

Rules for Spring Junior Livestock Show

1. **All livestock must be entered online by May 15, 2022.** Go to the Fulton County Fair website www.fultoncountyfair.org and follow the link for online entries. **All entries will be entered in the computer before the date of the show.** All entries must be paid online. For questions on classes, contact the Wayne Neal at 870-371-3232. For questions on entering online, contact the Fulton County Fair Office at 870-895-5565 or Carolyn Lewis at 870-321-3193.
2. Check-in at 8:00 a.m. and the first show will start at 10:00 a.m. The show order is (1) Swine, (2) Sheep, (3) Goats, and (4) Cattle. **Livestock & Poultry Inspectors must check health papers before cattle are unloaded and no livestock will be allowed in the barns before the check-in times.**
3. Age rules for all exhibitors will be enforced. Please check the age rules for each show.
4. Livestock exhibitors must furnish feed, feed troughs, and water containers for their animals. At the close of the show exhibitors must leave the stalls for their animals clean by removing straw and trash.
5. Only purebred, pureblood (one purebred parent) livestock or animal equal to Breed Association Herd Book quality are admitted in breeding classes.
6. All disputes and misunderstandings shall be settled by the chairman of the department in which they occur or by the Fulton County Fair Executive Committee.
7. All livestock must be handled by the owners or their authorized representative. Any animal that is not exhibited before the judge, unless granted permission, is automatically disqualified. All livestock must be halter broke.
8. Health regulations are on the Fulton County Fair website and are issued by the Livestock & Poultry Commission. Health certificates are required. In the event a disease is detected the owner will be asked to remove the animal from the fairgrounds. In case of dispute, fair officials will have authority to call a veterinarian at the expense of the owner. The Fulton County Fair Association reserves the right to have a blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any market animals at the show. Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of an animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in a quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition in livestock shows. Their name and lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA for further investigation and possible prosecution. Any animal receiving medication for any life threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered in the fair.
