God Creates the World

Genesis 1:1-2:3



God's Beginnings With Humans

The book of Genesis gives us the beginnings. Not the beginning of God; God has existed eternally. Nor is it just the beginning of our world. It's the beginnings of God's working with humans. In fact, "beginning" is the meaning of the Greek word from which the name *Genesis* came. What better place to start a new season than at the beginning!

Elohim is the Hebrew name used for God in Genesis 1:1. It's interesting that the name is plural, but the verb *created* is singular. Even though God exists in three persons, the action of creating the universe was unified.

God's Creation Was Good

Genesis 1:1–2:3 describes a vast variety of things God created, but the focus isn't so much on the creation as it is on the Creator. Nine times in this passage we read "God said" and then some variation of "and it was so." God spoke our universe, our planet, and humankind into existence. And what God did was good.

The word translated "good" here is a common Hebrew word that, like our word *good*, can have several meanings. Here, it likely has no moral connotation but means "just as it should be." God looked at what he had done and knew it was right.

After Creating, God Rested

God was creating a bountiful, beautiful home for the treasured beings that he created last. Notice that God created many of each thing: not just one tree, but "seed-bearing plants and trees...according to their various kinds"; not just one star, but "lights in the expanse of the sky"; not just one fish, but "every living and moving thing with which the water teems." God

prepared a marvelous earth for his crowning creation to enjoy. And then God created humans. We're a vital part of everything good that God made.

When God finished creating the heavens and the earth "in all their vast array," he rested. Why? God wasn't tired. God didn't need to rest. No, God rested as a signal that Creation was complete. The seventh day became a holy day—a day to reflect on the wonder of what God had done, a day to smile and to know that it was good.

The Jesus Connection

God's creation is inspiring, and the gift of his Son is lifesaving. Thank God for the beauty of life in nature and in our hearts through a relationship with Jesus! Show love for God's creation during the lesson this week, and help others see that the Creator has given them new life through Jesus as well.

What in nature amazes you? Oceans of beautifully colored fish? Massive forests? Take some time to appreciate the creativity of God's design, and consider how God has designed your life, too. You can write your prayer here.

As the children arrive, greet each child and welcome him or her with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Lead the kids in doing the actions and singing "Learning and Laughing" (track 2 on the CD) to the tune of "Boom, Boom, Ain't It Great to Be Crazy?"

God Made It All

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Genesis 1:1, and show children the words. Tell children that the Bible is God's special book.



God Made It All Supplies

Say: Today we'll look at the beginning of the Bible to learn how FOD MADE EVERYTHING. Our Key Verse from the Bible, Genesis 1:1, says, "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). Let's say the Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the Key Verse with you.

Say: Way back in the very beginning of time, there was nothing but darkness. Have the kids close their eyes and keep them closed.

Ask:

What do you like or not like about the dark?

Say: God changed the darkness by creating light and life. Have children open their eyes. ▶ GOD MADE EVERYTHING. God created the heavens and the earth, plants and animals, and people—everything!

Let's say our Key Verse one more time. Lead children in saying the Key Verse with you: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1).

What You'll Do

Say: Friends, it's time for Theo's News!

Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 5 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today.

Theo: I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.

(Ask a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the empty box around the circle so the rest of the children can see it up close. Give kids time to guess what they'll learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Friends, what's in the box? (Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: What can we do with nothing? (Pause.) Theo, why is the Surprise Box empty?

Theo: Well, we can't do much of anything with nothing!

Teacher: That's right, Theo, but in the Bible today, we'll find out ▶ **GOD MADE EVERYTHING** at the beginning of time when there was *nothing!* Friends, let's read the

Bible to find out what happened!



Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: God Creates the World

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 1, and show the children the words. Tell children the Bible is God's special book.

Say: PGOD MADE EVERYTHING. The Bible tells us that in the beginning there was nothing, just like there was nothing in our Surprise Box. The Bible also tells us that it was very dark. You can make it dark by closing your eyes again. Pause while the kids close their eyes. Now put your hands over your eyes to make it even darker. Keep your eyes closed and listen while I play some sounds. Open your eyes when you hear the first words, and find each card as the song mentions the picture on it.

Play "It Was Good" (track 6 on the CD) to the tune of "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands." The track begins with sounds of water. When the words to the song begin, have the kids open their eyes and choose the card they hear about. Then have them arrange the cards in order.

On the first day, God made light! And on the first day, God made night. On the first day, God made light. And God saw it was good!

On the second day, God made the sky, Way above our heads, oh so high! On the second day, God made the sky. And God saw it was good!

On the third day, God made the land And trees and plants, just as he'd planned! On the third day, God made the land. And God saw it was good!

On the fourth day, God made the sun And the moon and stars...he made every one! On the fourth day, God made the sun. And God saw it was good!

On the fifth day, God made fish and birds, The little swimming fishies and the flying birds. On the fifth day, God made fish and birds! And God saw it was good!

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Which day of Creation is the most exciting for you? Why?
- Hold up the "Creation" cards one by one and give children time to respond to the following question for each card: Why is everything God made on this day of Creation good?
- What are some ways we can enjoy these good things God created?

Set the "Creation" cards aside for use later in the lesson.

INTO LIFE

Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

Colorful World

What You'll Do

Distribute the My Bible Playground student pages, and help kids write their names on

their papers. Invite a child to help you demonstrate the activity on one of the pages. Use an eyedropper to place four to five drops of green and blue watercolor paint in the white circle. Pick up the paper and carefully move it side to side and in a circular motion to allow the watercolor to move on the paper. Then have the child place the page back down and lay folded paper towels on top to absorb excess liquid. A small amount of the watercolor paint design will remain on the page. Let the other children try the experiment on their own pages, and then have them use watercolors to finish creating their colorful worlds.

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Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you like most about making your colorful page?
- Tell about the things you painted onto your colorful world.
- What can we do to thank God for creating our world with so many beautiful colors?

Say: ► GOD MADE EVERYTHING in the heavens and on the beautiful earth. Let's remember to thank God for all of the good things he has made.

CENTER 2:

Edible World

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands.

Review the events of Creation as told in the Bible passage, reminding kids of the things God made on each day. Pause after each day to let kids create something from that particular day using the snack items in their bowls. For example, on their paper plates they might place a sandwich cookie that has been separated into two parts, showing how God separated the light from the darkness. The marshmallows can be added to represent clouds in the sky. The snack crackers can represent land. The pretzel sticks can be trees or stick people. Let kids be creative and only make suggestions as needed. After each step of Creation, remind children that everything God made is good.

When all of the items are arranged, have kids pause to thank God for the amazing things he made. Then encourage children to enjoy eating their way through their edible world.

Say: We enjoy our snack because it's yummy and tastes good. Everything God made is good, too.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What's good about your edible creation?
- What other tasty things has God created for our world?
- What can you do to remember to thank God for his creation when you're enjoying a good meal or treat?

Say: Fig. GOD MADE EVERYTHING, and God wants us to enjoy the world he made. We can thank God for good food, and enjoy mealtimes with our families. There are lots of ways we can enjoy the world God made!

Center 3: Days of the First Week Supplies

CENTER 3:

Days of the First Week

What You'll Do ■■■■■

Set out the "Creation" cards. Have children think of ways to act out each day. For example, for the first day, kids might close and open their eyes; and for the second day, kids might jump up high with their hands pointed to the sky. Have the kids take turns leading one another in the motions for each card.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you like most about the world God created?
- What can you tell someone about that thing?

Say: It's fun to talk about how **GOD MADE EVERYTHING.** We thank God when we talk about his wonderful creation.

Center 4: Creative Creations Supplies

CENTER 4:

Creative Creations

What You'll Do

Say: When God made the world, he started with nothing but he still made everything in our world. God is very creative! We can be creative, too. Have kids form trios, and give each group building blocks. We're going to make examples of what God made on each day of Creation using only building blocks. With your group, you can be creative and think of ways to use your blocks to quickly make an example of the things I read about from the Bible.



Read aloud from Genesis about each day of Creation. Pause after you read what was created and allow kids one minute to build an example of something created on that day.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What made it hard or easy to create objects using only the blocks?
- What do you think about God creating the whole world out of nothing?

Say: God was able to make the sky and the land and every living thing without any supplies or anyone's help. God didn't need any blocks—or anything at all. God simply spoke and the world was created. Only God is able to do such wonderful things. ▶ GOD MADE EVERYTHING, including you and me. Let's thank him for his creative creation.

Pray: God, thank you for creating everything. We love your creation! In Jesus' name, amen.

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to the circle area on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage the children to share what they remember about what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that ▶ GOD MADE EVERYTHING. I'd like each of you to choose a way to thank God for his creation this week.

Read these three ideas for kids to choose from:

- Ask your mom or dad to let you take pictures of things you love in God's creation. Then say a prayer of thanks for what's in each picture.
- Go outside with a family member or friend. Point out something that God made on each day of Creation.
- Ask your mom or dad to help you visit kids.nationalgeographic.com on the Internet and look at all the wonderful animals God created! Tell what you like most about the way God made each animal.

God Creates Humans

God communicates through the Bible to give us a spiritual message—to tell us of his love and his plan for us. Because of this focus, we can't always expect everything we read in the Bible to fall in strict chronological order.

Some scholars see problems in the differences between the accounts of the creation of humans in Genesis 1 and Genesis 2. Others, however, see the account in Chapter 2 as an elaboration of Chapter 1. But notice the emphasis in both accounts: God did it. The emphasis in this account is not upon the creation, but upon the Creator.

God Creates Adam

In Genesis 2:7 we see a bit of the "how" of Adam's creation. It's interesting to note that humans were the first of creation not simply spoken into being. God personally formed Adam out of the earth. And then one more difference appears: God breathed life into Adam, and he became a living being. Many here translate *being* as *soul*. No other creature was given that designation. Genesis 1:27 tells us that humans were created in God's image. And after the creation of humans, God announced that his creation was not only "good," it was "very good" (Genesis 1:31).

God Creates Eve

Adam's need for a mate didn't come as a surprise to God. The parade of animals for Adam to name had a purpose beyond the naming: It pointed out to Adam that he was alone, that he didn't have a mate like him—someone who could share his life. After helping Adam come to this realization, God created woman.

Adam and Eve Become One

Many appropriate conclusions have been drawn from Eve's being created from Adam's rib—from his side—such as the intent that the two work side by side, that they be equal to each other in standing before God, and that they become "one flesh" in the bond of marriage. However, Adam lost a rib to make Eve. Without her, he was incomplete. And without Adam, Eve wouldn't have existed. Together, man and woman became a whole being, able to stand together and support each other against the forces that oppose them—just as God had planned from the start.

God made us his very special creation, and because

Bible Time: Adam and Eve

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Open your Bible to Genesis 2, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book. Say: The Bible tells us that ▶ GOD MADE US. Let's learn about the first people God made—Adam and Eve.

People today are born as tiny babies, but do you know how Adam was born? Not as a tiny baby. God made Adam from the dust of the ground—from dirt! Have kids circle around the plastic container and let them explore the texture of the dirt. Then have them clean their hands with wet wipes.

God made Adam first. Demonstrate drawing a figure of a man in the dirt using a pencil. **You can draw men in the dirt, too.** As children work, continue talking about how God made Adam.

God made each part of Adam so all the parts worked together. As you name different body parts, guide children to point to those parts on their bodies. God made Adam's eyes and nose (pause), arms and legs (pause), and hands and feet (pause). God gave Adam a heart to pump blood (pause) and a brain to think with (pause). God made Adam perfectly.

Have kids stop drawing. God made Adam, and ▶ GOD MADE US. After God created Adam, the Bible says that God breathed life into Adam. We can draw the shape of a person in the dirt, but we can't make that person come alive. Only God can give life!

Later, God decided that Adam needed a helper. So God made Adam fall asleep. Have kids snore loudly as they pretend to sleep. Then God took a rib from Adam's side and made another person. God made Eve to be with Adam. Let's draw another person in the dirt to be Eve. Allow kids to draw their second figure in the dirt.

When God finished making the woman, he brought her to Adam. Adam and Eve were happy together as they lived in the beautiful Garden of Eden.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What's the difference between the man God made—Adam—and the people we made with dirt?
- Why do you think God made us?
- What do you like best about the way God made you?

Say: God made Adam and Eve in unique ways and gave them life. ► GOD MADE US in a unique way, too, and we can thank God for giving us life.

Ask:

- Why are the body parts we added important for people to have?
- What great things can you do with the body parts God gave you?

Say: ► GOD MADE US so we can walk, talk, run, and play—and so much more. We can thank God for the way he made us.

CENTER 3:

Unique You

What You'll Do

Say: For God MADE US alike in many ways. He gave us hands, feet, eyes, ears, and many other parts. What are some other things we have in common? Allow kids to answer. God also made each of us special. Even though you may have an eye color like someone else, you're the only one in the world with your exact eyes. You're also the only one in the world with your fingerprints. Have kids hold up their hands and wiggle their fingers. We can thank God for the wonderful, special way he made us.

Help kids form trios. With the friends in your group, look closely at all of your fingerprints and eyes to see if anyone in your group looks just like you. Allow two minutes. Now talk about things that are similar and different about your eyes. Allow two minutes. Talk about what's different and similar about your fingerprints.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you discover in your groups about your eyes and fingerprints?
- What do you like about being the only you in the world?
- What can you do to thank God for making you special?

Say: God made us alike in a lot of ways, but GOD MADE US different and special, too. We can thank God for making us unique and special.





CENTER 4:

God Made Us Different and Alike

What You'll Do

Have kids stand in a circle. Say: Think about your favorite things such as soccer, cats, dogs, or a favorite color. When you've thought of something, raise your hand and I'll call on you one at a time to step into the circle and share. After a favorite is shared, if you also like that thing, step into the circle with the person who shared.

