#### **PASTORS' COLUMN**



Just A Thought.....

One of the requirements of a seminary education is a semester of Field Education. I did mine at the Flemington Presbyterian Church in Flemington, NJ. It was a

beautiful historic church and only about a 40minute drive from Princeton. Along with other duties, I was required to preach twice during the semester. They were a lovely and kind group of people who were very supportive of seminary students.

One weekend after arriving back on campus one of my friends asked me how the morning went. I said I thought it had gone very well and mentioned how several people shook my hand after church and told me how much they liked my sermon. Without missing a beat my friend replied, "That's nice, but next time ask them what they liked about it". In other words he was gently telling me the congregation was just being kind.

For me, one of the most satisfying things in ministry is when someone pulls me aside the week after I have preached and tells me they have been thinking about something from my sermon. That's when I know the Holy Spirit was a part of the process.

One can only describe worship service preparation as both a passion and an honor. At least that is how I feel and those feelings are intensified during Holy Week. Maundy Thursday and Good Friday are two of my favorite services. This year 12 people joined together on Maundy Thursday to celebrate the Last Supper. The number was not lost on us. I thought it was a spiritual and intimate celebration and especially want to thank those who volunteered to have their feet washed.

Then there was Good Friday. When I arrived at church there was a large fire truck blocking Rt. 5 & 20 in front of our church. My heart sank as all I could think about was that

we had suffered some sort of fire. As it turned out, there had been a car accident further down 5&20 toward Rt. 64. However, we were not unscathed because as I quickly learned upon entering the building we had lost power and it was not projected to be back on until well after our service would be over.

We began our solemn Good Friday service at 7:00PM while it was still light outside but growing increasingly dimmer inside. Phyllis, Andy and Joe shared some readings while there was still a hint of light coming in the stained-glass windows, enough anyway so they could see. As it grew progressively darker inside the sanctuary many of us were equipped with cell phone flashlights to help illumine our readings.

Of course, no power meant no organ. Donna seamlessly and effortlessly moved to the piano for our hymns and anthem. I would guess it was the first time she has had to play using the light of a cell phone to see her music. Our choir didn't miss a beat. Using their cell phones to light their music they blessed us with a beautiful anthem.

When it came time for Larry, Alice and me to share the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ from the Gospel of St. Mark, we moved the altar candles up onto the lectern. I can only say that on Good Friday.... reading the gospel by candle light.... was an in-describable spiritual experience.

But that wasn't all. No amount of preparation or planning could have foreseen God's Faithful sharing a Good Friday service while the natural light slowly faded leaving us in the dark. Wow, what irony on Good Friday and we weren't even reading from John's gospel! All in all, a Holy Week I hope many of us will reflect upon during the coming weeks and hopefully even months.

As Easter people, I hope you will continue to bask in the light of Easter morning and the Good News of an empty tomb. May God strengthen us all to share His word and teachings with others.

## **Book Club**

May 17 we are reading Sister, a Novel, Rosamund Lupton.

From Publishers Weekly: British author Lupton's unusual and searing debut is her heroine Beatrice Hemming's letter to her dead younger sister, Tess. Abandoned by their father just before their eight-year-old brother's death from cystic fibrosis and raised by their genteelly ineffectual mother, Bee and Tess have always exchanged long, intimate letters, so when Tess, an unmarried London art student, apparently commits suicide after her CF baby is born dead, Bee resigns her corporate design job in New York City and moves into Tess's shabby London flat. Convinced Tess was murdered, Bee gradually learns Tess had been spurned, like her unborn child, by her married art teacher lover; she had also been eerily pursued by a drugged-up slumming fellow student and mentally tortured by hallucinogenic drugs thrust on her by a masked stalker. Bee's selfdefenses crumble as she discovers that she never returned Tess's anguished calls for help. Observing the unsettling similarities between her mother and her fiancé, Bee realizes "why no one could be my safety rope." At the harrowing conclusion, Bee's aching heart accepts that "grief is love turned into an eternal missing."

June 21 we are reading The Alice Network, Kate Quinn.

From the Back Cover:

1947. In the chaotic aftermath of World War II, American college girl Charlie St. Clair is pregnant, unmarried, and on the verge of being thrown out of her very proper family. She's also nursing a desperate hope that her beloved cousin Rose, who disappeared in Nazi-occupied France during the war, might still be alive. So when Charlie's parents banish her to Europe to have her "little problem" taken care of, Charlie breaks free and heads to London, determined to find out what happened to the cousin she loves like a sister.

1915. A year into the Great War, Eve Gardiner burns to join the fight against the Germans and unexpectedly gets her chance when she's recruited to work as a spy. Sent into enemy-occupied France, she's trained by the mesmerizing Lili, code name Alice, the "queen of spies," who manages a vast network of secret agents right under the enemy's nose.

Thirty years later, haunted by the betrayal that ultimately tore apart the Alice Network, Eve spends her days drunk and secluded in her crumbling London house. That is until a young American barges in uttering a name Eve hasn't heard in decades, and launches them both on a mission to find the truth . . . no matter where it leads.

The graduate then paused, appeared to struggle a moment and looked up at the audience with a mischievous smile. "It's really hard to read my mom's handwriting," he said.

"Each day holds a surprise," wrote Henri Nouwen. "But only if we expect it can we see, hear, or feel it when it comes to us. Let's not be afraid to receive each day's surprise, whether it comes to us as sorrow or as joy."

Wait — sorrow as a surprise? And I'm not to fear it? Aren't surprises supposed to be happy things? What does Nouwen mean?

He continues: "It will open a new place in our hearts, a place where we can welcome new friends and celebrate more fully our shared humanity." And I remember, too, the psalmist's words: "The LORD is near to the brokenhearted" (Psalm 34:18). Maybe that's the surprise in our sorrow: that when we ache, as when we celebrate, God is there — in new friends, in shared humanity. Surprise! —Heidi Mann

## In good hands

As Jesus prepared his disciples for his departure, they were full of questions — "Where are you going? How will we know the way there? Would you please just show us the Father?" — and not very satisfied with his answers. So Jesus promised to send them "another Helper" (John 14:16, ESV). And we can almost hear them protesting, like kids bemoaning a favorite coach's retirement or church members grieving a beloved pastor's call to serve elsewhere: "Oh, great. Someone new for us to get to know. It won't be the same. It won't be you."

Except ... the word another has two forms in Greek: "another just like this one" and "another, different version." And when the author of John translated Jesus' Aramaic into Greek, the first definition was the accurate one. Jesus was assuring his disciples they'd be in good hands, at peace and secure because the new Helper — the Holy Spirit — would be another just like him.

#### A church or a club?

Rev. Theodore Wedel, a former canon of the National Cathedral, once told a parable about congregational life. It began: "On a dangerous sea coast where shipwrecks often occur, there was a crude little life-saving station. The building was just a hut, and there was only one boat, but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea."

Some neighbors and people who'd been rescued began donating time and money, thinking the station needed better furnishings and equipment. As the station grew as a gathering place, members hired lifeboat crews to do the dirty work of saving lives. Those who disagreed with that approach broke away to form their own stations.

The parable concluded: "If you visit that sea coast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are frequent in those waters, but most of the people drown."






#### **Picture Us**






