Now David (Ozzie) Osborn has in recent years taken on a large part of the maintenance of the cemetery grounds and the construction and repair of the headstones.

Ozzie further spearheaded the project last summer to expand our useable grounds for the final resting place of veterans and members of our American Legion Family. Ozzie, along with the many volunteers, spent their time and talent to move this project forward. We're awaiting the grounds to "settle" now that the major excavations of vegetation has been accomplished and look forward to next year to level and hauling in good topsoil and seeding for the cleared areas.

It goes without saying but worthy of it. We appreciate all that our membership is doing to support our post during this

time. We are so grateful for the help our members have provided with the changing operations due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Whether it's helping out in the kitchen for free community meals or



WOW, what a great July 2020! I know that while most everyone has been focused on just getting through the summer with COVID, it seems the ALR has found much to be excited about here in the Seward and the American Legion Department of Alaska. When I reviewed the article I wrote for the newsletter in early July the ALR had a lot of plans but there seemed to be a lack of excitement, but for me the 4<sup>th</sup> of July changed all that.

As I am sure many of us regret the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade in Seward has was canceled but the Rides of American Legion Post 5 had determined among ourselves to mount up The Flag on as many Bikes as possible and spend an hour or so displaying those Flags riding around town. As it happened many ALR members from Jack Henry Post 1 (Anchorage), Post 16 (Homer) and Susitna Valley Post 35 (Wasilla) had begun planning and were making a trip for weekend camping and assembling in Hope. I met with Mike and Don from 16 in Copper Landing and we rode to meet the rest of the bikes as they arrived in Hope.



There I was able to discuss our plans to show Our Flag and invite them to come down and participate if they choose. I cannot tell you how proud I was of the ALRA as the 9 Bikes of Chapter 5 gathered (Which was ALR members Bobby D., Debbie D., Mike M., Larry G., Dave S., Terry M., Bill P. and non ALR members Chris, Sean and Eli) to see 11 more bikes from the other Chapters ride in from Hope to take part. I found it especially humbling that Mike showed up to take part despite the family tragedy he was experiencing. The response given to us by those in Seward who saw our display was uplifting to say the least. People were parking their cars getting out and taking pictures, clapping and cheering us on. To say we were invigorated and excited at the end of our slow spin of a couple circuits around Seward would be an understatement@! After the ride we all rode to visit Don and Marilyn, I think that chance of seeing Don was a motivating factor in having so many riders showing up. We rode up to Don and Marilyn's to find Don in typical fashion sitting astride his bike ready to ride. So the ALR made another trip around town, with Don everyone grinning and amazed at Don still in the saddle at 83! The ALR also owes Mike Calhoon & Post 5 a big thank you for the impromptu supplying the means to feed all the Riders who showed up. Despite the shadow that hung over our 4th of July it was a sunny day and the ALR had a great time seeing the patriotic spirt that exist in Seward and celebrating our Country's birth.





Now you would think that it would be really hard to top a day like that but just a couple weeks later we had the ALR Alaska ROMP which kicked of really with several rides from areas around Alaska gathering at Jack Henry Post 1 on the 16th of July. The ROMP started out fairly routinely on the morning of the 17 July, but after we rode in a couple small groups to Sterling AK. Where we were to take part in the celebration and activities for the Salute to Veterans that is taking place at the South Peninsula ABATE Rally the following day. We were amazed at the location for the Rally as it was being held at the private estate of Don Johnson and his family of Sterling. After arriving in Sterling most of the ALR that rode down paid a visit to Post 20 where Alvin Diaz and his crew did a awesome job feeding us steaks, despite being more than a little overwhelmed by the number of Legion Riders that descended on them.

