I promised, in my last article that I would write about people and places around the Colonies.

Right away I am going to say I have not had luck getting feedback from you, the readers, about memories you might have so I am asking again if you would write me at 4118 V St./ Homestead, IA. Or call me at 319-622 6281. By the way just address me as "Feathers" if you do not know my real name.

I will tell you of one person that lived less than a mile from Homestead. My parents would buy eggs from him on a regular basis. He lived alone in a two-story house that had a few outbuildings which had heaven knows what in them.

This man lived alone and never let anyone go further than his glassed in porch which was full of all sorts of items one had to circle around to get to the egg cartons he kept on the south window sill, then on to the chicken coop trying to avoid all the chicken droppings (an impossible task.)

Mr. H. always wore stripped bib overalls and a railroad engineer's cap that had seen better days.

He never was clean shaven, but then again, he was not unkempt. I suppose that now one look at his face as being "in style" with its five o'clock shadow.

The interesting thing about him was he had this mind that seemed to know a little bit about anything. One day my father came home with a bank note he had bought from Mr. H. that had been printed at a bank in Millersburg of all places.

I wondered what good it was and why it had been printed. It no longer had any value, but it seems that at one time banks were printing their own money and distributing it. Dad would give this "note" along with a check to Esther and Martin Dickel when our parents bought the back part of their lot to build a new house in the late 1960's. Meanwhile Mr. H. would fade from my memory and his house would be demolished. The Homestead farm would add his farm to their land and now all that remains is a cornfield. I would so like to know about this man, but the people who remember him best have probably all passed away.



### Colonial Manor and Lakeview Village to Receive Vaccines

Tanya Powell confirmed Monday that both Colonial Manor and Lakeview Village residents and staff will be able to receive the vaccine for Covid-19 on Wednesday, January 13. Powell is the Colonial Manor administrator.

Dosages of the Pfizer vaccine will be brought to Colonial Manor and Lakeview Village by Walgreens Pharmacy on January 13 and offered to all residents and staff who want to be vaccinated. The second dosage will be administered three weeks later, Powell explained.

Powell said that once both dosages are administered, the current operating guidelines will remain in place. She stated, "As of today, the CDC guidance has not changed on how we will do things once the vaccine is administered. However, that may change as more information is gathered and understood about the vaccine. I don't foresee that the masks and shields will go away anytime soon. There will be staff, residents and the general public that do not take the vaccine, so we will need to continue to protect the staff and residents."

The CDC is working with several vendors to distribute COVID-19 vaccines in Iowa nursing homes and centers, including Hy-Vee, Walgreen's and CVS pharmacies, the Iowa Governor's office has reported.

### CCA High Student Council Helps 27 Families in Need

For the holidays the Clear Creek Amana High School Student Council raised \$11,000 to help 27 families living in the school district.

With planning and a coordinated effort that included the approval of the CCA School Board and a full day of shopping and gift wrapping, the CCA Student Council carried through with their "Sponsor a Family Program" over Christmas. Twenty seven families living in the school district received need food, clothing and coats, plus Christmas gifts and holiday cheer. The distributions were made in time for Christmas.

The students raised money by asking for donations from the student body, working an online campaign and contacting potential givers. As Matt Trosky, CCA High social studies teacher and student council advisor said when describing the students' efforts and the positive response from the community they received. ### IOWA VALLEY SCENIC BYWAY; NEW SCENIC BYWAYS PASSPORT

The Iowa Valley Scenic Byway is one of a dozen scenic byways participating in the new Scenic Byways Passport program.

The free digital Scenic Byways Passport encourages people to explore scenic byways and more than 100 unique attractions and destinations. Geofencing at participating locations allows travelers to check-in on the passport, earning them an entry into a monthly drawing for a prize package including an overnight stay, gift certificates and more valued at approximately \$200.

Select businesses along the byways will offer deals and discounts exclusively for passholders. Each deal redemption also earns an entry into the monthly drawing. The promotion runs through December 31, 2021.
