Don Van Roosen – Past Member Highlights

(Editor's note: Longtime club member Don Van Roosen has a action packed background going back to WWII and before. The following article from The Pilot Newspaper covers some of that background. He will be remembered by many members as an active volunteer in

Donald C. Van Roosen, a longtime resident of Winchester, Mass., and Pinehurst, passed away Thursday, Dec. 29, 2016, in Sandy, Ore., at 93 years of age.

He was born in Boston on Aug. 11, 1923. He entered the U.S. Army in April 1943 and joined the 29th Infantry Division in England as a

private in January 1944. He landed in Normandy on D-Day at Omaha Beach, and was a prisoner of war for 10 days during the final assault on the city of Brest in Brittany. He received a battlefield commission in October 1944.

Van Roosen's combat decorations included the Silver Star; Bronze Star with 2 clusters, Purple Heart with 3 clusters, a Presidential Unit Citation, and the Combat Infantry Badge.

After World War II, he continued his service in the U.S. Army Reserve for a total of 23 years of military service, including 12 years in Special Forces. He retired in 1970 as a lieutenant colonel.

He graduated from Harvard College in 1949 and later worked in manufacturing sales and as an international marketing consultant. His volunteer work included over 50 years with the Boy Scouts of America, receiving their highest awards, the Silver Beaver and the Silver Antelope, in 1985.

Don was married to Nancy Johnston Crough in 1950, and later to Marcia Hunnefield Vantine, in 1987, both deceased. He had three children: Christine,

Laurie Clarke, and Hugh; and four grandchildren: Annie and Dale Clarke, Allison and Hugh. He is sorely missed.

The funeral (was) held in Manchester, Mass., at a future date.

WASHINGTON DC VETERAN TO ANALYSE HOW TRUMP AND CONGRESS WILL GOVERN AND, PERHAPS, BUMP HEADS

How did Donald Trump get elected? How will he govern? How will the fiercely independent Trump work with the institutionally minded Congress? Has Speaker Paul Ryan and Senate Majority Mitch McConnell's message to Trump that Congress and the President are co-equal partners in Washington, DC been fully understood?

All of these questions, and more, will be answered

Monday, February 20 at the monthly meeting of the Moore County Republican Men's Club by 40 year Washington, DC political veteran Patrick Haggerty. Haggerty's career highlights include serving as the Press Secretary to two Members of Congress; a journalist covering Congress, the



White House and federal agencies; a frequent guest on the *Larry King Show*; political news consultant to ABC TV's *Good Morning America*; an advanceman for a U.S. Senate campaign and consultant to three Presidential campaigns. Haggerty moved to Pinehurst two years ago and commutes back to DC once a month for political and media events. "I'm happy to be out of the frenetic pace and pressure of DC, not to mention the horrific traffic" Haggerty said. "I love Pinehurst's slow pace of life and 12 month golf" he added.

In addition to Haggerty's after lunch program, we have a special visitor to give remarks about yet another opportunity for "Community in Action" for our membership. Community in Action started in the club about two years ago and is a series of luncheon presentation and radio spots that describe our community needs and activities outside of politics. This program highlights opportunities that are

available for our members to get involved and give back to the community.



Joining us at our February meeting will be Bruce McKay of Dominion energy, a gas and power producing and transport company. McKay will be updating the membership on the status of the Atlantic Coast Pipeline (ACP), a proposed \$5 billion pipeline that would deliver natural

gas from West Virginia to Eastern North Carolina. North Carolina relies largely on a single major interstate pipeline, TRANSCO, for most of its natural gas. ACP will deliver an abundant new supply of affordable natural gas to a region that is currently constrained. The project is now in the permitting process. With pipeline protests increasingly in the news nationwide it is important that community leaders are aware of the importance of getting such projects approved and constructed for the betterment of our communities' economic futures.

The MCRMC Veterans/Military Affairs Committee

We are up and running, meeting and beginning to see ways we can support our veteran members and veterans in general. You may have already seen the email announcement that we are following the new HB2



(introduced this year and having nothing to do with last year's HB2, the bathroom bill). Our interest here is to advise veterans of what HB2 is all about and to see what ways, if any, we can influence Raleigh to take positive action on it.

The first meeting of the Veterans/Mil. Affairs Committee, on January 26 was very productive. The goal of the Committee is to ensure MCRMC members are better informed and aligned about issues regarding veterans in Moore County. We hope to encourage member's participation in developing solutions to problems and to encourage member's support of information distribution.

The Committee was briefed by Jim Petersen, Moore County Veteran Service Officer and Chuck Spelman, representing Moore County veterans' organizations and the VA.

The dialogue produced a challenging list of issues to be tackled. Some are reasonably straight-forward, primarily focused on better distribution to Moore County veterans of information on resources. Some lend themselves more to encouraging action at the local, state and federal level.

For instance, the report on the increase in case load – 2,726 claims filed in 2016 for Moore County Veterans – suggests the need for attention to support for that office.

The Committee was briefed on resources that have limited awareness among County veterans. One valuable document includes an extensive inventory of approximately 60 Moore County organizations and agencies offering help to veterans over a broad spectrum of needs. Also, we discussed opportunities to develop better awareness and distribution of the excellent resource directory, NC4Vets, produced by North Carolina Department of Military and Veterans Affairs.

It is available free to any vet of any era. It contains up-to-date information about important subjects such as employment, health care, VA benefits, personal services, education, housing for homeless and women's services.

Discussion included the possibility of organizing a Veterans Court (such as are operated successfully in other counties), sponsorship of a "Benefits Action Center, such as a very successful one held last year in Moore County; which helped numerous veterans by correcting deficiencies in their individual VA benefits.

Born in Lithuania, Major General (Retired) Sidney



Shachnow is a Holocaust survivor imprisoned for three years during World War II in a German concentration camp.

Gen. Shachnow immigrated to the United States in 1950 and enlisted in the US Army as a private in the Infantry. As a

Sergeant 1st Class, he entered Officer's Candidate School, was commissioned an Infantry Lieutenant in 1960, and volunteered for Special Forces in 1962, serving 32 years as a Green Beret.

He was the Commanding General of the following: John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center and School, Airborne, Ft. Bragg; U.S. Army Special Forces Command, Airborne, Ft. Bragg; U.S. Army-Berlin. He was Director, Washington Office of the U.S. Special Operations Command, Airborne; Deputy Commanding General, 1st Special Operations Command, Airborne, Ft. Bragg; and Chief of Staff, 1st Special Operations Command, Airborne, Ft. Bragg.

A resident of Southern Pines, Gen. Shachnow wrote

the best-selling book, "Hope and Honor," winner of the prestigious 2005 Wm. E. Colby Military Writers' Award. He is Chair of the non-profit Moore County Sentinels of Freedom, whose mission is to assist combat-wounded Special Forces soldiers and their families.

If I am unhappy with the way things are going, (I will) do the following; To get my way, I should:


March through the streets; Scream; Cry; Yell f**k; Wear a