This was my first visit to the South Peninsula ABATE Rally and even with their limiting the participation with COVID there was better than 40 bikes in attendance. That Saturday morning, coffee & hot biscuits and gravy were ready early and the hospitality was on par and perhaps rivaled many of our own American Legion Post. Better yet for the ALRA we had found in the people of South Peninsula ABATE that they were not only a group comprised of many Veterans and family members but displayed the same reverence for Our Countries Flag that we did. The first official function of the South Peninsula ABATE Salute to Veterans was a changing of The Colors. It was explained that traditionally the Johnson family display an American Flag accompanied by the Alaska State Flag and the POW/MIA Flag and they are replaced once a year during the Salute to Vets Celebration. Many of us formed up to attend or take part in the ceremony and while it was appropriate many of the Legion Family discussed that we could probably improve on the Flag Replacement ceremony. We knew that later after the many other activities planned the South Peninsula ABATE would be holding a flag retirement ceremony which they also asked up to participate in. So we began planning to perform a American Legion Flag Retirement ceremony .



But before that happened we assembled as a group and rode to the location of the Alaska Roadhouse. 43 motorcycles, the 25 Bikes of the ALRA (yea we showed up in force<sup>©</sup>) followed the 18 riders with ABATE on a memorial ride in memory of Don Johnson's brother who was owner of the Alaska Roadhouse.

As we rolled out from we were onto the Sterling Hi-way, you could since that something interesting was happening. The group road mostly parade style to Soldotna where I was astounded to experience the whole group all 43 bikes rode through Soldotna with no one getting left due to changing stoplights we caught the lights as a group and stop at one light as a complete single group. For those who are wondering 43 bikes riding together we took up about enough road that we were nearly longer than a football field. Once again as we rode by cars and trucks pulled over to watch us go by, horns honking and people waving at the display. After the visit to the Roadhouse we rode back to Sterling but we only got back to the estate with the lead 24 bikes still in a single group, seems like the miracle that got us there did not repeat for the return trip! After the memorial ride the Bike Games were held and fun was had by those who participated and those of us who sat around and watched. Yea I was watching and enjoyed doing it. I should also need to mention/brag/boast that Carrie Hintz of ALR Chapter 35 in an awesome display of riding ability won the balance beam competition completing the ride over the entire 20 feet length of 4" wide wooden surface not just once but twice as she also had to win a ride off!





As the day wore on so approached the time set aside for the Flag Retirement Ceremony. Tim Campbell from Post 1 had brought the script for our standard American Legion Flag Retirement and when we gathered for the ceremony we asked and they allowed us to retire the flags. The ALRA gathered all the bikes at the end of the runway, (yea the entire even was centered on the Johnson Families Private runway) and rode in escort in group formation ending at the base of the hill where the ceremonies would take place. The wonderful ladies from Quilts of Valor had several presentations of beautifully made quilts to several Veterans including several ALR members. The officers of the ALRA (including me) performed the Flag Retirement Ceremony in a small amphitheater they had around a fire pit that was part of the entertainment area of the Johnsons backyard. It was a good and very dignified ceremony and many realized within that moment that all present truly felt strongly about respecting Our Country and Our Country's Flag.



All during the weekend we ran into veterans or family members of veterans and many had memberships in various Post around Alaska and some Post that were on

the East Coast. An the idea began to circulate about having the members of South Peninsula ABATE join the American

Legion Riders and those of us not already members of ABATE signing up. I believe much of the credit for the enthusiasm for joining the ALR arises from Brad Phelps of Chapter 16. He spent the time developing a stronger relationship with the South Peninsula ABATE group after attending the Salute to Veterans activities during the 2019 ROMP.



So I am happy to report that I along with ALRA members representing Chapters 1, 5, 16 and 35, attended the Post meeting at Post 20 on the 27<sup>th</sup> and it seems that Chapter 20 will be revitalized, as after the presentation by Mark Berg and I, along with seeing the enthusiasm of the prospective Chapter 20 officers, the Post Committee at Post 20 approved the reforming of ALR Chapter 20.

You would think after all I have written about I would be out of news. But not quite yet. But it looks like a ALR Chapter is also starting up down in Ketchikan at Post 3.






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