Once children step into the circle, have them return to the outer circle for the next turn. Continue the pattern until everyone has had a turn to share.

ost 5- to 6-year-olds understand and want to follow rules. Children are eager to please adults, so they'll usually ask permission when they're unsure about what to do. Kids may have difficulty understanding that Adam and Eve were only the first—and not the last—people who did wrong things. You'll also find that some kids won't acknowledge when they've sinned. Don't worry; denying sin is a normal part of moral development at any age. But you can still guide kids to make good choices for God. Use this lesson to let kids know that we can make good choices to obey God and avoid sin.

Adam and Eve Sin

Genesis 3



Adam and Eve Choose to Disobey God

The first thing we read about is the crafty serpent used by Satan to deceive the first humans. The serpent's first question demonstrated his craftiness. He must've known what God had really commanded about the fruit of a particular tree in the Garden of Eden, but asking the question made Eve begin to reconsider. The serpent, knowing he'd made Eve question God, proceeded to take his deception further, suggesting that God didn't have Eve's best interests in mind. Eve took the bait and ate the fruit—and Adam ate after her.

Adam and Eve "Hide" From God

As always, temptation promised more than the sin delivered. Adam and Eve didn't become "like God," but instead faced the reality that they'd disobeyed God. Suddenly their nakedness, which had been natural when all was good, seemed wrong. They decided to hide from God.

God was angry. The beings he had created and provided for so bountifully had turned against him. They'd refused to trust him. But God came looking for them, knowing well what had happened. Here God showed his character and established an important pattern: When people sin and turn against God, God seeks them out and draws them to himself. God loves his people—no matter what.

Adam and Eve Leave the Garden

God's constant love for us doesn't mean we can avoid the consequences of sin. The rest of this passage relates the consequences of Adam and Eve's sin, which from that point on fell upon all humanity. However, the banishing of Adam and Eve from the garden wasn't so much for punishment as for their

protection. Now that they'd sinned, sin would be part of them as long as they lived. Should they eat of the tree of life in the garden, they would live forever under the power of sin. Only physical death could save them from such a life. And God had a plan to save them from spiritual death, a plan that likely is hinted at in Genesis 3:15: Jesus would come and experience death, but he would defeat Satan forever!

When have you battled with sin, and what was the

The Jesus Connection

outcome? God seeks us and loves us even when we betray him, and he gives us forgiveness and eternal life through Jesus' sacrifice. God has given us an example to follow and a source of strength and support—in Jesus. Jesus can help us be faithful to God. Ask Jesus to help you resist sin and faithfully follow God's laws. Whole-Hearted Love

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 6:5, and show children the words. Tell kids that the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Deuteronomy 6:5, says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength." That means to love God with all of you. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified version of the Key Verse after you: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Give each child a paper heart and washable markers or crayons. Help kids each write their name on their heart as a way to tell God he has their whole heart. Remind kids that loving God helps us make good choices.

Loving God is always a good choice. Let's fill the inside of this big heart to show how we'll choose to fill our whole hearts with love for God.

Let kids take turns placing their paper hearts inside the yarn heart, and lead them in saying the simplified Key Verse: **Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).**

The Bible tells us that God wants our whole heart to be filled with love for him. That means God wants us to love him more than anything. Not just a little bit. Not just sometimes, but every day with all of our heart. ▶ GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES, and one of the best choices we can make is to love God with all our heart.



Teacher: You're right, Theo. This reminds me of how God gave Adam and Eve perfect hearts when he first created them. (Hold up the heart shape.) But Adam and Eve sinned and that turned their hearts away from God. (Hold up the bent heart.) ▶ **GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES.** Friends, let's read the Bible to learn about when Adam and Eve sinned and did something wrong.

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: The First Sin

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 3, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book. Set out "The First Sin" poster.

Say: Today we'll hear from the Bible that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES. After God created the world, he rested and said it was good. God told Adam and Eve to obey him while they lived in the beautiful Garden of Eden. Point to the poster and invite kids to tell you what's beautiful in the picture. In the middle of the

garden there was a tree that had fruit Adam and Eve weren't supposed to eat. Point to the tree. The fruit on the tree looked delicious. But Adam and Eve knew that God had said not to eat it.

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Ask:

- Tell about a time a parent or a teacher told you not to do something.
- Explain whether it was easy or difficult to obey.

Say: For a while, Adam and Eve obeyed God. But one day, a bad serpent—maybe like a snake—came to Eve. Put the tube sock on your hand, and wiggle it like a snake toward the kids. The serpent laughed and said, "God told you not to eat this fruit? If you eat it, you'll be like God."

Ask:

- Tell about a time someone else told you to do something or take something you knew would get you in trouble.
- What made it easy or difficult to make a good choice and say "no"?

Say: When we want something that we know we're not supposed to have, that's called temptation—and Eve was tempted by that sneaky serpent! Wiggle the sock puppet toward the kids again. Pretty soon, Eve thought the fruit on the tree looked too good to leave alone! She thought God wouldn't notice if she ate a little bit. Gasp and invite kids to gasp with you.

So Adam and Eve ate the fruit from the tree. Have kids point to the tree on the poster. When they ate the fruit, everything looked different to them. They'd sinned by disobeying God. They were embarrassed by their sin and when God came to spend time with them, they hid from God. Have kids hide their faces with their hands.

God wasn't happy with Adam and Eve. Have kids point to Adam and Eve in the poster. They had disobeyed God and sinned. Because of their sin, God told Adam and Eve they had to leave the garden and all the wonderful things in it. Have kids move and sit in another part of the room—leaving the poster behind. But God still cared for Adam and Eve. God sent them out of the garden, but he gave them clothing and another place to live. Then God blessed them with a family.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about what the serpent said to Eve and Adam about eating the fruit?
- Why do you think Adam and Eve disobeyed God?
- What does the way God took care of Adam and Eve—even after they sinned—tell us about God?

Say: God knows that everyone has sinned, but God still loves us. ► GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES so we can stay away from sin.

God gives us good things to take care of, too.

Have kids draw on white paper three things they care for most. Then have kids each cut the items out and tape them to their My Bible Playground page to represent the good things in their own "Garden of Eden."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about the good things you drew.
- What choices can you make today to care for the good things God's given you?

Say: GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES. We can choose to take care of our world.

CENTER 2:

Banana Split

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands.

Say: When God made Adam and Eve, there was nothing bad in the world. No one was mean. No one disobeyed. Everything was perfect. Give each child an unpeeled banana half and a paper plate. God wanted the world to stay perfect, but Adam and Eve chose to do something that was wrong. Have kids each peel the banana and break it into pieces on their paper plate. Adam and Eve disobeyed the rule God gave them. When they did, it changed everything forever. Ask the kids whether the bananas can be put back together again. The nice world God had made was not so nice anymore. In fact, it was broken. Adam and Eve's sin had spoiled it. God knew Adam and Eve had made a wrong choice, but he still cared for them.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the way Adam and Eve's sin changed the world?
- What made the banana better before it was broken into pieces?
- What do you think about the way God allowed Adam and Eve to still live in the world after they'd broken it?

Say: When we mess up, or sin, like Adam and Eve, God forgives us and allows us a chance to still have good things no matter the mess we've made. We can still live in the world today and have good things, just like we can still eat and enjoy our bananas even after they've been broken. ▶ GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES and we can always ask him for help—even after we sin.

Pray: God, thank you for helping us make good choices, and thanks for our snack. In Jesus' name, amen.

Allow kids to eat their snack.

CENTER 3:

Bubbling Over

What You'll Do

Have children form teams of three, and give each team a bottle of bubbles. Have teams stand 5 feet away from the wastebasket.

Say: Try to blow your bubbles into the wastebasket from where you're standing. The goal for your team is to land as many bubbles as you can in the wastebasket. Take turns being the bubble blower. After the bubbles are in the air, your entire team can try to blow them into the wastebasket. Ready? Go!

Allow kids to attempt for a minute to keep track of any bubbles that make it in—it's not likely any will at this point. Say: **Great tries! Take two steps toward the bucket and try again.** Allow another minute. If any bubbles go in, celebrate with the teams. Say: **Now get as close as you'd like to the wastebasket and try again. I think we can get a lot**

of bubbles in this time! Allow one more minute and celebrate the victories. Then have children put the lids on their bubbles and sit in a circle.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was difficult about getting the bubbles in the wastebasket when you were far away?
- What made it easier as you got closer to the wastebasket?

Say: Working hard to make a good choice can be difficult, too. But just as it got easier to blow bubbles into the wastebasket as you got closer, it's easier to make good choices when you stay close to God.

Ask:

What are things you can do to stay close to God?

Say: When we love God with our whole heart, that brings us close to God, too.

Make Good Choices, and we can do that by loving God with all our heart. Guide children in repeating today's simplified Key Verse: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Center 4: Pray Before Choosing Supplies

CENTER 4:

Pray Before Choosing

What You'll Do

Gather children near, and hold the pendant up high out of their reach.

Say: Just like Adam and Eve, we all sin. What are some things we do that are wrong? Allow kids to respond. When we do something wrong, we get farther away from God, just as Adam and Eve were farther away when they had to leave the garden after they sinned. Have children try to touch the pendant.

You are too far away to touch this pendant. When we do wrong things, we get farther away from God. Sometimes it can be hard to make a good choice. Tell about a time it wasn't easy for you to make a good choice. Help kids think of examples as needed.

We know God still cares for us like he cared for Adam and Eve, even when we make mistakes and when we sin. We can ask God to help us make good choices (have kids make praying hands), and when we do, we grow closer to God. Lower the pendant so kids can now touch it with their praying hands. Then have kids join hands in a circle. Let's ask God to help us make good choices.



I'll start our prayer, and then you can say what choices you'd like God's help with. Maybe you want to ask for help in making choices such as treating others with kindness, obeying God, and staying away from sin.

Pray: Dear God, thank you for always caring for us. Please help us to make good choices to... Have kids fill in what they'd like God's help with. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why did you ask God for help to make good choices?
- When are other times you can ask God for help in making choices?

Say: ► GOD WANTS US TO MAKE GOOD CHOICES, and the first step we can take to make a good choice is to talk to God about it in prayer. We can pray anytime, anywhere for help in making choices to stay away from sin.

Talk With Kids

- Pray to God before you make a hard choice at home or at school.
- Clean a room in your house and take care of the good things God's given you.

And anywhere. (spread arms wide)

To stay away from sin and wrong. (make a motion like you're pushing something away)

I love you, God, with all my heart; (fold arms over chest)

I love you all day long. (spread arms wide)

In Jesus' name, amen. (close eyes, bow head, and make praying hands)

Cain Kills Abel

Genesis 4:1-16

There were terrible consequences when Cain was jealous of Abel. It's not unusual for 5- and 6-year-olds to feel anger and jealousy toward their family members at times. They may stomp their feet, clench their fists, hit, yell, cry, or stick out their tongues. Tell children that no matter what's going on at the time, God wants us to love our families. Use this lesson to help kids understand they can show love to their families.

Cain Kills Abel

Genesis 4:1-16



Brothers Cain and Abel

Cain and Abel, the first two humans born on earth, chose different occupations. This early in human history, we see that God created people to be different—to have different interests and skills.

Cain Grows Jealous of Abel

Abel's sacrifice to God came from true gratitude for what God had done for him; Cain's apparently came from a feeling of obligation to maintain God's favor. Abel offered the best he had; Cain offered simply a sampling of his fruits. It's likely that God accepted or rejected their sacrifices based on the attitude of the giver's heart. God wants our best and wants our hearts to be right.

God to Cain: Be Careful What You Do

God knew Cain was at a dangerous junction. In Genesis 4:7, God's message to Cain was a loving warning—be careful what you do; sin can get the best of you. Unfortunately, Cain's jealousy got the best of him. The evil started by Adam and Eve continued. Cain proceeded with his planned deception and murdered his younger brother, Abel.

God Is Merciful to Cain

God didn't question Cain after the murder to gain information. God was offering him a chance to admit his sin and repent. As with Adam and Eve, Cain's sin in killing Abel was followed by a second sin: trying to hide the sin from God. God's second question to Cain was one of accusation, encouraging Cain to consider what he had done.

When God pronounced judgment upon Cain for his sin, Cain finally came to his senses and realized that separation from God would mean his own death. As with Adam and Eve, God was merciful, providing protection for Cain even though he didn't deserve it.

Jealousy and sin ripped apart the family of Adam and Eve. Yet this was the family through whom God worked to populate the earth. God must've known from the beginning what a sinful bunch these humans would be, yet he loved them just the same. And that's a very comforting message for us today.

God has taught us about love through Jesus' life and

members the way Jesus loves us: mercifully and unconditionally. How has God taught you about love through your family? Take some time to write a prayer for each member of your immediate family, expressing how God has loved you through them and expressing your love for them. Lead kids in doing the actions and singing "All God Made" (track 11 on the CD) to the tune of "The Farmer in the Dell."

The heavens, and the sea! (raise hands up; then make wave motions with both hands low)

His gifts of love sent from above; (cross arms over chest)

And then our God made me. (point to self)

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 6:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Deuteronomy 6:5, says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5). That means to love God with all of you. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse after you: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Let's put a puzzle together and learn what it means to do something with our whole heart. Give each child a heart puzzle piece and ask kids to guess what it might be. Then have children form pairs and put the pieces together.

Ask:

What do you love most about God?

Say: God loves us with his whole heart, not just part of it. We can love him the very best we can, too—with our whole heart! When we obey, help, hug, and speak kindly to our families, we're loving God. ▶ GOD WANTS US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES. Tell your partner about your family.

