ACWW project 1062 In 2019, SYFWI donated its Pennies for Friendship into the maternal and reproductive health focus pot of ACWW's Womens Empowerment Fund. This pot of money has helped an important project in Tanzania to combat female genital mutilation. The final report of this project is attached at the end of this issue of News "n" Views. Female genital mutilation (FGM) involves the partial or total removal of external female genitalia for non-medical reasons. FGM has no health benefits and interferes with the natural functions of girls' and women's bodies. Longterm complications can include urinary problems, menstrual problems eg difficulty in passing menstrual blood, scar tissue causing sexual problems eg pain during intercourse, and increased risk of childbirth complications (difficult delivery, excessive bleeding, caesarean section, need to resuscitate the baby, etc.) and newborn deaths. FGM is mostly carried out on young girls between infancy and age 15 and in some parts of the world is often considered a necessary part of raising a girl, and a way to prepare her for adulthood and marriage, a "rite of passage" as it were. However, it is recognized internationally as a violation of the human rights of girls and women. According to the WHO more than 3 million girls are estimated to be at risk for FGM annually. FGM has been illegal in the UK since 1985, and since 2003 anyone taking a child out of the UK to be cut faces 14 years in prison. The practice is mainly concentrated in the Western, Eastern, and North-Eastern regions of Africa, in some countries in the Middle East and Asia, as well as among migrants from these areas. FGM is therefore a global concern. From the final report of project 1062, you will see that our money has been put to very good use, as the cases of FGM in the project areas have markedly reduced, preventing women and young girls from years of suffering. Thank you to all who continue to support ACWW's Pennies for Friendship scheme.

NFWI meeting guidance: in line with the roadmap out of lockdown

Many of you are considering starting your meetings in September/October and your Committee may have some concerns about how to assess the risks. NFWI have produced some very useful guidance: 'NFWI meeting guidance: in line with the roadmap out of lockdown'. Version 10 was still current at the time of writing this article, but WIs are advised to check for further updates.

If you who have not yet seen it, we recommended that you have a look. It provides you with the national position from 19th July and offers advice and guidance to support your decision making. It can found on MyWI – *home page> running your WI>Members Resources>Guidance Meetings*. Here is a brief summary of the key messages contained in this guidance:

It is the responsibility of each WI to keep up-to-date with local restrictions. Stricter local rules or a total lockdown will always supersede NFWI Guidance.

<u>Precautions and Safety Measures that must be in place:</u>

- When meeting indoors please make sure your meeting space is ventilated.
- Please make sure there are facilities for members to wash their hands in indoor venues.
- Please remind members to bring their own hand sanitiser as well as providing a hand sanitiser for all.
- Make it very clear that any members or visitors who have any <u>Covid-19 symptoms</u> **must** stay at home.
- If you have been told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace you **must** do so in accordance with the government guidance at the time.

If you experience any Covid-19 symptoms you must get a <u>PCR test</u>. If you test positive and have attended an in-person WI meeting or activity within the last seven days you must inform your Secretary or President.

Continue to carry out risk assessments as it is a legal requirement to ensure that any event is as safe as possible.

Best Practice:

Keep a record of everyone who attends a meeting -members and visitors. This is in case you need to provide details for an NHS Test and Trace procedure - Make sure it is kept for 21 days.

• While it is no longer mandatory to wear face coverings indoors the Government has stated that they still provide protection and help reduce the risk of Covid-19 transmission. Those members who still wish to wear face coverings indoors or outdoors should not be questioned about their decision. It is recommended that members carry out a <u>rapid lateral flow test</u> before attending a meeting to ensure they are not unknowingly infected with Covid.

There are no current plans for Covid passes to be used for smaller scale events. It is for this reason that WI members and visitors should not be asked if they have been vaccinated in order to gain entry to an in-person WI meeting or activity.

We have to learn how to live with this virus – but we want you all to feel safe. These precautions hopefully will go some way to ensuring that WIs achieve this.

RECIPE CORNER

This recipe was sent in by Janine Lishman-Peat of Thurlstone & Millhouse Green WI

Campsite Jambalaya

Serves 4

1 tblsp oil

1 onion - chopped

1 green pepper - chopped

1 red pepper - chopped

2 garlic cloves - crushed

Meat - chopped into bite sized pieces -see recipe

Chilli - to taste

1 chicken Oxo cube

Salt and pepper

300 ml water

500g cooked brown rice



Method

Heat the oil and fry the onion and peppers until soft. Stir in the garlic. Stir in the meat. The amount is up to you. It can be cooked or raw. Classically it should be bacon, spicy sausage, and chicken. But I had a slice of gammon, 2 sausages and four pork steaks. If it is raw cook until done, if cooked just heat it through. Stir in the chilli if you are using it and the salt and pepper. Crumble in the Oxo cube and add the water. Stir and bring to the boil. Stir in the rice, I used two packs of ready cooked, heat through and serve. Classically some prawns are added right at the end, but I didn't have any. This is an excellent one pot dish to cook in a tent.
