

"When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew, casting a net into the sea; they were fishermen. He said to them, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." At once they left their nets and followed him. He walked along from there and saw two other brothers, James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John. They were in a boat, with their father Zebedee, mending their nets. He called them, and immediately they left their boat and their father and followed him. He went around all of Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people."

"Liturgy The Liturgy is done with things that are the exact opposite of spiritual abstractions: bread, wine, oil, water, fragrances, fire, ashes, rock, fabrics, colors, body, words, sounds, silences, gestures, space, movement, action, order, time, light. The whole of creation is a manifestation of the love of God, and from when that same love was manifested in its fullness in the cross of Jesus, all of creation was drawn toward it. It is the whole of creation that is assumed in order to be placed at the service of encounter with the Word: incarnate, crucified, dead, risen, ascended to the Father. It is as the prayer over the water at the baptismal font sings, but also the prayer over the oil for sacred chrism and the words for the presentation of the bread and wine ---all fruit of the earth and work of human hands.

Pastor's Study Desk Notes



3rd Sunday Ordinary Year A

Mattt 4:12-17

"My big fish must be somewhere" This is what Santiago (the Old Man) says in Ernest Hemingway's Old Man and the Sea novel. He kept his fishing gear/nets cleaned and his boat 'sea-ready' all the time, so that when that most special fish came along, he would be ready for the 'big catch'. Today's gospel shows Peter, Andrew, James & John servicing their boats and cleaning their fishing gear, too. And that is when the 'Big One'- Jesus- came alongside them and struck their lines. Jesus is often symbolized by the image of a fish () because the Greek word for fish--Ichthys--was an acrostic for the short creed, "Jesus, Son of God, Savior" Iesoûs-Khristós-Theoû -Yiós-Sōtḗr). So, while we see Jesus call & catch His first four apostles in today's gospel reading, we could ask, "Who catches who?" I'd say that the Big Catch here, is that the apostles score the greater haul. Being attached to Jesus, is the catch of a lifetime (or the catch of a LIFE in Him). And it is just beginning when the apostles catch on to Jesus, because Jesus tells them that His work in them will 'net' even more souls. They who were once 'fishermen' will now be 'fishing for men'. They are embarking on a fishing expedition to bring in as many people as possible into relationship with Christ. The rest of the gospel will unfold that story. We are systematically reading the gospel of Matthew in this calendar year, so I will stay focused on Matthew. But if we reviewed John's gospel we'd see that where Matthew begins his gospel showing what the apostles loved doing, John ends his gospel with the apostles doing again what they love, fishing (John 21:3-14). I think this shows that fishing was so much a part of their life all through their work and ministry with Jesus. We will see so many times throughout the gospel, Jesus and the apostles by the seashores, on the lakes in boats and distributing fish food or telling parables about nets & markets. I point this out because while we see James, John Andrew and Peter walk away from their fishing equipment, they keep in touch and carry with them their knowledge, experience and 'net'work connections from the fishing trade. How else do they just happen to have boats ready to carry Jesus to the far shore of the lake, or to use as a floating platform when he teaches the crowds? I think that helps us see that even what we give up for Jesus, He may utilize in us again later to accomplish His will and mission.

These 'Call' stories of Jesus' first four apostles coming on 'board' with him (that is a big catch - as he is securing 1/3 of his total number in this one occasion), remind me of the desire within all of us to change for the better, and to always work on our improvement. As we begin a new calendar year, many people speak about 'resolutions' they want to keep for self-improvement. Such actions are commendable. We want to encourage anyone who wishes to better themselves (become a better person) and for us to be the first to acknowledge that we all need to work on ourselves, too. In our Catholic tradition, we have the season of Lent (which I don't want to rush time but Ash Wednesday is February 22, right around the corner this year!) which is a time of focus upon conversion and change that we may be more faithful to Christ. But also, we have the wonderful sacrament of Reconciliation available all the time. It invites us to examine our lives closely, to confess our faults and by God's grace make 'firm amendment' to avoid sin and whatever leads us to sin. Even if we cannot physically make it to confession on a regular basis (monthly or bimonthly), then we can commit to conducting a thorough personal 'examination of conscience' regularly (once a week). Some people perform an examination of their heart daily as a personal review of what went well that day in our actions/thoughts, and what didn't go well with us and other people- what we regret and wish to do over, or have God to forgive and heal for us. It is a great spiritual practice or exercise to keep our souls fit and functioning to serve and glorify God. Some people think of our soul's examination of conscience like a type of 'performance review', 'lab work' or 'check-up' of our personal conduct. It is something to think about and try instituting into our weekly routine, as we begin a new year! Peace, Fr Brian