Pause for kids to share.

Say: I'll tell you about a child and you'll work with your partner to figure out if the child is showing love with a whole heart. If the answer is "yes," hold your puzzle pieces close together. If the child isn't showing love with a whole heart, move your puzzle pieces apart. Read the following scenarios, pausing after each to let pairs respond.

- A girl pinches her brother or sister.
- A boy helps his little sister brush her teeth.

Bible Time: Cain Kills Abel

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 4, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today we'll hear from the Bible that DOD WANTS US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES. Let's find out about some of the problems the very first family had in learning to love each other. Tape the poster of Cain and Abel to a nearby wall.

Say: These two people are Cain and Abel—Adam and Eve's sons. Cain worked the land to grow fruits, vegetables, and grain for his family. Point to the picture of Cain standing by a field of grain. Abel took care of the animals so his family would have meat. Point to the picture of Abel standing by the animals.

Ask:

What jobs or chores do you help your family with?

Say: MOD WANTS US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES. One way we do that is by helping out with chores such as cooking or cleaning or setting the table. Place an empty bowl by Cain's side of the poster. Cain was good at what he did. Cain's land produced a lot of food, and Cain had many blessings. Give each child a small portion of rice on a paper towel. Cain decided to give some back to God as an offering. But Cain didn't give his best to God. Have the kids take a few grains of rice—keeping most for themselves—and put the few grains in the bowl. Place the second bowl by Abel's side of the poster.

Say: Abel was good at what he did, too. Abel took care of lots of sheep and goats and had many blessings. Give each child a handful of cotton balls. Abel wanted to give God a gift to show how thankful he was. So Abel looked at all his animals and chose the very best to give back to the Lord. Have the kids each choose the fluffiest cotton ball and put it in the bowl by Abel's side of the poster. God was very pleased with Abel's offering. Abel had given the best to God. Hold up the bowl of cotton balls. When Cain saw that God liked Abel's offering better than his, Cain became so angry and jealous that he thought of ways to hurt his brother.

Tell about a time that you felt jealous of someone. Then encourage children to tell about a time they felt jealous and what they did.

Say: Cain didn't do what was right. He didn't treat Abel in a loving way. In fact, Cain did an awful thing and killed his brother. Take down the poster, collect the remaining rice, and put the bowls behind you. God told Cain that he must leave his family and that he would no longer be able to farm the land. But because God cared for Cain, even though Cain had done a terrible thing, God allowed Cain to go to another land and start a family.

Say: For God Wants US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES, and we can love our families by being kind and caring. When we get mad at a family member, we can talk to an adult and come up with loving ways to treat that person.



CENTER 2:

Food From God

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Then have kids form pairs, and demonstrate for them how to make a mini sandwich with the food. Give one child in each pair the crackers and the other some meat. Have them work together to make their snack.

Say: Cain grew grains and plants to feed his family, maybe much like the grains used to make these crackers. Allow kids to examine the crackers. Abel raised animals, maybe like the animals farmers raise today to provide meat. Allow kids to examine the deli meat.

People today still raise plants and animals for food. When we share meals or snacks together, we can be thankful for God's blessings and remember that

GOD WANTS US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES. Let's tell God how thankful we are for our snack and our families.

Pray: God, thank you for giving us families to love. And thank you for our snack. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

As children eat their snacks, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- What mealtime jobs can you help with at home?
- What can you do during mealtimes to show your family you love them?

Say: ► GOD WANTS US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES, and one great way you can do that is to help with mealtime jobs and share meals with your family.

CENTER 3:

Set and Clear

What You'll Do

Gather kids around a table. Show children how to set the plate in the middle of the construction paper (used as a place mat), with a napkin and fork on one side and the spoon on the other side, and a cup above the plate. Then place all the items back in the bag. Have kids line up on the other side of the room.

Say: You're going to pretend to be a family and work together to set and clear the table. The first person will carry the bag to the table, lay out one item, and then bring the bag back to the next person in line. That person will go to the table and put out another item. Continue until the table is set. Ready? Go! Have the kids see

how long it takes them to play the game. Now we'll play again. This time encourage each other to see if you can get the table set faster.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time you helped with a chore at home. Why did you help?
- What are other jobs or chores you can do to help at home?

Say: We're each an important part of our families. ► GOD WANTS US TO LOVE OUR FAMILIES, and when we help out at home, we show love to our family members.

What You'll Do

ive- and six-year-olds are trying to make sense of their world. Often when adults ask young children to do something, kids don't immediately obey. Instead they ask, "Why?" Rather than getting impatient, calmly and lovingly give kids simple reasons for your requests. Noah is a great example of a man who obeyed God even when things didn't make sense. Use this lesson to help children understand they can choose to obey God, too.

Noah Builds the Ark

Genesis 6:5-22



A Drastic Solution to a Huge Problem

God's statement in Genesis 6:7 grew out of pain and was a sorrowful acknowledgment that to make things better, most of the earth's population would have to die. The people that God created had so turned against him that he had to start over with the few who remained faithful.

Fortunately, one righteous man still loved God. The word translated "righteous" in verse 9 indicates that Noah sought both to worship and obey God and also to live in fairness with his human neighbors who didn't share his values. Noah was a shining example of goodness in a dark world.

Consider the immensity of the task Noah undertook. The ark was one and a half times the length of a football field, as wide as a high-school basketball court is long, and as tall as a five-story building. There were to be three decks inside and many rooms to house all the different animals. All of this was to be built of a particular kind of wood (which we can't identify precisely) in an arid area where wood likely was not plentiful.

A Unique, Sea-Worthy Vessel

Obviously no one had ever built a floating zoo of that size. Fortunately, God knew what he was doing. Modern shipbuilding experts have confirmed that the dimensions given in the Bible would be ideal to ensure that a large wooden vessel would remain intact and upright while adrift in heavy seas.

In addition to caring for his family, Noah was given the responsibility of housing and feeding two of every kind of animal in the ark (Genesis 6:19, 21). In an amazing miracle, God led all the animals to the ark at just the right time. And the reason there were seven pairs of certain animals was so that Noah would have animals

to sacrifice in worship without wiping out a species (Genesis 7:2-3).

We don't know how often Noah was discouraged or if his neighbors and family ridiculed him. But we do know that he "did everything just as God commanded him." And that's a great example of faithful obedience for all of us.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus obeyed God in every turn and detail of his life. When we look to Jesus and follow his example, we're obeying God. What a beautiful way to live!

When has God directed you to do something? It can sometimes seem scary, but it's also exciting because God reveals his faithfulness and strength when we obey him in the things he asks us to do. Take comfort in knowing that when you obey, God will give everything you need to carry out his plans. Ask God what he wants you to do. You can write your prayer here.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

What You'll Do

As the children arrive, greet each child and welcome him or her with a smile. When it's time to begin, use your signal to bring the children together in a circle. Lead the kids in doing the actions and singing "It's Good to Have You..." (track 14 on the CD) to the tune of "Oh Where, Oh Where Has My Little Dog Gone?"

It's good to have you in church today. (nod your head and point to everyone in the room)

Let's sing, (cup hands around mouth) **let's learn,** (point to your head) **and let's pray.** (make praying hands)

We'll make new friends, and we'll have so much fun. (shake someone's hand)
We're glad you've joined us today! (hold hands in a circle and swing hands back and forth)
(Repeat 2x.)

Say: Today we'll learn that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO OBEY. The Bible tells us about how Noah obeyed God and built the ark—a giant boat! Let's sing a song about Noah's adventure.

Lead the children in singing and doing the motions to "Arky, Arky" (track 13 on the CD).

The Lord told Noah, there's gonna be a floody, floody. (hold arms up; then wiggle fingers to make "rain")

Lord told Noah there's gonna be a floody, floody.

Get those animals out of the muddy, muddy, (shake index finger)

Children of the Lord.

The Lord told Noah to build him an arky, arky. (pretend to hammer) Lord told Noah to build him an arky, arky.
Build it out of gopher barky, barky,
Children of the Lord.

Everything was fine and dandy, dandy, (nod your head and smile) Children of the Lord.

So rise and shine and give God the glory, glory. (raise arms, and spread fingers wide like sunshine)

Children of the Lord.

Say: God told Noah to prepare for a big flood, and Noah obeyed God. By obeying God, Noah saved his family and many animals—and Noah showed that he loved God with his whole heart. ▶ GOD WANTS US TO OBEY, too. Let's see how we can show God we love him with our whole hearts.



All of Me!

What You'll Do

Have the children form a circle and sit down. Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 6:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Deuteronomy 6:5, says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5). That means to love God with all of you. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse after you: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).



All of Me! Supplies

Bible



Say: Loving God isn't just a feeling. It can be acting and doing. Loving God with your whole heart means loving God with every part of you: the thinking part, the moving part, the talking part, and the feeling part. Every single part of us can show love to God.

Let's play a game to practice loving God with our whole heart. When I say a body part, you act out a way you can use it to love God.

Show me how you can love God with your whole heart by using your hands. Allow children time to respond, and if they need help suggest making praying hands. Ask the kids to think of ways to show they love God using their feet, voice, arms, and other body parts as you continue. Make suggestions as needed.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What's your favorite way to show you love God? Why?

Say: God loves us so much! And GOD WANTS US TO OBEY to show our love for him. We can show God that we love him with our whole heart when we obey God every day. The Bible tells us that Noah showed love to God by obeying God and building a big boat called an ark. Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: Love God with your whole heart. (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Say: Friends, it's time for Theo's News!

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Friends, what can you do with a hammer?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this hammer in the Surprise Box?

Teacher: Yes, Theo, we can use a hammer to build things. ▶ **GOD WANTS US TO OBEY.** The Bible tells us Noah obeyed God and worked hard to build an ark, which is a

Teacher: That's right, Theo! Friends, let's read the Bible to find out more about Noah

and his ark!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Noah's Ark

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 6, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Invite a child to act out Noah's actions as you tell kids about Noah's obedience. Have the other children form groups to act out and make noises for the following people and animals: men, women, pigs, hens, snakes, mice, and owls.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that GOD WANTS US TO OBEY. But in Noah's day, people fought and thought mean things about each other. God wanted people to obey him.

Have the groups line up in this order: men, women, pigs, hens, snakes, mice, owls, and Noah.

Say: When you hear me talk about the person or animal you're pretending to be, make the animal noise or repeat what the people say.

As I was saying, back in Noah's day, people did bad things. God asked, "Who'll say they're sorry and be kind?"

"Not I," shouted the men. Pause and allow children to repeat.

"Not I," yelled the women. Pause and repeat.

"Not I," grunted the pigs. Pause and allow kids to make animal sounds.

"Not I," clucked the hens. Pause for animal sounds.

"Not I." hissed the snakes. Pause for animals sounds.

"Not I," squeaked the mice. Pause for animal sounds.

"Not I." hooted the owls. Pause for animal sounds.

"I will-God wants me to obey," said Noah. Pause and allow Noah to repeat.



Bible Time: Noah's Ark Supplies

God said, "I'll send a flood of water because people are disobeying me and being mean to each other. But Noah obeys me. I want Noah to build a huge boat so Noah, his family, and some animals will live. Who'll help me build the ark?" Repeat the sequence given earlier. Set out the "Noah's Ark" poster.

Say: So Noah obeyed God and built the ark. Noah worked hard for a long time building the ark. Noah cut and sawed and sanded and pounded until finally the ark was done. Lead kids in acting out the motions of building the ark. God asked, "Who'll help load food onto the ark for the animals?" Repeat the sequence given earlier.

Say: **Noah loaded food onto the ark.** Lead kids in acting out the motions of carrying heavy loads of food. **Then God sent the animals, two of each. Onto the ark galloped horses and zebras. Onto the ark pounded elephants and hippos.** Lead kids in acting out the motions and sounds of horses, zebras, elephants, and hippos. Allow the kids to get noisy, and then guiet them with your signal.

Finally this squeaking, squawking zoo was ready to go. When Noah and his family were safely inside the ark, God shut the door. It started to rain and rain and rain. Squirt water from a water bottle over the kids in a fine mist. I wonder who wanted to be on the ark now. Lead kids through this new sequence of responses in their groups.

- "I wish I was," shouted the men. Pause and allow children to repeat.
- "I wish I was," yelled the women. Pause and repeat.
- "I wish I was," grunted the pigs. Pause and allow kids to make animal sounds.
- "I wish I was." clucked the hens. Pause for animal sounds.
- "I wish I was," hissed the snakes. Pause for animal sounds.
- "I wish I was," squeaked the mice. Pause for animal sounds.
- "I wish I was," hooted the owls. Pause for animal sounds.
- "I was on the ark-I obeyed God," said Noah. Pause and allow Noah to repeat.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about what Noah did to obey God?
- Why do you think Noah and his family obeyed God even though it was hard?
- Tell about a time someone told you to do something that was hard.

Say: Noah obeyed God, and everyone on the ark was safe from the flood. ▶ GOD WANTS US TO OBEY. When we obey God, we live as God wants us to. We can be like Noah and obey God, too.



Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're



ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

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CENTER 1:

Noah Obeys, I Obey

What You'll Do

Help kids write their names on their My Bible Playground pages. Then have children form pairs, and ask them to describe to each other how the people or animals in the pictures are obeying.

Say: Draw in the blank square a picture of a time you obeyed. Then show your picture to your partner and tell who you were obeying.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Who are people you obey?
- What makes it easy or difficult to obey adults?

Say: ► GOD WANTS US TO OBEY. Noah obeyed God when he listened to him and built an ark. It took Noah a long time but he obeyed God every day. We can obey God, too.

CENTER 2:

Edible Arks

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands and then find partners. Give each child a paper plate and a handful of pretzel sticks and animal crackers.

