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


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

Barn Update

Activity has slowed considerably in the barn since my last update. Spring brings many chores, and I've seemed to have a lot of family obligations too. However it doesn't mean no time, just less.

The Cadillacs have been running remarkably well, with no reliability issues at all. The other day I had to run to Merrillville and decided to take the 1984 Eldorado. It will be making the trip to the Grand National in a little over a month, and it needs some street time to make sure everything is in order. It was a day with the temperature well over 90 with plenty of humidity, so I chose to leave the top up and use the A/C. It works very well, and should stand up to the weather in the D.C. area. The car isn't very peppy off the line, but once up to speed cruises along with no issues. I am going to gather up some spare parts for the trip too, including a starter, water pump, alternator, and I've also read the fuel pump relay sometimes can fail, so one of those too. I've had no issues with it since I bought it, so hopefully my luck will continue. I'll provide a

full summary of the trip in the next Tailfin.

The rough idle on the **1941 Cadillac** has been fixed. I tightened up the carburetor and intake manifold bolts, and it seemed to solve the problem. She's been purring like a 1941 should ever since. Our Walmart in neighboring Michigan City opened a new Murphy's gas station. I was happy to find they sell ethanol-free gasoline! However, it is only 87 octane, so just useful for the newer cars that don't need premium.


I've made some incremental steps on the 1963 Lincoln (NC). I was ready to put the grille together (two big metal parts) but was missing some parts. I searched high and low and couldn't find them anywhere. I was able to get several off of the parts car, and ordered the rest from a Lincoln parts vendor. One half of the grille had been rechromed, but the other half was in fairly decent shape (probably had been replaced at some time), so I used it as is. All the little squares in the grille are painted grey so I



redid that on the original one, and had to paint them on the rechromed one (whole grille comes back completely chromed). finally got it all put together, and with Jaunda's help (it's pretty heavy), it is now in place. I did find my missing parts about a month later. I also put the bumpers back together. and will install the front one soon. I will leave the



to get the dash in, and have reinstalled it, after some paint touch-up needed by removing it. I've dug out the radiator and A/C condenser (they attach to each other), and they're ready for installation too. Once in, then I should be able to attempt starting the engine.

The A/C has a slow leak and annually I need to put some back in . It was converted to R -134 several years ago, so I can do it at home. It's easier to stick a can in every year, than to try to figure out where the leak is and fix it.

Great Pace 2017 comes to Indiana

The Great (American) Race was started in 1983 by Tom McRae and Norman Miller. They were partners in the deal and bought out an ailing race promoter who planned to race pre-World War II automobiles across the United States for a large purse. Through the years, they made certain to provide interesting routes for the participants, touring our country's back roads. The intricate routes were designed to suit antique cars and their capabilities in terms of speed and durability.

In 2011, the Great Race came under the leadership of Corky Coker. While a few things have changed, in terms of the rules and how the event is run, it is On Wednesday, June 28th, the Great Race will stop overnight in Auburn, Indiana, home of the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum and the National Auto & Truck Museum. In the early days, Auburn was a leader in the automotive industry and there were more car companies in Indiana than in Michigan. On Thursday, June 29th Racers, including several in Hudsons, will make a stop during the morning at the Hostetler Hudson Auto Museum in Shipshewana, Indiana, where the most complete collection of cars made by the Hudson Motor Car Company is located. This museum was started by the late Eldon Hostetler who donated more than 40 Hudsons, Essexs and Terraplanes ranging in date




still a classic car event with the same basic idea from years past. This year, there are 132 Racers driving cars from 1916 to 1972.

On Saturday, May 27, the Kokomo Automotive Museum played host to the second "Hoosier Classic" Collector Car Auction. A number of fine Cadillacs crossed the block that day. My two favorites were the 1959 Series 62 convertible and a1960 Sedan deVille. The former was a true barnfind, having been sitting in a barn in Lebanon since the 1980s. It sold for \$47,000, a little steep in my mind for a car that truly needed a complete restoration. A 1960 Sedan deVille came up from southern Illinois, accompanied by a rough 1984 Eldorado convertible. The '60 was a six-window sedan in Aleutian Gray with a matching interior. It had surface rust and it needed carpeting, but otherwise, it was a great car. It went for \$7,000, a little more than I would have been willing to pay. If it had been Hampton Blue like my long-lost '60, now that would have



Some cars are just meant to be driven. My 1941 Cadillac Series 62 convertible is one of those cars. I am still ironing the bugs out of it, but the Auburn "Triple Crown" event in May seemed like the perfect time to test the new clutch, repaired generator, and new lifters. For the first time in 62 years, the AACA and the CCCA decided to hold a joint meet. They chose Spring Auburn auction at the Auburn Auction Park off of I-69 as the location.

