

SEMPER PARATUS

In **NORTHLAND's** ship report in this issue of *The Lucky Bag* on page 4, the XO speaks of the critical role played by the helicopter in the execution of their mission.

The MH-65 helicopter is a short-range recovery helicopter typically crewed by two pilots, a flight mechanic and a rescue swimmer and is the primary aircraft for Coast Guard shipboard operations. The MH-65 is certified for operation in all weather, except for icing conditions and at night. Roles include maritime patrol, drug and migrant interdiction, disaster response, search and rescue, law enforcement and environmental protection. The MH-65 is configurable to enable armed missions, with a door-mounted machine gun and precision-fire rifles.

The MH-65D features improved GPS/inertial navigation and flight management systems. The MH-65E features an all-glass cockpit with advanced navigation capabilities – including new radar. The MH-65E will share avionics with the MH-60T, providing common cockpit instrumentation, improving standardization throughout the Coast Guard rotary-wing fleet. The MH-65E will also include two life extension programs that will allow the fleet to remain in service into the late 2030's. Three helicopters have been upgraded and used in operational test and evaluation activities. Full-rate production began in 2020. There are 98 H-65's in the inventory. **Semper Paratus:** Latin, "Always Prepared". Logo for U.S. Coast Guard.

CHANGE OF COMMAND OF BLACKLIONS



CDR Bryan "STAG" Pinckney, a native of Richmond, VA, graduated from Episcopal High School in Alexandria, VA followed by Vanderbilt University with a B.A. in Political Science. He was commissioned through NROTC in May 2002.

CDR Pinckney was designated a Naval Flight Officer (NFO) in Pensacola, FL in March 2004. After advanced training at VFA-122 at NAS Lemoore, CA, he was qualified as an F/A-18F Super Hornet Weapons System Officer (WSO). In January 2005, CDR Pinckney reported to the "Black Aces" of VFA-41. He completed two Western Pacific deployments aboard the USS NIMITZ (CVN-68) in support of both Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. He also earned his Strike-Fighter Weapon Training and Tactics Level IV and FAC(A) qualifications and served as Line Division and Air-To-Surface Weapons Trainings Officer.

In January 2008, he reported to the "Gladiators" of VFA-106 at NAS Oceana, VA and qualified as an F/A-18D-F Instructor WSO. At VFA-106, he served as 1st LT, Operation Administration, Demonstration Team Lead, and Strike Phase Head. While a member of the 2009 Super Hornet Tactical Demonstration Team, he performed at the Sakhir Airbase for the 2010 Bahrain International Airshow.

In December 2010, CDR Pinckney reported to C5F/USNAVCENT HQ in Manama, Bahrain where he served as the Aide to the Commander, VADM

Mark Fox. Following his Aide tour, he attended the Naval War College in Newport, RI where he graduated with distinction.

CDR Pinckney then reported to the "Swordsmen" of VFA-32 in NAS Oceana, VA. While with the "Swordsmen", he served as the Administration Officer, Maintenance Officer, and Operations Officer. He deployed to the CENTCOM AOR aboard USS HARRY S. TRUMAN (CVN 75) from Sept 2013 – April 2014 in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. During his tour, he earned his CDO (underway), Air Wing Mission Commander, and Air Wing Rescue Mission Commander qualifications.

In December 2015, CDR Pinckney reported to US European Command in Stuttgart, Germany where he was assigned to the J4 Directorate. He served as the Directorate's Integrated Priority List manager, Annual Joint Assessment lead, and was a member of the Director's Command Action Group to spearhead USEUCOM's Mobility Strategy. In November 2019, he joined the VFA-213 "Blacklions" as the Executive Officer.

CDR Pinckney has accumulated over 2600 flight hours, including over 2100 hours in the F/A-18D-F and more than 500 carrier arrested landings. He is the recipient of the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Strike Flight Air Medal (three awards), Navy Commendation Medal (two awards) and various campaign and unit medals.



Greetings from USCGC NORTHLAND!

Our current patrol is focused on the Coast Guard fisheries mission, while often serving as the Coast Guard's Offshore search and rescue asset. We've conducted daily boardings of domestic fishing boats to ensure fair and safe practices are being conducted by fisherman. In addition, we diligently patrolled the Maritime Boundary Line (MBL) deterring illegal fishing in U.S. waters. Finally, NORTHLAND has been on the lookout for illegal and irresponsible fishing gear lost or left behind by fisherman who cross the MBL. Our aggressive presence in the area has already resulted in the interdiction of one illegal Mexican fishing vessel poaching Red Snapper in US waters. More importantly, we believe

that our presence has deterred many other vessels from illegally crossing the maritime boundary line to poach US fish stocks.

Included with our usual NORTH-LAND crew is an aviation detachment from Air Station Corpus Christi. The crew, flying a Eurocopter MH-65 Dolphin, is making at least one flight a day, with hopes to direct NORTH-LAND specifically where to look for fishing vessels. The daily flight operations conducted are great training for our crew and great training for the air crew, as landing on a moving cutter is a little different than landing at an airport!

In addition to conducting the mission daily, NORTHLAND's crew worked hard to gain new personal qualifications. With transfer season looming and crew members that are departing already beginning to learn where they are going next, training the people that will remain on NORTHLAND through the summer is becoming more important than ever. The crew remains industrious as they work hard to get qualified and ready to train new members when they arrive.

As usual, our engineers continue to impress with their repairs and knowledge of the onboard engineering equipment. In February, we were dealt what seemingly could be a catastrophic equipment failure to our #2 Main Diesel Engine's Reduction Gear Cooler. Without this piece of equipment, the #2 Main Diesel Engine could not run properly, which would severely affect our mission, our effectiveness, and our safety. However, our engineers made remarkable on the spot overhauls and masterfully used our scheduled refuel and provision time at port of calls to get NORTHLAND back to operating at full capacity.

As we enter the second half of our patrol, the crew remains enthusiastic and excited about the mission. They look forward to finishing patrol on a high note and returning home to see family and loved ones.