Say: Use the pretzels to outline an ark on a paper plate and to make paths leading to the ark. Pause. Work with your partner to figure out which animal cracker shapes there are and find each animal a matching partner. Pause and allow kids to pair animals. You can march the animals along the paths to the pretzel ark. Pause and allow kids to move the crackers. Talk with your partner about what you like about each animal and the special things it can do. Allow kids to talk about the animals for two minutes. There are many animals that can learn to obey, and animals obeyed God when they got on the ark.

Say: God made everything to be very good and to obey him—even animals!



CENTER 3:

Stick Trick

What You'll Do

Say: God told Noah to build an ark, and Noah obeyed. Point to the ark. God said, "Bring two of each kind of animal into the ark." Show children the animal stickers. Noah obeyed and let pairs of animals into the ark.

Work together to put one animal sticker on one craft stick and the matching animal sticker on another craft stick. Pause. Then mix the sticks and lay the sticks with the stickers facing down on the floor outside the ark. Pause.

Here are the rules for the game. One at a time turn over two sticks, looking for a matching pair of animals. If you find a pair, you can put the animals in the ark and take another turn. If you don't find a pair, you'll turn the sticks over and let another person play. Continue the game until the ark is filled with pairs of animals.

After children finish the game, congratulate them on obeying the rules, too.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What helped you follow the rules of the game?
- What helps you follow rules at home?
- What are some rules God has for us?

Say: You obeyed rules and it made our game fun. Noah obeyed God by following rules for building the ark and filling it with animals. We can obey God's rules, too.

► GOD WANTS US TO OBEY and to follow his rules always.

Help kids each write their name on the back of a paper plate "ark."



Cut off one half of the outer rim (approximately 2 inches) of the paper plates, keeping the entire arch intact. (See the illustration included here.)

Genesis 7–8; 9:8-16

f you promise 5- or 6-year-olds anything, you'd better follow through! Kids this age still think of things in black-or-white terms, so promises made are promises to be kept. Use this lesson to remind children that while adults sometimes forget to keep their promises, God keeps all of his promises. God never lies.

God Floods the Earth

Genesis 7–8; 9:8-16



God Speaks to Noah—Noah Obeys

Genesis 6 wraps up with Noah obeying "God" (*Elohim*). Chapter 7 begins with "the Lord" (*Yahweh*) speaking to Noah. The use of these two names in these places is noteworthy. The name *Elohim* tends to be used to emphasize God's justice, and the name *Yahweh* most often denotes God's mercy. In Chapter 6, Noah carried out God's orders that showed God's judgment on humankind. In Chapter 7, we see the administration of God's mercy in the salvation of Noah's family and the animals.

The Flood Arrives

When the flood came, it wasn't caused only by rain. We read also that "the springs of the great deep burst forth." Water came shooting upward from under the earth's surface as rain deluged the earth from above. There was so much water that it covered the highest mountains by more than 20 feet! Some scientists believe that this event involved the sliding of continents and the creation of mountain ranges as subterranean plates slid and crashed together.

Noah and His Family Return to Dry Land

Once the rain stopped, it took almost a year for the water to recede sufficiently for Noah and his family to leave the ark. It's interesting that one of the birds Noah had sent out to see if the earth was getting dry returned with an olive leaf. The olive branch has come to symbolize peace. Perhaps in the time of Noah it symbolized a new peace between God and his creation.

Notice that Noah had a method for testing to see if the earth was dry, but God told him when he should

leave the ark (Genesis 8:15-17). God was taking care of Noah and his family, just as he had promised.

God Makes a Promise

In Genesis 9:12-16, God again demonstrated his love for Noah. He made another promise, signified by the rainbow. The rainbow will always remind us of God's promise to Noah and the fact that God always keeps his promises!

The Jesus Connection

Everyone—adults included—struggles to keep commitments and promises. As we juggle responsibilities to family, job, spouse, and friends, we often find these commitments conflicting with each other. And to add to the challenge, we live in a world where the character trait of "faithfulness" isn't necessarily valued.

Pray for individuals in your ministry that as they model faithfulness and promise-keeping to others, they also paint a picture of a promise-keeping God. You can write your prayer here.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

Rainbow Reminders

What You'll Do ■■■■■■

Have the children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 6:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Deuteronomy 6:5, says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5). That means to love God with all of you. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse after you: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

God loves us so much—with his whole heart. We know God loves us that much because God always does what he says he'll do. ▶ GOD NEVER LIES. In the Bible today we'll learn that God keeps his promises and we'll hear about how God sent a rainbow to Noah as a wonderful way to keep a promise. Let's play a game where we can find a reminder of God's promise.

Separate the Rainbow Wrist Reminders and hide them around the room.



Invite a child to be the first to play the game. Take the child by the hand and lead him or her around the room looking for a Rainbow Wrist Reminder. When you find one, help him or her put it on, securing it with a rainbow sticker (you may also want to use a piece of tape to reinforce the sticker).

Say: Because God loves us and always keeps his promises, we can love God with our whole hearts! Now [name of child who found the wrist reminder] can choose a friend and promise to help him or her find a Rainbow Wrist Reminder. Have kids pass a Rainbow Wrist Reminder around the group so they'll know what they're looking for. When you find one, help your friend put his or her Rainbow Wrist Reminder on and say the Key Verse together: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5). Lead kids in saying the simplified Key Verse for practice: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Then it'll be the next person's turn to make a promise and guide a new friend to find a Rainbow Wrist Reminder. Tell kids to sit down when they finish and continue to play until everyone has had a turn. (The last child should lead you to find one, too!) Finish by having everyone shout, "Love God with your whole heart! Deuteronomy 6:5!"

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What made it easy or difficult to keep going until you helped your friend find a Rainbow Wrist Reminder?
- What makes it easy or difficult to keep a promise you make to a friend?

Say: We know that God loves us very much and always does what he says he'll do for us.

GOD NEVER LIES. That's one reason we love him. When we love God with our whole heart, we give thanks for his wonderful promises. Have children say the simplified Key Verse with you one more time: Love God with your whole heart. (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the animals wondering if God would keep his promise?
- What makes it easy or difficult to trust God to keep his promises?

Say: God sent a rainbow to Noah and the animals as a promise that he'd never again send a flood to cover the earth. Wherever we are, we don't have to worry because ► GOD NEVER LIES. God will never flood the whole earth again, and we can say thanks to God for keeping his promise.

Center 4: It's Raining Buckets! Supplies

2 large bowls (or buckets) water plastic cup small towel markers index card tape

Draw a rainbow on the index card, and tape it to the bottom of one bowl. Fill that bowl with water.

What You'll Do

Place the bowls on opposite ends of the room. Have kids line up behind the empty bowl.

Say: Under the bowl that's filled with water is a special surprise. To get to it you'll need to take turns running with the cup to the water bowl, scooping up some water, and bringing it back to pour into the empty bowl. When you get to the very last of the water, use the towel to soak it up and squeeze the last drops into the other bowl. Then you can see the special surprise. Ready? Go! Allow kids to play the relay game and help them as needed. After the water bowl is emptied, lift it so the kids can see the rainbow.

Say: When God flooded the earth, it rained for 40 days and 40 nights. When the rain stopped, there was a lot of water! But God promised Noah that all of his hard work in building the ark would save him. And God kept his promise because the waters



went away. Sometimes it takes hard work from us to get to see God's sweet promises, but God always does what he says he'll do.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time you had to wait for a promise.
- What can we do when a promise is taking a long time?

Say: When God makes a promise, he keeps it because ▶ GOD NEVER LIES. We can thank God for keeping his promises even if we have to work hard or wait to see them.

People Build a Tower at Babel

Genesis 11:1-9



People Turn Away From God Again

The pattern continues. Just a few generations and likely only 100 to 200 years after the miraculous saving of Noah's family in the ark, the descendants of those ark dwellers turned away from God. After Noah came out of the ark, one of God's commands to him was to "fill the earth" (Genesis 9:1). It appears that God wanted people to spread out across the earth, but some people decided to group together in a city, making a name for themselves and keeping themselves from being scattered. They showed no concern for glorifying or obeying God. And Noah lived to see all of this happen—Genesis 9:28 tells us that Noah lived 350 years after the Flood!

The people's intent in building a tower was not to reach heaven, as some have suggested, but to build something showy that would bring them recognition. People from all around would see the tall tower that seemed to reach into the heavens. Others would marvel at what they had done, and the builders would be proud. In essence, they tried to make themselves look more important than God.

The Tower Was Just the Beginning

If these people were able to do such a self-serving, God-defying thing as to build this tower, what other evil things were next on the horizon? How long would it be before none were left who honored God? Out of concern for keeping people from further evil, God put a stop to what was happening by causing people to speak different languages.

God's Still in Charge

It's interesting to think about how God might have used this incident to differentiate various races.

By selectively giving certain individuals the same language, God could have directed which people clustered together, and their gene pools could have resulted in races with very different physical characteristics, such as exist today.

Some ancient reports indicate that an unfinished tower stood—perhaps for centuries—just outside the city of Babylon. God took something that evil people intended as a monument to themselves and turned it into a monument to his power and sovereignty. God wants us all to remember what he's done for us and how much we need him!

The Jesus Connection

In all our decisions and experiences, we need God. God meets our needs through Jesus, who fulfills our greatest needs for mercy, love, and eternal life. Jesus is our everything!

How are you relying on God? Pray and ask God how your experiences can be a testament to his power and sovereignty. You can write your prayer here.

Lead the kids in making praying hands and singing "We Need God" (track 18 on the CD) to the tune of "This Old Man."

Thank you, God!

(Repeat.)

Say: No matter where we are or what we're doing, ▶ WE NEED GOD. When we ask for God's help and show God we need him, we show God we love him with our whole hearts. Let's learn more about loving God with all of us—not just part of us.





The Whole Part

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands and gather at a table. Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 6:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Deuteronomy 6:5, says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5). This means that you can love God with your whole heart. Let's say it together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse with you: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Then show kids a cracker, and say: **Who wants a bite of this cracker?** Give the kids each a tiny crumb of the cracker, leaving most of it intact. **Didn't you just love that cracker?** Start to put the cracker away. See if the kids complain that they got only small crumbs. Then say: **Oh, you mean you wanted the** *whole* **cracker?**

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you think when I gave you only crumbs?
- Why did you want a whole cracker?

Bring out the cracker again.

Say: Just as you wanted all of this cracker, God wants all your love. WE NEED GOD, and the Bible says to love God with our whole hearts! Give each child a whole cracker to eat. What are ways you can love God with your whole heart? Help children with ideas as needed. When kids have finished eating, lead them in saying the simplified Key Verse once more: Love God with your whole heart (Deuteronomy 6:5).

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this paper with foreign words on it in the Surprise Box?

Theo: Well, it helps me understand another language!

Teacher: You're a smart dog, Theo!

(Ask kids if they understood any of the foreign words. Pause for kids to respond.) **Teacher:** We need words to talk to each other but it's hard to understand a language

you don't speak.

Theo: That's right! I didn't understand those languages.

Teacher: You know what else we need, Theo? ▶ **WE NEED GOD.** In the Bible today, we'll hear about some people who forgot they needed God and we'll find out what

happened to their words!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 11, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that ▶ WE NEED GOD.

After the flood, Noah's children grew up and had children, and those children grew up and had children, and those children grew up and had children. The world was getting full of people again! Let's listen to our brick puppets, Brickster and Brick Brack, tell us about what happened to the people in a place called Babel.

Invite two children to control the puppets while the CD plays. Play "Babbling Bricks" (track 17 on the CD). Pause the CD while the kids look for the box of blocks and build a tower. Then continue the track to its end.



Say: Wow! The people wanted to build a tall tower, and they believed they could do great things without God's help. They forgot about God! So God mixed up their languages so they couldn't talk to each other. Set out "The Tower of Babel" poster, the pile of foreign words, and several glue sticks.



Say: Can any of you say something in a different language? Let kids tell you a word or two they know in another language. Here's a pile of words from other languages. Let's put these words onto the poster to show that everyone was talking in different languages. Say the words aloud and have children repeat the foreign words as they place them on the poster. The people forgot about God, so God mixed up their language and made them scatter. That way they couldn't depend only on each other. They learned everyone needs God. Have kids scatter around the room and then shout together

"WE NEED GOD!" Then have children sit in a circle.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the way the people of Babel forgot about God?
- What do you think about God mixing up their words so they spoke new languages?
- Why do you think the people thought they didn't need God?
- When do you need God?

Say: God created us to learn how to do all kinds of things, but God also wants us to ask him to be part of what we do. The people of Babel got so busy building their tower that they forgot to ask God for help. ▶ WE NEED GOD to help us each day in everything we do.



Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

CENTER 1:

What You'll Do

Demonstrate folding the pages along the dotted lines. Secure the sides with tape to form open-ended bricks. (Be sure the bricks can be reopened later to see the Daily Challenges and at-home activities.) Then play a language game. Say: Let's use our imaginations and make up words to mean "Pick up your bricks"—such as "Mumbo zumbo." Make up your new words. Now let's make up other words to mean "Stack them up." After you've made up your new words, give your orders and see if kids can follow your directions and build a tower out of their bricks.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was easy or difficult about building a tower when you heard the directions in a different language?
- What can you do when you're having trouble understanding things on your own?
- What can you do when you're having trouble understanding something about God?

Say: The people forgot about God and they wanted to try to do great things by themselves, so God mixed up the people's language. God wanted to remind them—and us—that ▶ WE NEED GOD! We can show God we know we need him by asking for his help.

