

Joe and Laura take dogs that are not easily adopted and give them a second change...this is why Marsha Biggar calls them the "Last Resort Couple". They tell me how it is amazingly re-

warding for them to have helped so many fine furry friends. Joe had thought that he worked too many hours to have a pet, but realizes having them at home while he is working is a much better fate than having them linger in a kennel, which is very stressful for the animals. Joe and Laura both feel that it takes love, commitment and the willingness to make it work. Too often people return pets because it requires work and dedication, and it's not convenient...they need to remember that they are adopting a pet for LIFE.

Joe and Laura's pets came to them scared and unsure, but have greatly improved over time and have learned to trust people again. The Kaddis' are so committed to making it work that they have our trainer, Rob Mullin, visit them once a week to work with all their dogs. He is amazed at how well they all get along being that they are all different breeds, each with their own characteristics. They refer to it as "A United Nation of Dogs". Laura and Joe state, "It is amazing what a little love will do for these guys".

Joe and Laura told me that they buy 50 pounds of dog food every 2 weeks. They also said that they need more couches as the dogs take up all the sitting space. They really don't seem to mind. They told me that they love Adopt-A-Dog because we give dogs a second chance. Adopt-A-Dog loves them for the same reason!
