Year of the Monkey

There are many stories and fables to explain the beginning of the Chinese


zodiac. One story is that The Jade Emperor called a meeting and the animals had to cross a river to reach that place. The Jade Emperor had also decreed that the years on the calendar would be named after each animal in the order they arrived.

There was a great deal of trickery and activities of fun along the way with some animals riding on another animal's back. In the end the Rat jumped off the back of the Ox, just as it had swun across the river and reached the shore first. So he claimed first place in the competition and the zodiac.


The twelve animals of the Chinese zodiac have been developed in the early stages of Chinese civilization over hundreds of years before it became the current version and it's very hard to prove the real origins.

According to tales and legends, the beginning of the Chinese New Year started with the fight against a mythical beast called the "Year". The "Year" looks like an ox with a lion head and inhabits the sea. On the night of New Year's Eve the "Year" will come out to harm people. Later people found that the "Year" fears the colour red, fire and loud sounds. This is why celebrations now include hanging of red lanterns and firework displays.

The 8th February was the first day of this brand new year of the ninth animal in the Chinese Zodiac. People born in the Year of the Monkey are considered to be witty and intelligent and tend to be fast learners and astute opportunists. Personality

trends like mischievousness and curiosity mean that people often think of those born in the year of the monkey as naughty.





TYPES OF STAMPS

CHARITY STAMPS

In addition to normal postage, these stamps carry an extra charge which is given to charity.

DEFINITIVES

Usually issued in many different values that remain in circulation for a long time, sometimes dozens of years. They are smaller in size, but printed in large quantities. These are "every-day" stamps.



A special purpose stamp, popular during the earlier days of flight when postage for airmail was much higher than surface mail. Some airmail stamps could be used for surface mail.

POSTAGE DUE

These are used for collecting money on unpaid or underpaid postage. Best left on cover.

COMMEMORATIVES

Stamps issued for special occasions, they are usually larger and more colourful than definitives.

Commemoratives are also issued in limited numbers for a much shorter period of time.

LABELS

Also called "Cinderellas", these look like postage stamps, but cannot be used to pay for mailing a letter. There are many types of labels and they are best left on cover.