CENTER 2:

Brick Stackin' Snacks

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Then guide them in building small towers using mini marshmallows connected by toothpicks. Say: **As you stack your marshmallow creations and build your tower, tell about ways we need God's help.** Help kids as needed in coming up with examples. **Let's thank God for always being here to help us and also thank him for our snack.**

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Pray: God, we need you and we thank you for always being here to help us. Thank you for our yummy snack. In Jesus' name, amen.

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Talk With Kids

As children eat their snack, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- Tell about a time this past week you needed help.
- What can you do this week if you need help?

Say: In the Bible, the people of Babel forgot they needed God. But ▶ WE NEED GOD always. We can always pray to God and ask for his help.

CENTER 3:

What's That You Say?

What You'll Do

Have the children sit in a circle. Explain that you're going to play the game of Telephone.

Say: I'm going to whisper something in the first person's ear and then that person will whisper the same message to the next person, and so on, until the message gets back to me. Whisper very quietly so only the person you're telling the message to can hear you.

Using a foreign language, whisper **WE NEED GOD**" into the first child's ear. You can use Spanish: *Necesitamos a Dios (Ness-es-ee-tah-mos ah Dee-os),* French: *Nous avons besoin de Dieu (News av-on bezh-won deh Diy-uh),* German: *Wir brauchen Gott (Veer brow-chen Got),* or a foreign language you're familiar with. Encourage each child to pass the message on as best as he or she can to the next child in the circle. When the message gets back to you, ask the following questions.

Ask:

- Who can tell me what the special message was?
- Why was it so hard for you to understand the message?
- Who would like to play again and hear our special message?

Play the game again, and this time say ▶ "WE NEED GOD" in the children's own language.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why was it easier the second time to understand our special message?
- What are things in the Bible that are hard to understand?
- Who are people you can talk to about the Bible and God?

Encourage kids to paint all over the papers until they see God's name appear.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What can you do with your painting so you'll remember to ask God for help?
- What can you do to show God that you need him?

Say: We can ask for God's help anytime, anywhere, and about anything.

• WE NEED GOD. And God's always here for us!

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Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that ▶ WE NEED GOD. I'd like each of you to choose a way to ask God for help this week.

Read these three ideas for children to choose from:

- Ask your mom or dad to help you make a snack for your friends. Ask God to help you make the snack super-yummy.
- When you're having trouble understanding something this week, ask for God's help.
- If you're playing a sport this week, ask God to help you play your best.

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. 

Abram Follows God's Direction

Genesis 12:1-8



Abram Obeys God's Command to Move

"Sell everything you can't carry, leave your friends and extended family, bring your wife and belongings. You'll probably never come back here again, but don't worry about that—I'll show you where to go." This was essentially God's command for Abram.

What trust in God it took for Abram to leave his home and everything familiar, and set out for an unknown destination, having only God's command to go on! Abram also had the worries of keeping intact the things he took with him. In those days, traveling with herds of livestock through unknown territory was treacherous. Besides, Abram was 75 years old! But he trusted and followed God.

Abram's Traveling Companions

What helped Abram on his way was a trusting relationship with God and the promises of blessing that would benefit not only his household but "all the peoples on earth"!

Lot, Abram's nephew, went along but probably not just for companionship or adventure. It was a disgrace in that culture to not have descendants, and Abram realized that he and his wife were getting too old to have children. Abram may have asked Lot to go because Abram had no offspring of his own to take charge if Abram died or became incapacitated.

We're told nothing about the journey, but the trip from Haran to Bethel was approximately 400 miles, much of it over rough desert land. Conflict with local residents was likely a daily occurrence, and the trip probably took a month or more.

God Blesses Abram for Obeying

Abram completed the journey in faith, and then, as described in Genesis 12:7, the Lord appeared to him. God had spoken to Abram earlier, but now God appeared and confirmed the promise he had made to Abram back at Haran: The fertile land before him would one day belong to his descendants. That meant the promises were beginning to come true!

Abram built an altar to honor God through worship. "Calling upon the name of the Lord" meant worshipping him and acknowledging him as God. Abram knew that God had blessed him already and that many more blessings were still to come.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus taught us how to trust in God and proved that God won't let us down. May Jesus' example inspire you to have the courage to trust as Abram did!

Think about an experience that challenged you to trust God. If you knew then what you know now, how would your trust level have been different? With that in mind, pray for each of the individuals in your ministry, asking God to strengthen and inspire them all to trust him. You can write your prayer here.

Say: Great job following the actions for the song! Today we'll learn about Abram—a man who loved and trusted God so much that he followed God's directions and went to live in a new land. ▶ WE CAN FOLLOW GOD, too, because God loves us.

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A Trustworthy God

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Proverbs 3:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Proverbs 3:5, says, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart." The word *Lord* is another name for God. Let's say the Key Verse together: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

Ask:

- What are ways you can show that you trust someone?
- Who are people who take care of you?

Say: Parents and other family members love us and take care of us, so we know we can follow what they say. ▶ WE CAN FOLLOW GOD, too, because he loves us and cares for us. When God says he'll do something, he'll do it—every time.

Hold up a pencil, and then let it fall to the ground. We know for sure that each time we let go of something, it'll fall to the ground. When we drop things, something called gravity pulls them to the ground. Take turns dropping this pencil and let's see if gravity really does work every time. Each time the pencil hits the ground, lead kids in repeating the Key Verse: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Did you trust that the pencil would fall to the ground each time you dropped it? Why or why not?
- What do you think about God always doing what he says he'll do?

Say: You trusted that gravity would pull down the pencil each time you dropped it. You can always trust God. WE CAN FOLLOW GOD and he'll always love and guide us through life. Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead children in saying the Key Verse with you: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

Teacher: My car keys! Theo, why did you put my car keys in the Surprise Box? **Theo:** I hid them in the Surprise Box because today you'll be talking about a man who

traveled a long way. And when you travel, you need your car keys.

Teacher: Friends, have you ever gone on a long trip? Where did you go?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Theo: What did you take with you on your long trip?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: The man we'll hear about today followed and trusted God to take care of him on his long trip. And ▶ **WE CAN FOLLOW GOD,** too. Friends, let's read the Bible to find out why the man went on the long trip!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: Abram Follows God

What You'll Do

Have kids sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Genesis 12, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book. Say: **Today the Bible tells us that** ▶ **WE CAN FOLLOW GOD.**

A man named Abram lived in a nice place with his family for a long time. But one day, God told Abram to leave his home and go to a new place. God said he'd show Abram where to go and bless him and many others with many good things. Abram knew he

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could follow God, so Abram packed up his belongings and his family and followed God to the new place. Show children the game board. First point out where Abram lived and then where he was headed.

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Ask:

- Turn to someone next to you and tell about a time you or a friend had to move to a new house or a new city.
- What did you like or not like about moving somewhere new?

Say: If we had to move today, we could follow God just as Abram did. God will guide us and bless us with good things.

Ask:

■ If your family had to move, what would you want to take with you? What would you pack? Pass the backpack around the circle, and have each child mention an item he or she would pack.

Say: Let's pretend we're on a journey and following God's lead. Lead the children on a short journey across the room, bringing the backpack with you. Along the way, collect several items from around the room to remind the children of their journey. For example, take your Bible, a pencil from your art supply area, or a jacket from the coat rack. Put the items in the backpack. Then lead kids back to your Bible Time area to sit in a circle again.

Say: God kept his promise and blessed Abram as he traveled. Bring out the snacks. Would you look at these? We've been blessed, too! ▶ WE CAN FOLLOW GOD and trust that God will bless us, just as Abram trusted God. But before we eat the snacks, let's find out how Abram's travels ended.

During the journey, God showed Abram a special land that God would give to Abram's children someday. Abram wanted to remember all that God had done for him and his family, so he built an altar. Have the kids work together to empty the backpack and place the items in the middle of the circle. An altar is something that reminds a person of an awesome and wonderful thing God has done. In Abram's day, people usually built altars out of rocks. But we're going to use what we collected on our journey around the room. Help kids stack the items to make an altar. Wow! This altar reminds us of our trip around our room, and it reminds us that God has blessed us.

Pray: Thank you, God, for leading us and blessing us. We know we can always follow you, God. Thank you for our snack, too. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

Have children clean their hands. As they eat their snack, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the way Abram followed God to a new home?
- What do you think about the altar Abram built to remember all God had done on the journey?
- What special things do you have to remind you of a family trip or adventure?



Say: Although going to a new place can be scary, it can also be an exciting family adventure and full of blessings. WE CAN FOLLOW GOD and trust God to guide us, just as God guided Abram. Put the items into the backpack to use for the closing prayer.

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Choose at least two of the learning centers to help reinforce today's Bible lesson. Gather the needed materials, and put the supplies in an out-of-sight area until you're ready for them. Allow the children to choose which center they'd like to explore first. Then circulate among the children as they create and explore. Encourage them to make connections between their activities and the Bible by asking them the questions included with each center's description.

What You'll Do

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What would you like or not like about moving to a new city?
- Tell about other new things you've had to do that were scary at first, like starting school or riding a bike without training wheels.

Say: When Abram moved, he followed God's lead. If you had to move, you could trust God to help you not be afraid. ▶ WE CAN FOLLOW GOD with new things and trust God to guide us and bless us.



CENTER 2:

Can I Take Your Order?

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands and form pairs by counting off by ones and twos. Then gather everyone.

Say: Today we're learning about how Abram followed God's directions and trusted God to take care of him. WE CAN FOLLOW GOD, too. And we can follow others' directions and take care of each other.

We have a couple of choices for your snack today. You can choose to eat pretzels or cheese crackers, and you can choose to drink water or apple juice. The Ones will go first. Ask your partner what he or she would like to eat and drink. Allow time for pairs to talk. Now Ones, you can go to the food table and follow your partners' directions of what he or she wants for snack. Help kids prepare snacks for their partners and then repeat with the Twos. After everyone has a snack, lead kids in prayer.

Pray: God, thank you for always guiding us and taking care of us. We know we can follow you. Thank you for our tasty snack, too. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

As children eat their snacks, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you do to follow directions and make the snack for your partner?
- What was easy or hard about trusting someone else to prepare the snack you chose?
- What's easy or hard about following God's directions?

Say: Following or trusting someone else—even God—can be difficult. One thing we know for sure is that ▶ WE CAN FOLLOW GOD no matter what. God will always take care of us when we follow him, just as God took care of Abram in the Bible.

Abram's Journey

What You'll Do ■■■■■

Gather children around a table with the "Abram's Journey" game ready to play. Divide kids into no more than six teams, and assign each a different game piece.

Say: We're going to play a game to learn about Abram's journey. Choose a game piece and then take turns rolling the color block to see where you can move your game piece. Whatever color you roll, move to the next closest space on the game

What You'll Do

Help kids write their names at the top of a handout page.

The words at the top of your page say, "I can follow God." What would you like to tell God about your drawing? Allow responses.

Let's pray about the things on your drawings and ask God to help us follow him as we try to do the things we drew.

Pray: Dear God,

Please help as we try to...Have kids who would like to share tell about what they need help with. We trust you, God, to help us follow you every day and in everything we do. In Jesus' name, amen.

Say: Take your drawings home with you and put them in a place where you'll see them this week. Keep praying about what's in your drawings. Abram kept talking to God during his journey, and it helped Abram to follow God the whole way.

• WE CAN FOLLOW GOD, too, by asking him to guide us every day.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do you think prayer helped Abram follow God on his journey?
- What do you think God will do this week as you pray about what's in your drawing?

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Say: It's very important to remember that we can pray to follow God every day, everywhere, no matter what!

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to the circle area on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage the children to share what they remember about what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that ▶ WE CAN FOLLOW GOD. I'd like each of you to choose a way to follow God's lead this week.

Read these three ideas for children to choose from:

- Collect pictures and other items around your house that remind you of your family. Build an altar with those items and thank God for his help.
- When your mom or dad tells you to follow directions, do what they say. It's good practice for following God.
- Pray about doing something new or something you're afraid to do, and ask God to lead you.

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as theirs!

Follow God Prayer

What You'll Do

Have kids join hands in a circle.

Say: Let's pray about new things in our lives or things we're scared of and ask God to lead us. I'll say, "God I need your help with..." and then you can share.

Lot and Abram Divide the Land

Genesis 13

ive- and six-year-olds have heard that it's good to get along with others—it's a focal point of early-childhood learning. They can grasp the importance of sharing and treating others with kindness. Lot and Abram are good examples for them of working out a tough issue facing kids this age—how to share well. Use this lesson to show children that getting along with others is something God wants them to do, not just a desire of their parents and teachers.

Lot and Abram Divide the Land

Genesis 13



Abram and Lot Go to Egypt

Abram and Lot had gone south into Egypt because of a famine in the land of Canaan (Genesis 12:10). In Egypt, Abram pretended to be Sarai's brother because Sarai was beautiful and Abram was afraid Pharaoh would kill him and take her. Pharaoh did bring Sarai into his palace, but he treated Abram very well, giving him sheep, cattle, servants, and a lot more. But then God began to inflict diseases on Pharaoh's household because of Sarai. When Pharaoh realized what was happening, he sent Abram and Sarai away.

Abram Returns to the Promised Land

Abram and Lot headed north, back to the land God had promised to Abram's descendants. This was another long journey of hundreds of miles. The travelers would travel from one source of food and water to the next, but they would have to stay at each place long enough for the flocks and herds to recover.

As Abram returned to Canaan, he again "called on the name of the Lord." Perhaps the incident in Egypt reminded Abram of who God is and of how blessed he was to be chosen by God.

Abram Concedes the Best Land to Lot

In Genesis 13:5 we discover for the first time that Lot was wealthy. It became apparent that a single area wasn't sufficient to support both of their families' flocks and herds.

