later when we lived in Vermont we sailed on the beautiful Lake Champlain.

Realizing the need to be fully prepared for the Puget Sound waters, Martha and I responded to the ABC course ad in The Leader and began our relationship with the United States Power Squadrons. The Point Wilson members were welcoming and invited us to join. Little did I know I would soon be the commander. Looking back on my two year term I recall many highlights.

The first gourmet dinner fundraiser was a success but our speaker for that event left in a huff because we did not have the proper digital stereo speakers he wanted for his presentation. Having no program for this event we turned to our members to share their experiences on the water, and so was born Sea Stories.

Two years ago during the Opening Day boat parade, Martha and I were sailing with the Hutton's on their boat, Visa. Because of the extremely rough conditions, several boats were literally pushed by waves into the shallow water near the Port Townsend piers and the sailboat regatta from Seattle ended with several boats having blown out spinnakers.



During the on the water portion of our sail class on the Newland's boat, Pegasus XIV, we had a period of strong wind which caused us to heel very quickly. I remember Martha grabbing Bill Dengler's belt as he made his way to the windward side of the boat.

During the San Juan Cruise two summers ago, we were sailing behind the Newland's in Rosario Strait on Cosmos Lady on our way to Cypress Island. The fog was thick when I received a call from Linda to stop proceeding forward and circle in place as they had picked up a vessel on AIS entering from the south. Within minutes, a tug pulling a very large barge became visible out from the fog bank and reentered after passing us. I learned the value of AIS that day. Not all of my recent squadron experiences reflect the unpredictability of the weather and the power of the wind, but the need for knowledge is evident for safe boating.

I had the pleasure to learn crabbing from Bob Monica and also caught my first halibut aboard his jet boat. The weather conditions for the evening of the Tapas party were perfect. When it was over, all the cooks had a chance to relax, eat and drink all the leftovers aboard Peg's boat, Anuket. I took the Piloting and Advance Piloting classes from Bob Miller. His years of experience on the water add an element to the courses not found in the curricula.

I could go on, but you get my point. Once again, I thank my bridge mates for supporting my efforts. I look forward to many more years of learning, teaching safe boating, and enjoying the comradery of Point Wilson Sail & Power Squadron.

Please plan to attend this month's important Squadron meeting! Several important events will be taking place that you will want to be involved in.

- 1) Election of officers for the 2016-2017 term. We will be soliciting nominations from the floor for the Executive Officer position. Please plan to participate in the nominations and voting.
- 2) Sandra Smith-Poling will be entertaining us with another exciting Sea Story.
- 3) Captain Joseph, our evening speaker will provide us with his intimate account of a sea tragedy that occurred on the East Coast on February 18, 1952. Two T-2 Tankers broke in half within 40 miles of each other in a "Nor'easter" that pounded these vessels with blizzard conditions and seas that boasted 50-foot waves. The *Pendleton* kerosene tanker that was bound for Boston broke apart at dawn. The *Fort Mercer*, that was also carrying kerosene and bound for Portland, Maine began breaking apart at 0800. The *Fort Mercer* sent out an SOS, but the initial break caused the *Pendleton* to lose all radio capability and for eight excruciating hours, she waited in silence for help she began to believe would never come.

But the Coast Guard was coming and responded with every resource available to handle four separate rescues. Only one of those rescues is featured in a new movie, "The Finest Hours," released on January 29. Captain Peter Joseph, USCG (Retired), whose father, CDR John M. Joseph, USCG, participated in the rescue, and he will share his father's story with our group. You might wish to see the movie prior to Captain Joseph's presentation in order to obtain some background information prior to his presentation.

Captain Joseph is a graduate of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, and the U.S. Naval War College. He served as a faculty member at both institutions. He led the International Law and Ocean Resources Division of the Naval Staff College and was a guest lecturer at Tufts University. He recently was a guest lecturer on Maritime Counterterrorism at the Naval War College. Captain Joseph commanded three large Coast Guard Cutters in the North Pacific and North Atlantic Oceans, Bering Sea, and the Gulf of Mexico. He is credited in rescues that saved over 100 lives and participated with law enforcement operations that resulted in confiscating tons of illegal drugs. He holds a Master Mariner's license and Master of Marine Affairs degree from the University of Rhode Island. He is a publishing author in the fields of maritime security and search and rescue. Locally, he is the past commodore of the Port Ludlow Yacht Club (2001) and previously owned a 43-foot Tollycraft.

