SENSE OF VALUE

On my morning walk, I noticed a single recycle bin on the street. It reminded me of how we keep what we consider of value and dispose of what is not. I sensed the Lord speaking to me about people that we often consider lacking value and are thus disposable. The Bible says that we are all created in the image of God, in the Imago Dei, and are of infinite value even if we appear to be used up, messed up, etc. as former Franciscan Priest Brennan Manning writes about in The Ragamuffin Gospel. More and more in recent years, I have discovered pennies, nickels, and dimes on the sidewalk, and I like most just keep on walking because I do not see the value of picking them up. What we once deemed as valuable has lost its value due to inflation. I wonder if we might sometimes have an inflated value of ourselves and thus see others of lesser value. The Bible cautions us not to think more highly of ourselves than we ought. Might we all consider one another's value in the sight of God as we go about our daily lives?

NOSC RICHMOND - - - A YEAR IN REVIEW



Navy Operational Support Center Richmond's primary mission is to generate mobilization readiness by providing administrative services, training support, and world class customer service to Reserve personnel in support of surge and operational requirements for the Navy and Marine Corps team and Joint Forces. The COVID pandemic which began in early 2020 put this command to the test and we succeeded in not only continuing to meet the needs of the Reserve Force with ready personnel, but to also surge additional assets in response to emergency requirements. NOSC Richmond mobilized Selected Reservists to the USNS MERCY and the USNS COMFORT in support of their COVID-19 support missions on both coasts. Our Command Senior Enlisted Leader, herself, joined the operation in New York, providing support for the mobilization of an additional 653 Reserve Officers and Sailors for COVID related missions. The NOSC staff concurrently executed the mass mobilization of SURGEMAIN reservists to support critical ship maintenance across several shipyards.

The March drill weekend in 2020 was cancelled as a result of growing COVID cases across the globe, but the NOSC staff quickly established new training requirements, resources, and procedures necessary to transition into a remote working mindset. As the situation continued into the approaching new year, NOSC Richmond made incremental adjustments so that training, administrative and medical requirements affecting the reserve personnel's readiness in the new fiscal

year were achieved. As many programs and activities that could be completed through remote or self-service means were transitioned and the force adjusted accordingly with few long-standing impacts. Medical readiness was most affected by the inability to interact in person, but that, too, was overcome. As we look forward to the summer in 2021, our processes have evolved from contingencies to normal procedures and are of great benefit even as our reserve officers and sailors are beginning to return to in-person drilling.

This command demonstrated exceptional resiliency in the face of a once-in-a-century global catastrophe. Their ability to excel in spite of the dynamic changes to travel, resource availability, and all other aspects of daily life is a testament to their steadfast dedication to duty in support of the Navy Reserve.

NOSC RICHMOND OVERCOMES COVID CHALLENGES TO MAIN-TAIN MISSION READINESS

Navy Operational Support Center Richmond continues to execute our mission to ensure a ready reserve force is available to meet the needs of our nation. In spite of challenges presented by the global pandemic over the past year, this command support-

ed 280 personnel as they conducted over 6000 drill periods across 21 separate reserve units. During these drills, our Sailors are tasked to meet personal training and material readiness requirements. These requirements remained throughout the pandemic, as they always had before, but our procedures were forced to evolve. Our Training Department set about converting all events that could be conducted over remote means into web-based training and put in countless hours behind the scenes maintaining the systems. These capabilities are now mainstream and, with the support of new collaborative webbased tools, may very well remain the normal processes of training delivery for the foreseeable future. Although most of the training provided to the Navy Reservist is rudimentary to military service, an additional \$1 million was expended for nearly 5500 days of specialized training events at dedicated training sites that are unique to the rates and qualifications of the individual Naval Officers and Sailors. This is in spite of dynamic changes to on-site health and safety requirements and their ability to travel.

Our Administration and Manpower departments made a similar shift to remote processes which enable those who could not travel for face-to-face training and service to maintain their records for readiness, pay and other matters in need of regular reviews that are of great importance once a service member is mobilized. Incoming and outgoing personnel between subordinate units and the Navy at large were successfully processed in a similar manner and in some cases were able to physically avoid the NOSC altogether and report directly to their gaining command. In all, the NOSC staff created a new way to manage their programs' requirements so that our supported saw "business as usual" in spite of the dynamic challenges that arose and impacted our individuals' health, ability to travel, and ultimately, their ability to support the Navy.

Greetings from the FIGHTIN 5-0!



BIOGRAPHY - FATHER WILLIAM J. BARTZ, CAPTAIN, CHAPLIN CORPS, USN (Ret)

Ministering to the Troops

Father William J. Bartz, son of Father and Mrs. George Bartz, was born in Scranton, PA and raised in Akron, OH. He graduated from Hellenic College with a Bachelor of Arts in 1975; received a direct commission to be an Ensign in the United States Navy Chaplain Corps in May 1977; graduated from Holy Cross School of Theology with a Master in Divinity with Distinction in 1978; and was ordained a Priest in the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America in March 1982.

His active duty service began in 1984. He served at three Navy commands: Naval Station Norfolk, USS BIDDLE (CG-34), and USS CARL VINSON (CVN-70). His assignments also included eight Marine Corps commands, beginning in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina and continued in Okinawa, Japan; Quantico, Virginia; and Norfolk, Virginia. He served as the Chaplain in a Battalion, Regiment, Group, Base, Division, and Force. He graduated from the Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, receiving a Master in Strategic Studies.

During his last five years on active duty, he was the most senior Orthodox Priest in the U.S. military. The Navy Chaplain Corps selected him to be the 2010 recipient of the John H. Craven Award, a peer-nominated and peer-

selected Award by Navy Captain Chaplains, recognizing his exemplary servant-leadership among Chaplains.

In June 2003, he received the ecclesiastical Office of Protopresbyter, the most senior rank of a married priest in the Orthodox Church.

After retiring from the Navy at the rank of Captain, he served as the Chancellor of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Detroit from August 2011 to August 2013.

Father Bartz was appointed by the Chairman of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America to be the Endorsing Agent for Military Chaplains in November 2011. The Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese appointed him to be the Endorsing Agent for Institutional Chaplains in February 2012.

Father Bartz retired from the active parish ministry on 1 August 2019 and moved to the Richmond, Virginia area.

Father Bill is married to the former Emily V. Mamalis, daughter of Father and Mrs. James Mamalis. They have three children, Joanna Nicolaides (Evan), Maria, and George; and four grandchildren, Emilia, John, and Magdalena Nicolaides; and Reagan Grace Bartz.