In this situation and culture, etiquette dictated that Lot allow Abram to take whatever he deemed was rightfully his, because Abram was the more powerful and wealthy as well as the respected elder.

So Abram's offer probably shocked Lot. Abram, to keep peace within his family, was willing to give up what was rightfully his. Lot, thinking only of himself, made a choice his entire culture would have deemed unthinkable.

God Reaffirms Promises to Abram

After Lot left, God spoke again to Abram, expanding on the promise made earlier. God's command to Abram to walk around the land likely came from the custom that a new landowner would walk the boundary of the land he was purchasing. God was telling Abram that he had given Abram that land.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus' message of an unselfish and servant heart is central to improving our relationships. Thank Jesus for showing us how to be servants to all, for his sake.

Think about a relationship that's important to you. How would it improve if you put each other first? Look for an opportunity in the coming week to put that other person first, and see if it changes anything. You can pray for that person and write your prayer here.

Say: Today we'll learn that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG. We'll hear about a man named Abram and how he shared and got along with his nephew. Let's learn two verses in a song about Abram and Lot.

Lead kids in the actions as they sing "The Song of Abram" (#1) (track 21 on the CD) to the tune of "Jack and Jill."

Time had passed for Abram and Lot (tap wrist as if tapping a watch)
They both got very wealthy. (cup hands)
Animals and servants, too, (sweep one hand to left and other hand to right)
So crowded it soon got. (bump gently against a friend)

Abram said to nephew Lot, (mimic hand-talking)
"I'll let you choose land first. (point in two different directions)



God wants us to get along—(put arms around someone's shoulders) That's what our Lord has taught." (shake hands)

(Repeat from the beginning.)

Say: Abram and Lot knew that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG, so they did. They knew they could trust God's directions and do what God told them to do. Let's learn about trusting God.





A Valuable Trust

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Proverbs 3:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Proverbs 3:5, says, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5). Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in saying the Key Verse with you: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

Say: When you trust someone, you believe that person will do what he or she says. And you know that person will help you and take care of you. We can put all our trust in God, because God's promised us that he'll always love us and be with us. And God never lies!

Show children the cellphone, and say: This is very special to me. Tell kids about the phone and why you value it. I'm going to pass my cellphone around so all of you can see it up close. I trust all of you to take good care of it, because I told you how special it is to me. After the children have each had a turn holding the phone, thank them for returning it to you safely and carefully.

Say: I like my cellphone a lot and I trusted each of you to take care of it. I can trust you because I know you and I know you'll be careful. The more we get to know God and learn about how much he loves us, the more we can trust him with all our hearts.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What did you like or not like about the way I trusted you to be careful with my cellphone?

- What are some ways you can get to know God better?

Say: We can trust God with our whole hearts! That means we can trust God with anything that's important to us. We can trust God because we know God, and we know God loves us and will take care of us. Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead children in saying the Key Verse with you: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

Teacher: That reminds me of what we're learning today. Abram and Lot had a choice to make. Sometimes, when people have a choice to make, they only think about what's best for themselves. But ▶ **GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG.** Friends, let's read the

Bible to see what Abram and Lot chose.

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.



Bible Time: Dividing the Land

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 13, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG. Let's find out how Abram got along with his nephew Lot.

God told Abram to leave the home where his family lived and go to a new place that God would show him. So Abram packed his bags, took his wife, Sarai, and his nephew Lot, and followed God on a journey to a new place. Lay the game board where kids can see it, and point to the place where Abram started his journey.

Along the way, Abram and Lot became very rich and had lots of animals and people to serve them. Move your finger along the game board. Soon it was too crowded for all the people and animals to live together in one place. Abram knew that ▶ GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG, so he pointed out across all the land they could see and asked Lot to choose where he would like to live. Abram let Lot choose first! Lot could choose either a beautiful land with plenty of water, or a dry land.

Lead the kids to the lush area you prepared. Have children relax on the floor, and serve everyone a cup of water.

Play "River Sounds" (track 19 on the CD) in the background. Say things such as "Ahhh...this is the life!" and "What nice, cool water to drink and beautiful green grass." Stop the CD at the end of the track.

Then lead kids to the desert area. Play "Whistling Wind" (track 20 on the CD) in the background. Say things such as "Wow, it's hot" and "There aren't many plants or nice things to look at." Stop the CD at the end of the track.

Ask:

■ What land do you think is best? Why?

Lead kids back to the lush area. Say: Lot chose the beautiful land that had lots of green plants and fresh water. Then lead the kids to the desert area. Abram took the land that was left over.

Have kids sit in a circle. Set out the "Lot Chooses" poster and markers, and give each child two sticky notes. Have kids draw a stick figure person on each. Collect the notes and put them in a pile.

Say: When Abram and Lot split up, they each took their families and their things with them. Abram took his things and went with his family to the drier land. And Lot took his things and went with his family to the green land. Let's divide up this pile and put half on one side with Lot and half on the other side with Abram. Help

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the way Abram and Lot got along?
- What surprises you about Abram's decision?
- What makes it easy or difficult to allow someone else to choose first?
- What are some ways you get along with others?

Say: GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG, and Abram and Lot gave us a great example of how to do that! We can do what God wants us to when we get along with others, too.

What You'll Do

Help kids write their names on their My Bible Playground pages. Set out scissors and tape, and give each child two craft sticks.

Say: Cut out the figures of Abram and Lot and tape them onto your craft sticks. Then put Abram into the slit that leads to the dry land and Lot into the slit that leads to the lush land. As you move your Abram and Lot stick puppets, share with each other what you learned from the Bible today.

Pre-K & K/Ages 5 & 6



Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about Abram allowing Lot to have the best land?
- What do you like or not like about the way Abram got along with his nephew, Lot?
- What are things you've shared with family and friends?
- Tell about a time you let someone choose first or go first in a game.

Say: Sometimes the best way to get along is to share, as Abram and Lot shared the land.

• GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG just like they did.

CENTER 2:

You Choose First!

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Then gather everyone, and have kids form pairs. Designate one child in each pair to pretend to be Abram and one child to pretend to be Lot.

Say: Abram and Lot had many sheep. They probably used a staff, or rod, to help guide and steer the sheep. The rod looked like this. Give each pair a pretzel rod. You and your partner hold the pretzel rod between you, and on the count of three, break the pretzel rod into two pieces. If you're pretending to be Abram, allow your friend pretending to be Lot to choose from the pretzel pieces first. Hand another pretzel rod to each pair, and have kids trade roles and play again.

Next, give each pair of kids a napkin with a pile of popcorn to represent Abram and Lot's sheep. Also give each child a napkin. Say: With your partner, divide the popcorn pieces evenly. Then use your pretzel rods to "guide" your popcorn sheep from the pile to your napkins. Allow time.

Pray: God, thank you for helping us get along each day with our friends and family. Thank you for our snack. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- When you were pretending to be Abram, what did you like or not like about letting Lot choose first?
- When you were pretending to be Lot, what did you like or not like about choosing first?



Center 2: You Choose First! Supplies

Center 4: Layout of the Land Supplies

1 sheet of paper per child washable markers Say: Abram knew that God wanted him to get along with others. Abram was very kind to Lot and let Lot choose first. You were great Abrams and Lots! You now know how much ▶ GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG.

CENTER 3:

Tight Squeeze

What You'll Do

Place one yarn loop on the floor for every five children. Have kids form teams of five.

Say: Try to get everyone in your group standing in the loop on the floor by the time the music stops.

Play "Are You Going to Praise the Lord?" (track 8 on the CD) while children are playing the game. Periodically stop the music, and let kids hold on to each other to fit as many as they can in their loop. Repeat the game if time allows.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What made it easy or difficult to get along in such a small space?
- What did you do to help each other?

Say: Abram knew that GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG. When things got too crowded, Abram knew that he and Lot should live in different areas. Abram let Lot choose the land he wanted to move to first. Abram put Lot before himself and that helped him get along with Lot very well.

CENTER 4:

Layout of the Land

What You'll Do

Ask children to draw the land that Abram and Lot divided. Place two brown markers on one side of the drawing area and two green markers on the other—kids will have to share to be able to draw their pictures.

Say: Share your supplies and draw green, well-watered land on one half of your papers and dry, brown land on the other half. After you draw the land, then you can draw the same number of people and animals on both lands.



Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you do for your friends here so everyone could draw a picture?
- What good things happen when you get along with others?

Say: OOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG with family members, friends, teachers, and everyone. Abram treated Lot the way he probably wanted to be treated. We can treat other people the way that we'd like to be treated, too, and get along with others.

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to the circle area on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage the children to share what they remember about what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that GOD WANTS US TO GET ALONG. I'd like each of you to choose a way to get along with others this week.

Read these three ideas for children to choose from:

- When you're playing with someone, let that person choose which game to play.
- This week, ask someone you've never played with before to play with you.
- Share your snack or dessert with a family member or friend.

Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as theirs!





God Makes a Covenant With Abram

Genesis 15:1-18



God Reveals His Plan to Abram

Abram had just returned from defeating a coalition of kings to rescue his nephew, Lot, and God appeared to him in a vision. Notice that in Haran God simply spoke to Abram; later in Canaan God appeared before Abram; now God appeared in a lengthy vision. With each meeting, God's plan for Abram became a bit more clear.

God's first words to Abram were words of comfort. What was bothering Abram was Abram's continuing lack of a son to be his heir. In response to God's words of comfort, Abram poured out his heart—pleading with God to bless him in this one area he'd not yet received God's promised blessing.

Abram Displays Faith in God

When God assured Abram by restating his promise that Abram would have his own son, Abram responded in faith. He believed God, and God declared him righteous because of his faith! Nothing that Abram could *do* in obedience to God could make him righteous, but his faith in God did!

To give Abram complete assurance, God made a covenant with him. In those days a covenant was a very serious thing. The cutting in half of animals described in Genesis 15:10 was to signify that the same would happen to any party breaking the covenant. Notice, however, that Abram wasn't asked to pass between the animals, which would have sealed his commitment to the covenant. Only God, symbolized by the smoking firepot and blazing torch, passed and sealed God's commitment to the covenant. Only God was required to fulfill the covenant.

God Promises to Bless Abram's Descendants

Another interesting note is that each type of animal that was sacrificed was later used in particular cleansing ceremonies and sacrifices.

God's listing of all the things that were to come for Abram's descendants accomplished at least two things: First, it confirmed that God's promise would come true because God could see the results more than 400 years in the future. Second, it assured Abram that even though his people would endure hardship, they would eventually possess the land as God had promised.

Tip Consistently use the same signal to announce a transition to the next activity. You could flip the lights off and on, use a train whistle, have a puppet rustling inside a bag, or sing cleanup songs. Keep it simple, consistent, and fun.

(Repeat from the beginning.)

Say: Today we're going to learn that ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US. God's good plans give us joy. Joy means we're happy! Let's sing a song to show God how happy we are.

Sing "Rejoice in the Lord Always" (Philippians 4:4) (track 29 on the CD). As you sing, have children jump up with arms in the air for each "rejoice."

Say: I'm so happy that ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US! Because God makes good plans for our lives, we can trust his plans. Let's learn about trusting God with our whole hearts.



We Can Trust

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Proverbs 3:5, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Proverbs 3:5, says, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart." The word *Lord* is another name for God. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in saying the Key Verse with you: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

Ask:

What do you think it means to trust God with all your heart?

Say: When we trust God, it means we know God is always with us, always hears us, and always loves us.

Ask:

- Who are other people in your life you can trust?
- What are things your parents do to take care of you and give you the things you need? Help children think of things their parents do to take care of them, such as buying groceries, getting them ready for school, or teaching them to how to do things on their own.

Say: You can trust the adults in your family to make good plans to take care of you and always want the best for you. That's a lot like the way God makes good plans for you.

Say: We know that we can always trust God with all our heart and that God always makes good plans for us. Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead children in saying the Key Verse with you: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart" (Proverbs 3:5).

What You'll Do

Say: Friends, it's time for Theo's News!

Have the children sit in a circle. Then begin "Here, Theo" (track 5 on the CD). When the CD segment ends, bring out the Surprise Box, and put Theophilus the FaithRetriever puppet on your hand. Then follow along with the script.

Theo: Hi, everybody!

Teacher: Hello, Theo! Tell us what interesting news you've dug up about the Bible today.

Theo: I hid it in the Surprise Box.

Teacher: Let's look inside to see what Theo dug up for us today.

(Invite a child to open the Surprise Box, and have the kids pass the star around the circle so everyone can see it up close. Give kids time to guess what they'll learn from the Bible today.)

Teacher: Friends, how many stars do you think there are in the sky?

(Pause for kids to answer your question.)

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this star in the Surprise Box?

Teacher: I do, too, Theo! That reminds me of when God used the stars to describe a

very special promise to Abram.

Teacher: Yes, he did—because God had good plans for Abram, and ▶ GOD HAS

GOOD PLANS FOR US. Friends, let's find out what happened!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.

Bible Time: God's Covenant

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 15, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US. Let's hear about God's good plans for Abram. Abram himself will tell us about those plans.

Start out with the children sitting in a circle, and play "Abram's Adventures" (track 24 on the CD). The CD will tell you when to pause for discussion and when to have the kids lie on the floor and look at the ceiling (no need to pause the CD for this part). At that time, turn off the lights, turn on your Star Maker, and shine it so that stars appear on the ceiling. At the end of the track, turn on the lights.

Say: What an awesome promise God made to Abram! Abram was worried he wouldn't ever have any children, and God promised Abram he'd have so many children he wouldn't be able to count them—just like he couldn't count all the stars in the sky. Let's learn a song to help us remember God's promise to Abram.

Lead children in singing and doing the motions for "The Song of Abram" (#2) (track 25 on the CD) to the tune of "Jack and Jill."