John arrived very early at my home in Noblesville on Saturday May 13. I live right off of IN-37, so we took it north all the way to Marion. We passed a number of interesting sites, including the Wolf Motel, which looks to have been around since the 1940s or 1950s. In Marion, we changed to IN-9, which took us all the way north to IN-8, which runs into Auburn and becomes 7th Street. We arrived at the auction park and had a little trouble finding where the show was. Eventually, we located our spot. Moments later, Dennis Manieri from Naples, Florida came over to greet us. Dennis owns an amazing 1941 Series 6229 convertible sedan. We met at the Kokomo CCCA Grand Classic in September and have been friends ever since. Look for his yellow convertible at the Grand National this summer...it is stunning! We saw a number of Indiana Region CLC members, at the show. As we worked our way around the showfield, we ran into Lars Kneller, Bill Hedge, and Glenn Brown. They had come to Auburn for the day. Gene Menne was incognito in his 1914 Ford Model T. I also saw a couple of folks from the ACD Club and from NATM as well. It seemed like any way I turned, I ran into somebody from a museum or car club that I knew.

As this was a CCCA event, Cadillacs were scarcer than Packards. Besides Dennis' convertible sedan and my convertible coupe, there was a nice Series 63 sedan owned by a gentleman from Michigan. It was a beautiful day for a car show, but John and I were getting a little hungry and tired, so we made for the exit. We stopped for a late lunch in Auburn at the Auburn House of Pancakes. This restaurant has been in downtown Auburn for many years, and is one of my favorites. As a 19-year-old intern at the Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Museum in 1993, I ate many breakfasts here before reporting for work at the museum. A lot of the local movers and shakers made this their early morning hangout for many years.

On the way home, we put the top down. We dodged some rain clouds, but we arrived in Noblesville before dark. The '41 performed very well over the 200-plus mile round trip. Gas mileage was in the 12 mpg range, which is about on par for a '41 Caddy.

Auburn is still my favorite place on earth, but Hickory Corners Michigan has to be the runner-up. I am at the Gilmore Museum at least three times a year, for CLC, LCOC, and CCCA events. The CCCA Grand Experience was held on Sunday June 4 this year. John and I left later in the day, as I wanted to see my wife Mila off to work a double shift as a charge nurse. With a list of ethanol-free gas stations in hand, we headed north again on IN-37. In the quaint town of Elwood, we got onto IN-13. The great thing about this road is that it is lightly travelled and it turns into US 131 at the Michigan State line, so we can take it all the way to Kalamazoo.

It was amazing how much attention the '41 attracted at the gas stations. We took our time heading north, so we got into Kalamazoo at dark. After checking in at the Baymont

Inn and covering the car, we walked across the street to enjoy one of our Kalamazoo rituals....a giant Godfather's pizza and a pitcher of beer. This is always a great way to unwind and to get ready for the day ahead.

As I had allowed myself to get talked into judging, we were up early so that we could make the 20 minute drive to the Gilmore in time for the judges' breakfast. I saw a number of familiar and friendly faces on the showfield. There were about 35 cars arrayed upon the lawn by the CCCA Museum.

Four of them were '41 Cadillacs: a flawless Series 60 Special, the same Series 63 sedan we had seen at Auburn, an original Cavern Green Series 62 coupe with running boards that was mostly original. The day started damp, but by 10am, things were looking great, with lots of sunshine beaming down on us. Down went the top!

During lunch, I had the opportunity to meet Chris Shires, the new Gilmore executive director. He's a nice fellow with a tough job. John and I toured the museum buildings and before long, it was time for the awards. One by one, the cars started up to head for their trailers. We



headed south with the top down. The skies grew angry by North Webster, so up the top went. A few miles later, we had to take shelter at a gas station because the rain was coming so hard that I couldn't see to drive. Once it cleared off, we were back on IN-13 heading toward home, getting in after about five hours on the road.

So far, the 2017 season has been a blast. I wonder what the summer and fall will bring? No matter what, I am sure it will be memorable. Most things are behind the wheel of a '41 Caddy convertible!
