Back in the Dominican Republic, we arrived at a five-star restaurant to have dessert to celebrate the end of our busy week. This restaurant happened to be located at the top of a mountain. None of these boys were surprised to hear me say that I expected their best behavior, act like gentlemen and to make me proud. After taking pictures overlooking the mountain, it was time to go inside to have our dessert. As I walked into the restaurant, I shouldn't have been surprised. Two of my boys were sitting at a table creating two of the most incredible paper airplanes that I had ever seen

I looked at them. They looked at me as their faces pled the innocence they didn't have as if it wasn't inappropriate to be constructing paper airplanes at such a high-scale restaurant. As they handed over their planes, I sighed and smiled. I realized that although they were Godly young men, deep inside they were still just little boys who wanted to see how far a paper airplane could fly from the top of a mountain.

Who hasn't been there? As we grow in faith and continue our own journeys we all make mistakes. A misstep here. A paper airplane there. I'm so grateful to have people around me to keep me grounded. People who aren't afraid to ask me to hand over my own paper airplanes. (Even if mine would definitely fly the farthest.)