God appeared to Abram, (raise hands in air)
And he said, "You'll have a son!" (pretend to rock a baby)
Abram was so happy that (smile big)
God had good plans for him! (hug self)
(Repeat.)

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the promise God made to Abram?
- What do you like or not like about waiting for something you really want?
- What can you do to wait and not complain?

Say: Abram learned that God had good plans to give him a son, many grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and some beautiful land. God had good plans for Abram, and ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US, too, and we can thank God for his good plans—even if we sometimes have to wait for them.

CENTER 1:

Starry Night

What You'll Do

Help kids write their names on their My Bible Playground pages. Tell children to use the crayons to trace around the edges of the stars. Let kids fill in the stars with glitter glue to make the stars sparkle.

Say: Abram looked at the night sky and talked to God about his hopes for the future. Abram wanted more than anything to have children. When Abram talked to God about his future, God told him the wonderful plans he had for his life.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you hope to be when you grow up?
- What can you do to talk to God about your hopes for your future?

Say: There are many, many stars in the sky, and God said that Abram would have many, many children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. God had good plans for Abram, and ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US, too.

CENTER 2:

So Many Stars

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Explain how to use the cookie cutters to cut out a star shape in the bread. Then have kids spread honey on the bread to make their stars shine.



As kids work, say: Tell about the plans you make when you get up in the morning for your day or things you like to do every day. Do you plan to eat breakfast? to play with friends or brothers and sisters? to go visit a friend?



Allow children to share.

Say: Abram made plans, too, and he talked to God about his plans. God told Abram the wonderful plans he had for his life—to have as many children as there were stars in the night sky! God has a wonderful plan for every one of you, too.

Pray: God, thank you for making good plans for our lives. Please help us remember to talk to you about the good plans you have for us. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

As children eat, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about how Abram talked to God?
- What can you do to talk to God about his plans for you this week?

Say: Just as God had good plans for Abram, the Bible tells us that ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US, too! We can thank God for his good plans for us.

CENTER 3:

Abram's Journey Game

What You'll Do

Gather children around a table with the "Abram's Journey" game ready to play. Have kids form no more than six teams, and assign each a different game piece. Have children play the game by taking turns rolling the color block and moving their game pieces to the next space that has the color rolled. They can roll again if they land on a space with an altar (the pile of rocks). As kids play, tell them how God had a plan even when Abram was making his way to a new land.

Say: Before Abram got to his new home where God told Abram he'd have so many kids they'd be like the stars in the sky, Abram had a long journey. God asked Abram to move his family and all his things to a new land. Abram obeyed God and followed God because he knew God's plans were good.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was hard about this game?
- What's hard about doing something new?

Center 4: Star Maker Easy Prep

Cut 1 constructionpaper circle (about 5 inches in diameter) per child. Say: When we do new things or go to places we've never been to before, it can be scary because we don't know for sure what'll happen. It's hard to make a plan for something we've never done before. But ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US every day, even when we're unsure.

CENTER 4:

Star Maker

What You'll Do

Say: Find a partner and help each other cover the end of a cardboard tube with a paper circle. Then rubber-band the papers in place. Allow time, helping as necessary so the papers are taut and held securely in place with the rubber bands. Then say: Use sharp pencils to carefully poke holes in the papers. Allow time. Now you can take turns shining a flashlight into the open end of the tube so the light shines through the holes. If possible, dim the lights so it's easier to see the "stars" shine.







After kids enjoy the star show, say: We made our own little night skies! God showed Abram the night sky to explain how many children Abram would have. God had wonderful plans for Abram.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was so amazing about the plan God had for Abram?
- What can you do this week to thank God for his good plans for you?

Say: When we look up at the night sky and see the stars, we can remember God's good plans for Abram and that ▶ GOD HAS GOOD PLANS FOR US!

Abraham Has Three Visitors

Genesis 18:1-19:29



A note about this lesson: You might be surprised that you've been asked to teach this Bible passage to children this age. For this age level, we cover only Genesis 18:1-15, the passage where the three visitors tell Abraham and Sarah that their long wait would soon be over—God's promise to them of a son would be fulfilled within the year.

Abraham: Father of Many

God changed Abram's name, which means "exalted father," to Abraham, "father of many." Abraham and all the males of his household then went through the covenant of circumcision. God also renamed Sarai. Her new name, Sarah, likely stressed that she was to be the mother of nations and kings.

Abraham Shows Hospitality

In Abraham's desert-dwelling culture, visitors were rare. A warm welcome and hospitality were requirements in the culture of that day, and Abraham knew what it was like to travel in the desert. Thus, he was ready to warmly welcome the travelers.

Many scholars believe that these travelers were angels (see Genesis 19:1). The fact that they knew Sarah's name may support this, and in Genesis 18:10, it is clear that at least one of them was speaking for God.

For many years, God had been promising Abraham a son. Now God predicted the time of the birth to 99-year-old Abraham and 89-year-old Sarah: Within one year, their son would be born. Sarah's laughter is understandable. Who would have thought that a 90-year-old woman could have a baby! God does truly amazing things!

Abraham Pleads With God

When God made it clear that his intent was to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah, Abraham was horrified.

He'd likely done business with people there, and his nephew, Lot, lived there with his family. So Abraham pleaded with God to spare the few who were still faithful. God said the whole city would be saved if only 50 righteous people lived there. It's helpful to remember here God's definition of *righteous*. Abraham was declared righteous because of his faith, not because of a righteous lifestyle. As Abraham voiced his pleas ever more carefully, God promised to spare the city if just 10 righteous people were living there. But not even so small a number of faithful people could be found.

God did an amazing thing in sparing the lives of Lot and his family. Lot didn't appear to deserve it, just as we don't deserve the grace God gives to us. But we can be thankful that God is wonderfully merciful and still does amazing things for us.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus is God's most amazing miracle. He gave us eternal life when we were dead in sin. You can thank God for his precious Son and his greatest miracle.

Look for miracles all around you, not just in big, dramatic situations but also in "smaller" things: the beauty of the sunrise, the happy gleam in a baby's eyes, couples addressing their problems with forgiveness and love. Ask God to help individuals in your ministry to do the same. You can write your prayer here.

Can You Hear Me?

What You'll Do

Have sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Luke 11:9, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Luke 11:9, says, "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." That means that we can ask and God will hear us. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse after you: Ask and God will hear you (Luke 11:9).

Say: Our Bible verse tells us that if we ask, God will hear us. That's so amazing! God can hear us no matter where we are, what we're doing, or even how loud we're talking! Just to give us an idea of how amazing that is, we're going to practice trying to hear each other.


Have children form pairs and then form two lines with partners facing each other. Choose one line to go first in the game.

Say: On the count of three, tell your partner what you had for breakfast. Then everyone on this side (motion toward the other line) will repeat what they heard. Count to three. How many of you could hear what your partner said? Allow responses.

Let's try again. This time, everyone take a big step away from each other. We'll start with the other line this time. On the count of three, tell your partner your favorite color. After you count to three and as children are talking, make as much noise as you can with your voice and noisy items. Could you hear what your partner said this time? Allow responses. Then repeat the pattern two more times with partners moving farther apart each time. Make noise as kids try to talk, and ask, "What are you doing after church today?" and "What's your last name?"

Can You Hear Me? Supplies

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Was it easier to hear each other when you were closer or when you were farther away? Why?

Say:

GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS! One amazing thing God can do is hear us all the time. God can hear us no matter where we are! God can also hear us no matter what we say, how quietly we say it, or how much noise is all around us. In fact, God can hear us even when we say things silently in our heads. Isn't that amazing? God wants you to talk to him. Let's say our Key Verse together one more time. Lead children in saying the simplified Key Verse with you: Ask and God will hear you (Luke 11:9).

Bible Time: Abraham's Visitors

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 18, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that ▶ GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS. A man named Abram and his wife, Sarai, had been on a long journey to the new home God had for them. God told them they'd have many children. Then God changed Abram's name to Abraham and Sarai's name to Sarah. Abraham and Sarah continued to believe God's promise that they'd have lots of children. Let's find out what amazing things happened to Abraham and Sarah.

Let's pretend that we're with Abraham in his tent. Lead the children into the tent, and have them get comfortable. Suddenly Abraham saw something outside his tent. Peek your head out and look around. Three special visitors appeared to Abraham. Have you ever had special guests visit your house? When? Allow responses.

Let's hurry and get out of the tent so we can say hello to our visitors! Help the children come out of the tent saying, "Hello, hello!" Instruct three kids to bring three chairs, and then have everyone sit around the chairs. Abraham was so excited! He told the visitors that they could rest, have their feet washed, and eat some yummy food. So the guests stayed, ate a lovely meal, and rested. Then one of the visitors told Abraham that Sarah would have a son the next year. Sarah was inside the tent listening. Have the kids cup their hands behind their ears and lean forward as if they're listening. Sarah laughed when she heard this because she thought she was too old to have a baby—she was older than your grandma. Sarah was very old. And so she laughed. Lead the children in different styles of laughing, such as giggling, soft snickering, and loud belly laughs. Sarah laughed because she thought it was impossible for her to have a baby. But remember,

GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS! Have the kids repeat the Bible Point.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about Abraham and Sarah's special visitors?
- Why would it be amazing to get a message from God?
- What's an amazing thing that's happened for your family—something that made you really happy?
- What did you like most about that amazing thing?

Have children clean their hands. Say: We're learning that ▶ GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS. There are amazing things God's made or done all around us every day. For example, did you know that apples are amazing things God makes? What are some things made from apples? Help kids think of and share food products made from apples.

So many things can be made with this small fruit! That's amazing! But it gets even more amazing when you look at where apples come from. Slice an apple and pull a few seeds out for the kids to look at and touch. Apples and the trees they grow on come from these tiny seeds. God's done many amazing things in our world, and just one of them is the way God made trees and plants to grow from tiny seeds.

Slice the rest of the apples, and serve the slices on napkins to children.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion as they enjoy their snack.

Ask:

- What can an apple show us about what God is like?
- What are other amazing things you've seen that God has made or done?

Say: God did amazing things in the Bible during Abraham and Sarah's time, and he does amazing things in the world today! God gave Abraham and Sarah a baby when they were very old. God did amazing things for Abraham's family, and

GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS for you and me.

CENTER 3:

Surprise Party

What You'll Do

Set out items such as crepe paper streamers, party favors, party hats, and confetti. Let children pretend they're preparing for a surprise party.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- Why do people plan surprise parties for others?
- What makes surprises amazing?
- What do you like about the way God surprises us with the amazing things he does?

Say: When God does amazing things, we can be happy about what he's done. Sarah was so happy to hear God's promise of a son, even when that seemed impossible. Sarah believed God would do something amazing because nothing is impossible with God.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about God's promise to give Sarah a son even when it seemed impossible?
- What are things that seem impossible to you?
- What would you like to ask God about those impossible things?

Say: Abraham and Sarah knew that when God promised them a son, God would keep his promise. That's because they knew that ▶ GOD DOES AMAZING THINGS. The next time you feel like something's impossible, don't give up right away. Ask God for help to make the impossible, possible.





Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to the circle area on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage the children to share what they remember about what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that FGOD DOES AMAZING THINGS. I'd like each of you to choose a way to watch for the amazing things God does and thank him this week.

Read these three ideas for kids to choose from:

- Have your mom or dad take you to a park. Point out all the amazing things that God made in the park.
- Have your mom or dad help you go on the Internet and look up something amazing that God has made, such as the Grand Canyon or the Great Barrier Reef.
- Ask your family members to each share something amazing they've seen this week and thank God for doing amazing things.

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as theirs!



Isaac Is Born

Genesis 21:1-6



God Promises a Child to Abraham and Sarah

God keeps his promises. In the first two verses of this passage, three times we read that God did what he said he would do. For Abraham and Sarah, it was the miraculous fulfillment of an amazing promise: the birth of a son to 90- and 100-year-old parents who had never before been able to have a child! And it was really their child—the son of both Abraham and Sarah—as confirmed in Genesis 21:2-3. The shame of childlessness that had haunted them for decades was finally erased. God brought a kind of joy to Abraham and Sarah that they had never known.

Isaac Means "He Laughs"

Isaac, the name Abraham gave his son, means "he laughs." God had told Abraham to give the child that name a year or more earlier (Genesis 17:19).

The circumcision of Isaac when he was eight days old wasn't done just in obedience to God's command. It was a sign of the covenant between God and Abraham, a sign that this child was one of God's chosen people (Genesis 17:10-14).

Genesis 21:6 contains a play on words that's pretty obvious even in English. Through the child named "he laughs," God had brought laughter to Sarah and to all who knew her. In those days, any birth of a healthy child brought great joy, even more so if it was a boy. But a firstborn son, born to such elderly parents, was certainly a laughing matter! Sarah could hardly contain her happiness. Who could blame her?

Twenty-five years had passed since Abraham had left his home in Haran to follow God and since God first promised to make Abraham's descendants into a great nation. Twenty-five years had passed since a childless couple of 65 and 75 years of age first believed God's promise that they would have

descendants. What a fantastic mountaintop in Abraham and Sarah's faith journey! "He laughs" was born!

The Jesus Connection

Jesus' mission was serious, but he knew how to have joy, too. He never doubted God's gifts. As God's Son, he would know best!

Recall some gifts God has given you. How did they bring joy? Perhaps they were answers to prayers or things you never even asked for. Write down those gifts and a prayer of joy. You can write your prayer here.

Have the children repeat the sound and spread the joyful noise (like a wave) as fast as they can around the circle, making sure that everyone can join in. Let several other children think of happy noises that they can send around the circle.

Teacher: Theo, why did you hide this toy in the Surprise Box?