GET READY FOR BOATING SEASON AND MEET NEW REGULATIONS WITH ABC CLASS

For Whom? All recreational boating enthusiasts and fishermen

What is ABC Class? America's Boating Course (ABC) is a National boating safety course for the public. The class is geared for both sail and power boat operators and includes: navigational rules, anchoring tips, emergency advice and procedures, how to use a VHF radio and safe trailering. Instructions for the safe operation of personal watercraft (kayaks and paddle boats) is also covered.

When is the Class held? 3 Thursdays – February 11, 18, and 25 – From 6:00-9:00 p.m.





Why take the Class?

- To satisfy the requirements for a Washington State Boater Education Card which is required for persons, age 58 and younger. The card was required as of January 1, 2014 for boaters who operate a 15 horsepower or greater enginedriven vessel.
- Be a safe boat operator for your family and friends. Learn safety tips enabling you to assist as a crew member or as an onboard guest.
- Some Insurance companies offer reduced premiums if you have this card
- Get a 6-month trial membership to Point Wilson Sail & Power Squadron making you eligible to take additional discounted courses.





Point Wilson Sail and Power Squadron offers Vessel Safety Checks, which is a Free Check of a vessel's equipment for compliance with Federal and State Safety Requirements. When your boat passes the inspection, you will receive a decal like the one to left.

You may also want to complete the Virtual Vessel Safety Examination at http://vdept.cgaux.org/vve/launch.htm.

The Vessel Examiners performing this service have been trained to look for some of the common problems which might occur in your boat or its associated safety equipment.



- 1 Feb Low in the south before dawn, the moon and Mars are separated by 1 finger-width.
- 2 Feb This morning the moon lies between Mars, 1½ fist-widths to the right, and Saturn, about the same distance to the lower left. Antares is 3 or 4 finger-widths to Saturn's lower right.
- 3 Feb Saturn is 2 finger-widths below the moon.
- 6 Feb Mercury is 1 finger-width below the moon. Venus is a little more than 2 finger-widths to the moon's right.
- 7 Feb Mercury is at its greatest elongation, 25.6 degrees west of the sun, low in the east before first light.
- 11 Feb This evening the moon lies between Alpheratz, 2½ fist-widths to the upper right, and Deneb Kaitos, 2 fist-widths to the lower left.
- 13 Feb Hamal is 1½ fist-widths to the moon's upper right tonight.
- 15 Feb The first-quarter moon is high in the south at dusk. The Pleiades Cluster is 1 fist-width to the moon's right or upper right, Aldebaran is 2 finger-widths to the upper left, and Orion is 2 fist-widths to the lower left.
- 17 Feb High in the south at dusk, Betelgeuse, the brightest star in Orion, is 1 fist-width to the moon's lower right, and the Gemini Twins are 2 fist-widths to the left.
- 18 Feb The bright star 1½ fist-widths below the moon this evening is Procyon, in the constellation Canis Minor, the Little Dog.
- 19 Feb Procyon is to the moon's lower right this evening and the Gemini Twins are to the upper left.
- 20 Feb The moon lies between Procyon, 2 fist-widths to the upper right, and Regulus, 1½ fist-widths to the lower left. The Big Dipper stands on its handle, far to the left.
- 21 Feb Regulus is 2 finger-widths to the moon's lower left this evening.
- 22 Feb February's full moon lies between Regulus, 4 finger-widths above, and Jupiter, 1 fist-width to the lower left. Wait an hour after dusk to get a good view.
- 23 Feb Separated by 1 finger-width, Jupiter and the moon are high in the southwest by midnight.
- 24 Feb Late tonight in the west, the bright star 2 fist-widths to the moon's lower left is **Spica**. **Jupiter** is 1½ fist-widths to the moon's upper right.
- 27 Feb Spica is 4 finger-widths to the moon's lower right, low in the south before first light.
- 28 Feb This morning the moon lies between Spica, 2 fist-widths to the lower right, and Mars, 1½ fist-widths to the left.







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
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
