luke, begins with the story about Elizabeth and Zechariah. They do not have any children and are now too old to have any. An angel appears to Zechariah and tells him that his prayers have been answered and that he and Elizabeth are going to have a son. The angel explains that the son's name will be John.

About six months later, an angel appears to Mary and announces that she will give birth to a child and his name will be Jesus. Jesus will be the son of God. Then the angel shares with Mary that Elizabeth is also expecting a child. Mary trusts God and says yes to God's plan.

This is where the Gospel we hear today begins. After discovering that she is going to be a mother of the Son of God, Mary hurries to visit her cousin Elizabeth. The moment that Elizabeth greets Mary, the baby in her womb leaps for joy and she is filled with the Holy Spirit. When Mary sees that her cousin is pregnant as the angel told her, Mary knows that the angel was truthful, and that God's plan will be fulfilled.

God also gives us the gift of his son. Like Mary, we can trust that God will give us what we need. It might be courage, understanding, knowing right from wrong or another gift God knows we need.