Theo: Because babies play with it.

Teacher: That's right, Theo, babies do play with toys like this. But why did you bring a

baby toy today?

Theo: I heard something very special happened with a baby in the Bible.

Teacher: That's right, Theo. ▶ GOD MAKES US HAPPY, and this week we'll find out

how God made Abraham and Sarah very happy!

Theo: Have fun, boys and girls!

Teacher: Friends, say goodbye to Theo.

Encourage the children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.



Bible Time: Isaac Is Born

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 21, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that FODD MAKES US HAPPY. God had told Abraham and Sarah that they'd have a baby. But they were older than most of your grandparents or great-grandparents! They were very old. Lay the poster of Sarah on the floor so kids can see it.

Ask:

Tell about someone you know who's very old.

Say: People usually don't have babies when they're very old! But God did something amazing for Abraham and Sarah. And God does amazing things for us when

• GOD MAKES US HAPPY. God gave Abraham and Sarah a baby boy. Bring out the
"Baby Isaac" picture. Abraham and Sarah were very happy!

Ask:

- Tell about any families you know who've just had a baby.
- What do parents do to care for new babies?

Invite a child to help you fold in the three corners of the picture of baby Isaac so it looks like he's being wrapped in a blanket.

Say: Happy parents might wrap their baby in a blanket to make sure the baby is warm. Invite another child to stick a baby-pin sticker on the picture to secure the "blanket." Abraham and Sarah loved their new baby and happily cared for him. Pass the Isaac picture carefully around the circle, like a real baby. God made Abraham and Sarah very happy. Lay the wrapped baby Isaac in Sarah's arms on the poster.

Sarah said that God made her happy, and everyone who heard about her happiness at having a baby would laugh with her. Abraham and Sarah named the baby *Isaac*, which means "he laughs."

Ask:

- Why do you think Sarah was so happy?
- When have you been very happy?
- What do you do when you're happy?

Say: When people are really happy or filled with joy, they might laugh, just as Sarah laughed when God finally gave her a baby boy. Pick up the baby picture, and have the children pass it around the circle again. The first child who holds the picture will say "Ha," the next child will say "Ha-ha," the third one will say "Ha-ha-ha," and so on. The kids will be laughing before the picture gets around the circle!

- What do you think about the amazing thing God did?
- What can you do to thank God the next time you're laughing and happy?

CENTER 2:

What You'll Do

Have children clean their hands. Then say: A baby is smaller than a grown-up, but sometimes a baby looks a lot like someone else. Many families spend a lot of time guessing what their new baby will look like. They wonder what color hair and eyes the baby will have. They wonder what the baby's nose will look like. They wonder if the baby will look like them or someone else they know.

Show children the food items and talk about how the miniature items look just like the big items, only smaller. Say: Take a few of each item in the bowls. As you eat, match the regular and mini items to each other or sort out all the regular size items into one pile and all the minis into another pile. Before we enjoy our snack, let's pray.

Pray: God, thank you for making us happy. Thank you for our snack. In Jesus' name, amen.

Talk With Kids

As children eat, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- Talk about a person people say you look like—maybe your mom or dad.
- Why do you think you look so much like that person?

Say: It's fun to guess what babies will look like. God makes each of us special, and God gives us families and people around us to love us and who can make us happy. God gave Abraham and Sarah a family the day that Isaac was born, and they were happy.

CENTER 3:

Isaac's Shower

What You'll Do

Say: Often when a baby is born, people have a party to "shower" the baby's parents with gifts. Let's pretend that we're at a baby shower for baby Isaac! I'll ask one of you to close your eyes and pull something out of the box. Then you can feel the item and guess what it is. When you guess correctly, the other children will all shout:

GOD MAKES US HAPPY!

Say: ► GOD MAKES US HAPPY. God gave Abraham and Sarah a baby boy named Isaac. God gives us our families to love us and that makes us happy, too.

What You'll Do

Say: Fig. 60D MAKES US HAPPY. Just like Abraham and Sarah were happy the day Isaac was born, your parents were very happy when you were born. At the hospital, the nurses made prints of your feet. Sometimes people make handprints of their babies, too. Today we're going to make your handprints for your parents.

Help children dip their hands into the finger paint and then make handprints on the handout pages. Use wet wipes to wash children's hands. Set aside the pictures to dry.

Say: The words at the top of the page say "Thank you for being my parents!" Give your picture to your mom or dad to say thank you for taking such good care of you.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What things besides your handprints were you born with that make you special?
- What do you do now to celebrate your birthday and make it a happy day each year?

Say: The day Isaac was born was a happy day for Abraham and Sarah. The day you were born was a happy day for your parents. This month we celebrate Thanksgiving, so you can give your handprint picture to your parents on Thanksgiving and tell them you're so thankful that God chose them to be your



parents. You can also say you're thankful for all the reasons your family is happy! Then, together, you can thank God because ▶ GOD MAKES US HAPPY.

ive- and six-year-olds are beginning to catch on to the power found in manners. "Please" becomes the key word that seems to deliver most of a child's desires. 

God Cares for Hagar and Ishmael

Genesis 21:8-21



Ishmael Mocks Isaac

It was typical in Abraham's culture to have a celebration when a child was weaned, which was usually when the child was around 2 or 3 years of age. The celebration for Isaac was probably even bigger than most because he was something of a miracle child.

Unfortunately the joyous occasion soon turned bitter. We don't know if Ishmael's mocking of Isaac happened on the day of the celebration, but it must have occurred soon afterward. Ishmael had been born to Abraham through Hagar, Sarah's maidservant, after Sarah had decided to take things into her own hands and had Abraham sleep with Hagar to "build a family" (Genesis 16:2). By the time Isaac was 2, Ishmael was about 16 (Genesis 16:16; 21:5).

Sarah and Hagar had been at odds ever since Hagar was pregnant with Ishmael (Genesis 16:4-10). Abraham's decision to send Hagar and Ishmael away had probably been a long time in coming.

Abraham Casts Out Hagar and Ishmael

Abraham didn't want to send Hagar and Ishmael away. He knew it was wrong according to his culture and according to anyone's standards of fatherhood. When God told Abraham to do what Sarah wanted, God didn't say it was right. But God did promise to take care of Ishmael, eventually making a great nation of his descendants as well as Isaac's.

The area where Abraham lived was desert, and the skin of water and the food Abraham gave them was probably as much as they could comfortably carry, but it wouldn't have lasted very long.

God Responds to Hagar and Ishmael's Suffering

Remember that Ishmael was at least 16 by this time. If Hagar had to put him under a bush, he must have been terribly weakened by fluid deprivation. He likely wasn't far from death, as Hagar estimated (Genesis 21:16).

It seems odd that God responded to Ishmael's cry but sent an angel to speak to Hagar. It may be that Ishmael was simply too weak to even get water for himself. It also is likely that the well had been there all the time but Hagar didn't see it until God "opened her eyes"—God was actually there taking care of them and providing the water they needed, but they couldn't see it until they acknowledged their need for God.



God Listens

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a circle. Open your Bible to Luke 11:9, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Our Key Verse from the Bible, Luke 11:9, says, "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." That means that we can ask and God will hear us. Let's say our Key Verse together. Lead the children in repeating the simplified Key Verse after you: Ask and God will hear you (Luke 11:9).

Say: Now let's have some fun discovering what it's like when God hears us.

Have children form two groups. Have one group be the Talkers and one group the Listeners.

Say: One at a time the Talkers will whisper through the door something they'd like to say to God, and then they will knock on the door. Have an adult volunteer take the Talkers outside your room and tell the children to form a line.

Stay with the Listeners on the other side of the door, and have them also form a line. Have the first child in line put his or her ear to the door and listen to the child on the other side. Say: When you hear the knock at the door, you can open the door. Each time the door is opened, have the Talker repeat what he or she whispered through the door, but loudly this time so everyone can hear. Lead the Listeners in shouting, "Knock and the door will be opened to you!" If time allows, let each child have a turn to talk and listen.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What did you like or not like about trying to hear a whisper through a door?
- What do you like about the way God can hear you, no matter what?

Encourage children to wave or say goodbye to Theo. Then put Theo away in a safe place for next week's use.



Bible Time: Hagar and Ishmael

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Genesis 21, and show children the words. Tell kids the Bible is God's special book.

Say: Today the Bible tells us that GOD HEARS US WHEN WE PRAY. One day, a man named Abraham decided to have a big party for his son Isaac. Let's pretend that we're at Isaac's party as we listen to the CD. First, think about some things you'd like to say to God. You'll get a chance to say them as we listen to the CD. Help kids decide what they'd like to say. Every time you hear "God loves to hear us talk to him" and the music on the CD, I'll call on a few of you to share what you want to talk to God about.

Play "God Cares for Hagar and Ishmael" (track 28 on the CD). Pause the CD each time you hear music, and call on children to tell what they'd like to say to God. Stop the CD at the end of the track.

Ask:

- What's amazing about the way God heard Hagar and Ishmael's cries?
- What's amazing about the way God could hear each of you when you talked?

Set out the "God Provides" poster, and say: Everyone take a marker and draw one of the things you said during the song. Allow time. Now everyone point to what you drew on the poster while we pray about our drawings. Take a minute to pray with each child for what he or she drew on the poster. Close the prayer with "In Jesus' name, amen." Then say: God heard our prayers just now!

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What made Hagar and Ishmael's prayers different from ours?
- Why do you think prayers don't always have to be said out loud with words?
- What do you think about what God did to answer Hagar and Ishmael's prayers?

Say: Just as God heard Abraham, Hagar, and Ishmael, ► GOD HEARS US WHEN WE PRAY. God is always listening to us, no matter where we are or what we're doing. God loves to hear us and answer our prayers.

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eat. Help the partner make a special snack for the child with the carrot sticks and crackers and deliver it to his or her friend. Turn back to the first child. **Now you may ask for something to drink.** Let the partner use the ladle to get a drink in a cup, and then bring it back to the child. Have kids switch roles until everyone has a snack.



Say: God hears you when you ask for things in prayer. God hears you when you pray just as clearly as you heard your partner ask for a snack. It doesn't matter where we are, what we're doing, or how busy it is around us — ▶ GOD HEARS US WHEN WE PRAY.

Talk With Kids

As children eat, lead them in this discussion.

Ask:

- What do you think about the way God can always hear us when we talk to him?
- What are some questions you would like to ask God?

Say: It was fun to practice asking and receiving at snack time! Let's always remember that we can ask God about anything, and that ▶ GOD HEARS US WHEN WE PRAY.

CENTER 3:

Say What?

What You'll Do

Have children sit in a large circle facing outward. Instruct children to close their eyes as you stand in the middle of the circle.

Say: I'll walk around the inside of the circle and tap someone gently on the top of the head. When I tap you, you can say a prayer to God. Then everyone else will try to guess who spoke. Raise your hands when you have a guess. Whoever guesses correctly can take a turn in the middle of the circle and choose someone new to say a prayer.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What was hard about trying to guess your friends' voices? What was easy?
- What are some differences in our voices?

What You'll Do

Say: We can pray for ourselves and we can also pray for others. God hears all of our prayers, no matter what they're about. Use the markers and stickers to make a picture of a prayer you'd like to tell God about someone you know—maybe a prayer for one of your family members or friends.

Allow kids time to create their prayer pictures, and then say: **Turn to a partner and tell about the prayer you drew.** Allow kids to share.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

- What's good about praying for someone else?
- What do you like or not like about drawing a picture as a way to pray?
- What's your favorite way to pray?

Say: God hears our prayers no matter how we pray or what our prayers are about. God heard Ishmael's prayers through his crying, and Hagar's cries for Ishmael. ▶ GOD HEARS US WHEN WE PRAY whether we say our prayers for ourselves or for others, and whether we use words or say our prayers in other ways.

What You'll Do

After the children have cleaned up the centers, bring everyone back to the circle area on the floor. Review the lesson activities and the Bible Point, and then encourage the children to share what they remember about what they learned from the Bible today.

Also use this time to challenge kids in their faith. Encourage them to choose a Daily Challenge for applying today's lesson to their lives this week. Use this challenge for encouraging your children's growing relationships with Jesus.

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Talk With Kids

Say: Today we learned that ▶ GOD HEARS US WHEN WE PRAY. I'd like each of you to choose a way to talk to God this week.

Read these three ideas for children to choose from:

- Ask your mom or dad to help you record your voice as you pray. Play the recording back and listen—God heard your prayer, just like you hear it on the recording!
- Whisper a prayer really quietly, and then shout a prayer really loudly!
 Remember that God hears you no matter how quiet or how loud you are.
- Draw a prayer you have for a family member, and then give him or her your picture. Then tell your family member you're praying for him or her.

Have kids each whisper in your ear or tell you which idea they've chosen, and then circle it on each child's My Bible Playground page. Make sure you choose a challenge as well and tell kids which challenge you chose. Your commitment will inspire children and will give them an opportunity to see God at work in your life as well as theirs!

"Thanks for Listening" Prayer

What You'll Do

Say: Bow your heads and think of something or someone to pray for. God will hear your prayers, even if you choose to not say them out loud. Invite each child to complete the sentence in the following prayer.

Pray: Dear God, we're so thankful that you hear us when we pray. Thank you for being so good to us and answering our prayers. I pray for...Invite those who would like to share to say the things or people they want to pray for. Help us remember to talk to you every day. We love you, God! In Jesus' name, amen.

Weaving Faith at Home

Have children take home their My Bible Playground pages whether they worked on them or not. Have the children tell their parents the challenge they committed to in the "Daily Challenges" activity. Encourage the parents to help their kids fulfill this commitment during the week. By working together and focusing on the same goals, you and parents can help children weave faith into their lives!
